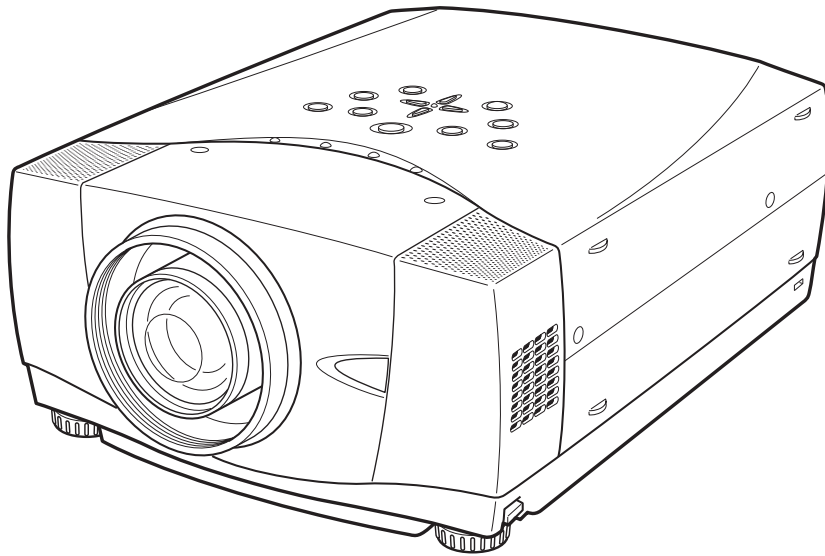

# TO THE OWNER

Before operating this projector, read this manual thoroughly and operate the projector properly.


This projector provides many convenient features and functions. Operating the projector properly enables you to manage those features and maintain it in better condition for a considerable time.

Improper operation may result in not only shortening the product life, but also malfunctions, fire hazard, or other accidents.

If your projector seems to operate improperly, read this manual again, check operations and cable connections and try the solutions in the "Troubleshooting" section in the end of this booklet. If the problem still persists, contact the dealer where you purchased the projector or the service center.

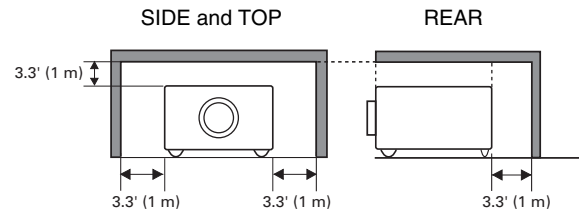

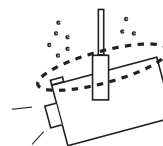
- This projector produces intense light from the projection lens. Do not stare directly into the lens as much as possible. Eye damage could result. Be especially careful that children do not stare directly into the beam.
- Install the projector in a proper position. If not, it may result in a fire hazard.
- Provide appropriate space on the top, sides and rear of the projector cabinet for allowing air circulation and cooling the projector. Minimum clearances must be maintained. If the projector is to be built into a compartment or similarly enclosed, the minimum distances must be maintained. Do not cover the ventilation slots on the projector. Heat build-up can reduce the service life of your projector, and can also be dangerous.



- If the projector is not to be used for an extended time, unplug the projector from the power outlet.

When hanging the projector from the ceiling, clean the air intake vents, air filters, and top of the projector periodically with a vacuum cleaner. # SAFETY INSTRUCTIONS

All the safety and operating instructions should be read before the product is operated.

Read all of the instructions given here and retain them for later use. Unplug this projector from AC power supply before cleaning. Do not use liquid or aerosol cleaners. Use a damp cloth for cleaning.

Follow all warnings and instructions marked on the projector.

For added protection to the projector during a lightning storm, or when it is left unattended and unused for long periods of time, unplug it from the wall outlet. This will prevent damage due to lightning and power line surges.

Do not expose this unit to rain or use near water... for example, in a wet basement, near a swimming pool, etc...

Do not use attachments not recommended by the manufacturer as they may cause hazards.

Do not place this projector on an unstable cart, stand, or table. The projector may fall, causing serious injury to a child or adult, and serious damage to the projector. Use only with a cart or stand recommended by the manufacturer, or sold with the projector. Wall or shelf mounting should follow the manufacturer's instructions, and should use a mounting kit approved by the manufacturers.

An appliance and cart combination should be moved with care. Quick stops, excessive force, and uneven surfaces may cause the appliance and cart combination to overturn.

Slots and openings in the back and bottom of the cabinet are provided for ventilation, to insure reliable operation of the equipment and to protect it from overheating.

The openings should never be covered with cloth or other materials, and the bottom opening should not be blocked by placing the projector on a bed, sofa, rug, or other similar surface. This projector should never be placed near or over a radiator or heat register.

This projector should not be placed in a built-in installation such as a book case unless proper ventilation is provided.

Never push objects of any kind into this projector through cabinet slots as they may touch dangerous voltage points or short out parts that could result in a fire or electric shock. Never spill liquid of any kind on the projector.

Do not install the projector near the ventilation duct of air-conditioning equipment.

This projector should be operated only from the type of power source indicated on the marking label. If you are not sure of the type of power supplied, consult your authorized dealer or local power company.

Do not overload wall outlets and extension cords as this can result in fire or electric shock. Do not allow anything to rest on the power cord. Do not locate this projector where the cord may be damaged by persons walking on it.

Do not attempt to service this projector yourself as opening or removing covers may expose you to dangerous voltage or other hazards. Refer all servicing to qualified service personnel.

Unplug this projector from wall outlet and refer servicing to qualified service personnel under the following conditions:

- f. When the projector exhibits a distinct change in performance-this indicates a need for service.

When replacement parts are required, be sure the service technician has used replacement parts specified by the manufacturer that have the same characteristics as the original part. Unauthorized substitutions may result in fire, electric shock, or injury to persons.

Upon completion of any service or repairs to this projector, ask the service technician to perform routine safety checks to determine that the projector is in safe operating condition.

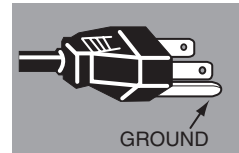

This Multimedia Projector is designed with most advanced technology for portability, durability, and ease of use. This projector utilizes built-in multimedia features, a palette of 1.07 billion colors, and matrix liquid crystal display (LCD) technology.

## ◆ Compact Design

---

This projector is extremely compact in size and weight. It is designed to carry and work anywhere you wish to use.

## ◆ Compatibility

---

This projector accepts various video and computer input signals such as:

- Computers  
IBM-compatible or Macintosh computer up to 1600 x 1200 resolution.
- 6 Color Systems  
NTSC, PAL, SECAM, NTSC 4.43, PAL-M, or PAL-N color system can be connected.
- Component Video  
Component video signal, such as a DVD player output high definition TV signals including 480i, 480p, 575i, 575p, 720p, 1035i, or 1080i, can be connected.
- S-Video  
S-Video signal, such as a S-VHS VCR output signal, can be connected.

## ◆ High Resolution Image

---

This projector provides 1024 x 768 dots resolution for computer input and 800 horizontal TV lines. Resolution from a computer with more than XGA (1024 x 768) is compressed into 1024 x 768 dots. This projector cannot display an image of over 1920 x 1080 dots. When resolution of your computer is over 1920 x 1080, lower the resolution for a computer output.

## ◆ Multi-Scan System

---

This projector has the Multi-Scan System to conform to almost all computer output signals quickly. There is no need for a troublesome manual adjustment of frequency and other settings.

## ◆ One-Touch Auto PC Adjustment

---

Incoming computer video signals are recognized and the best adjustment is automatically set by the Auto PC Adjustment function. No complicated setup is necessary and the projection is always precise.

## ◆ Motor-driven Lens Shift

---

Projection lens can be moved up and down with the motor-driven Lens Shift function. This function makes it easy to provide projected image where you want. Zoom and focus can also be adjusted with a motor-driven operation.

## ◆ Digital Zoom (for Computer)

---

Digital Zoom function adjusts image size to approx. 1/4 - 49 times of an original image size, allowing you to focus on a crucial information at the presentation.

## ◆ Keystone Correction

---

Keystone correction function is provided to correct distortion of the projected image allowing you to use the projector without locational constraints.

## ◆ Power Management

---

Power management function is provided to reduce power consumption when the projector is not in use. The Power management function turns the projection lamp off when the projector detects a signal interruption or when no button is pressed for a certain period. The projection lamp is automatically turned on again when the projector detects a signal or any operation button is pressed. This projector is shipped with this function "ON."

## ◆ Digital Visual Interface

---

This projector is equipped with the DVI 24-pin terminal for connecting DVI output from a computer.

## ◆ Laser Pointer Function

---

Remote control supplied with this projector includes the Laser Pointer function. This function helps you to make a smart presentation on a projected screen.

## ◆ Wireless Mouse

---

Remote control supplied with this projector has the Wireless Mouse function for a connected computer. This function enables you to operate both projectors and computers with the remote control only.

## ◆ Multilanguage Menu Display

---

Operation menu is available in 12 languages: English, German, French, Italian, Spanish, Portuguese, Dutch, Swedish, Russian, Chinese, Korean, or Japanese.

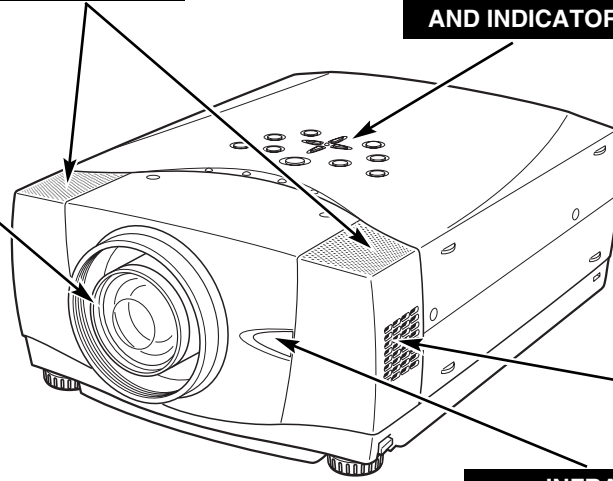

### HOT AIR EXHAUSTED !

Air blown from the exhaust vent is hot. When using or installing the projector, the following precautions should be taken.

- Do not put a flammable object near this vent.
- Keep the rear grills at least 3.3' (1 m) away from any object, especially from heat-sensitive objects.
- Do not touch this area, especially screws and metallic parts. This area will become hot when the projector is in use.

This projector detects internal temperature and automatically controls operating power of the cooling fans.

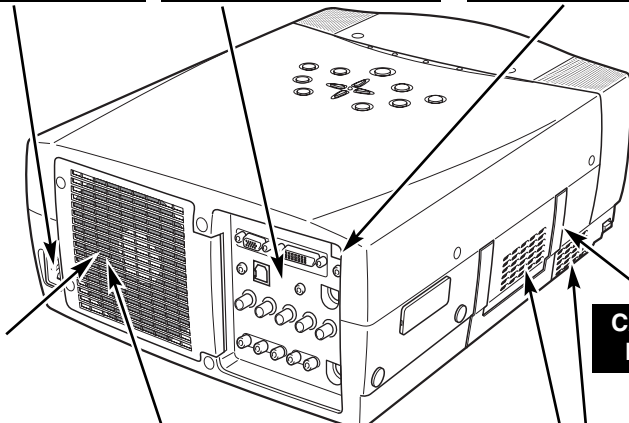

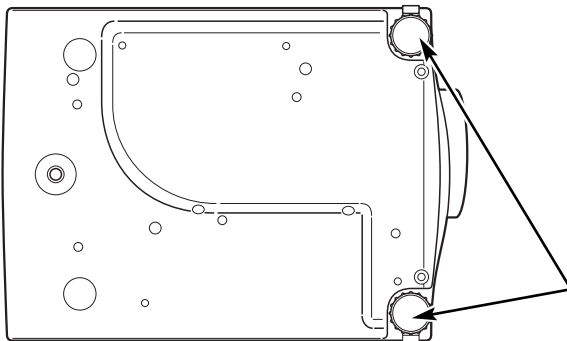
### BOTTOM OF CABINET

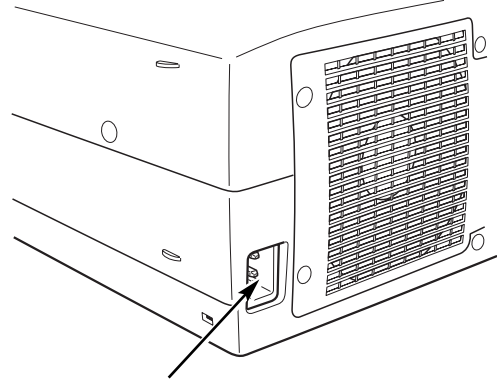
# SETTING-UP PROJECTOR

## CONNECTING AC POWER CORD

This projector uses nominal input voltages of 100–120 V or 200–240 V AC and it automatically selects correct input voltage. It is designed to work with single-phase power systems having a grounded neutral conductor. To reduce risk of electrical shock, do not plug into any other type of power system.

If you are not sure of the type of power being supplied, consult your authorized dealer or service station.

Connect the projector with all peripheral equipment before turning it on. (See pages 12–14 for connection.)



Connect AC power cord (supplied) to the projector.

The AC outlet must be near this equipment and must be easily accessible.






### CAUTION

For safety, unplug the AC power cord when the projector is not in use. When the projector is connected to an outlet with AC power cord, an appliance is in stand-by mode and consumes a little electric power.

### NOTE ON POWER CORD

AC power cord must meet the requirements of the country where you use the projector. Confirm the AC plug type with the chart below and a proper AC power cord must be used. If the supplied AC power cord does not match your AC outlet, contact your sales dealer.

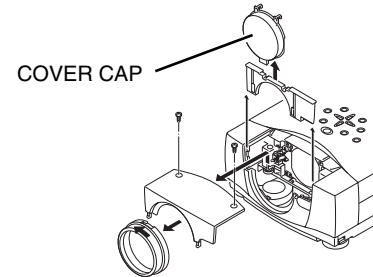
## LENS INSTALLATION

Before setting up the projector, install a projection lens on the projector.

1. Before installation, check the area where the projector is used and prepare a suitable lens. For the specifications of a projection lens, contact sales dealer where you purchased the projector.
2. For installation, refer to the installation manual of the optional lens.

**NOTE:**

- When installing the lens, remove the cover cap of the projector.



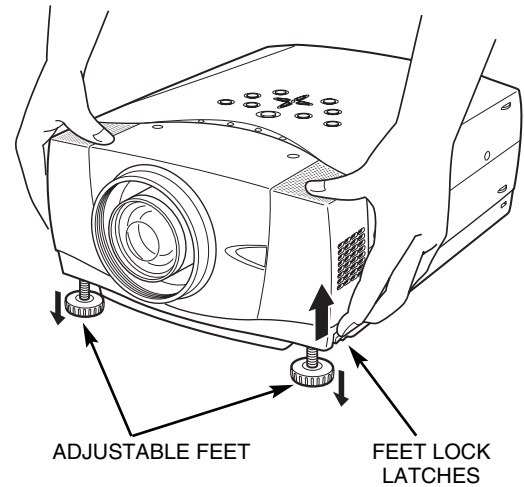
## PREPARATION

### ADJUSTABLE FEET

Projection angle can be adjusted up to 10.5 degrees with the ADJUSTABLE FEET.

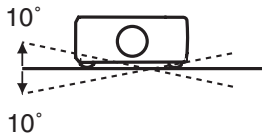
- 1** Lift the front of the projector and pull the FEET LOCK LATCHES in each side of the projector.
- 2** Release the FEET LOCK LATCHES to lock the ADJUSTABLE FEET and rotate the ADJUSTABLE FEET to a proper height, and tilt.
- 3** To retract the ADJUSTABLE FEET, lift the front of the projector and pull and undo the FEET LOCK LATCHES.

Keystone distortion of the projected image can be corrected by the Menu Operation. (See pages 22, 38.)



### INSTALLING PROJECTOR IN PROPER POSITION

Install the projector properly. Improper installation may reduce the lamp life and cause a fire hazard.



Do not tilt the projector more than 10 degrees from side to side.



**NO SIDWAYS**

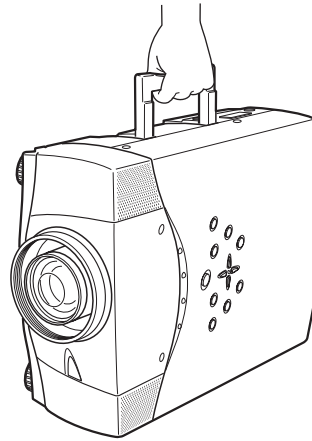
Do not put the projector on either side to project an image.

**MOVING PROJECTOR**

Use the Carrying Handle when moving the projector.

Replace the lens cap and retract the ADJUSTABLE FEET when moving the projector to prevent damages to the lens and cabinet.

When this projector is not in use for an extended period, put it into a suitable case (not supplied with this projector).

**CAUTION IN CARRYING OR TRANSPORTING A PROJECTOR**

- Do not drop or bump the projector, otherwise damages or malfunctions may result.
- When carrying the projector, use a suitable carrying case.
- Do not transport the projector by courier or any other transport service in an unsuitable transport case. This may cause damage to the projector. To transport the projector by courier or any other transport service, consult your dealer for the best way.

# CONNECTING PROJECTOR

## TERMINALS OF PROJECTOR

This projector has input and output terminals on its back for connecting computers and video equipment. Refer to the figures on pages 12 to 14 and connect properly.

### COMPUTER AUDIO INPUT 1/ AUDIO MONITOR OUTPUT JACK

This terminal is switchable and can be used as Computer Audio Input 1 or Audio Monitor Output (variable). Set up the terminal as either Computer Audio Input 1 or Audio Monitor Output properly before using this terminal. (See pages 13, 24.)

Note: This terminal does not output audio from INPUT 3.

### COMPUTER INPUT/MONITOR OUTPUT TERMINAL (ANALOG)

This terminal is switchable and can be used as Computer Input or Monitor Output. Set up the terminal as either Computer Input or Monitor Output properly before using this terminal. (See pages 13–14, 24.)

Note: This terminal outputs from the 5 BNC type computer input on INPUT 2 jacks only.

### COMPUTER INPUT TERMINAL (DIGITAL)

Connect a computer output (Digital DVI-D type) to this terminal. The HD (HDCP Compatible) signal can also be connected. (See page 13.)

### COMPUTER AUDIO INPUT 2 JACK

Connect an audio output (stereo) from a computer to this jack. (See page 13.)

### R/C JACK

When using the Wired/Wireless remote control as wired, connect the Wired remote control to this jack with a remote control cable (optional).

### CONTROL PORT CONNECTOR

When controlling a computer with the remote control of this projector, connect the mouse port of your personal computer to this connector. (See page 13.)

### USB CONNECTOR (Series B)

When controlling a computer with the remote control of this projector, connect USB terminal of your personal computer to this terminal. (See page 13.)

### RESET BUTTON

This projector uses a micro processor to control the unit, and only occasionally, this micro processor may malfunction and need to be reset. This can be done by pressing the RESET button with a pen, which will shut down and restart the unit. Do not use the RESET function excessively.

### 5 BNC INPUT JACKS

Connect component video output (Y, Cb, Cr or Y, Pb, Pr) from video equipment to VIDEO/Y, Cb/Pb and Cr/Pr jacks or connect computer output (5 BNC Type [Green, Blue, Red, Horiz. Sync, and Vert. Sync.]) from computer to G, B, R, H/V, and V jacks. (See pages 13–14.)

### VIDEO INPUT JACKS

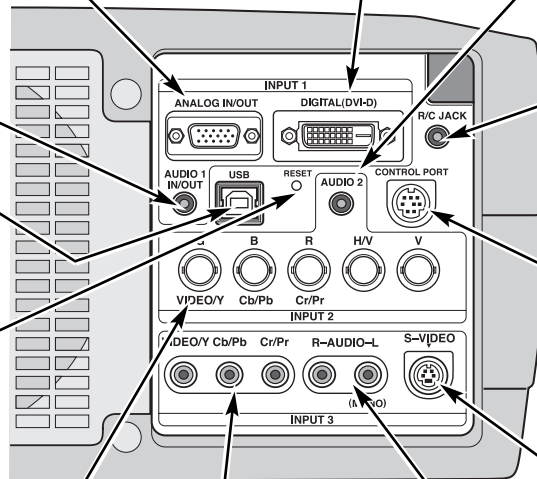
Connect composite video output from video equipment to VIDEO/Y jack or connect component video outputs to VIDEO/Y, Cb/Pb and Cr/Pr jacks. (See page 14.)

### AUDIO INPUT JACKS

Connect an audio output from video equipment to these jacks. (See page 14.)

### S-VIDEO INPUT JACK

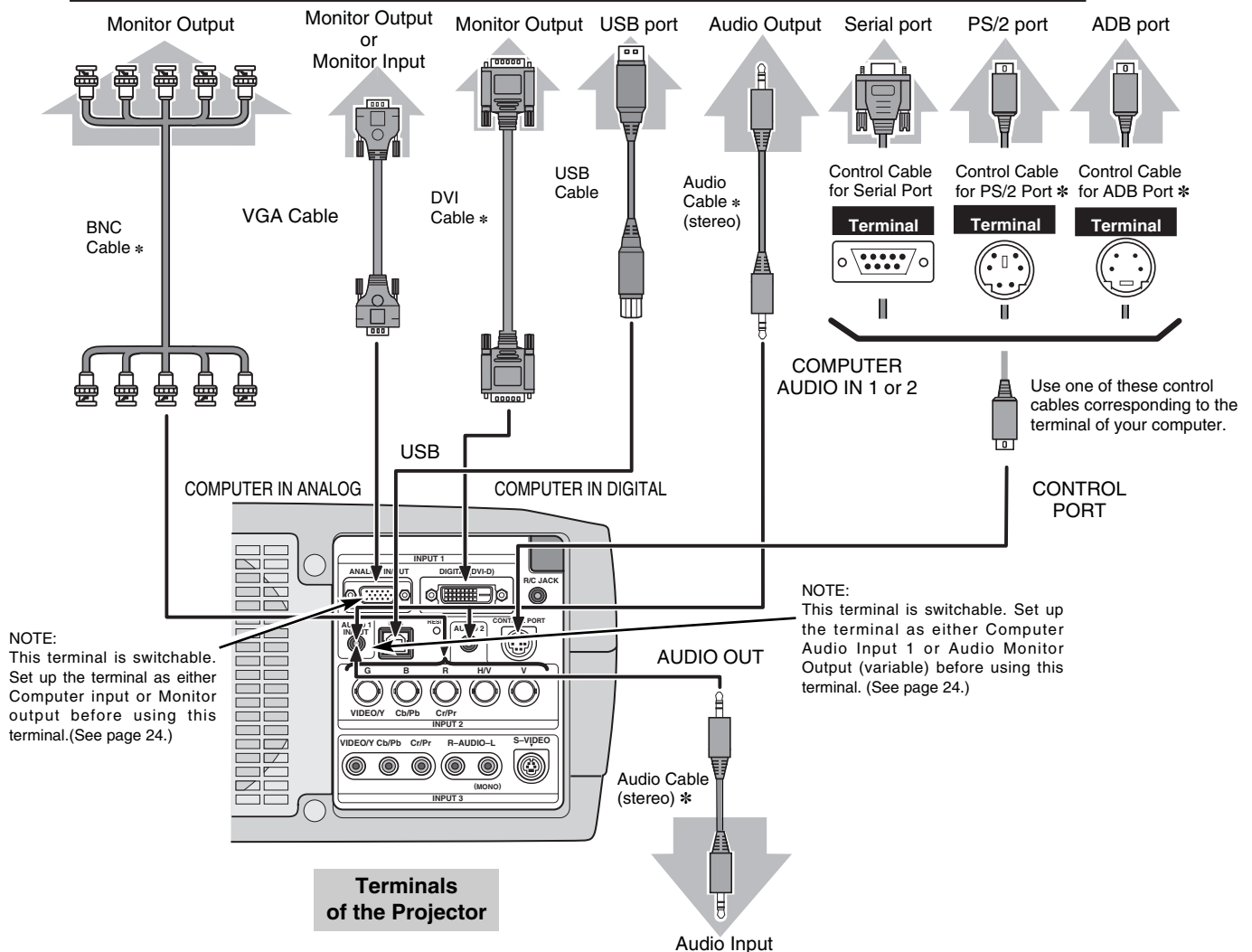
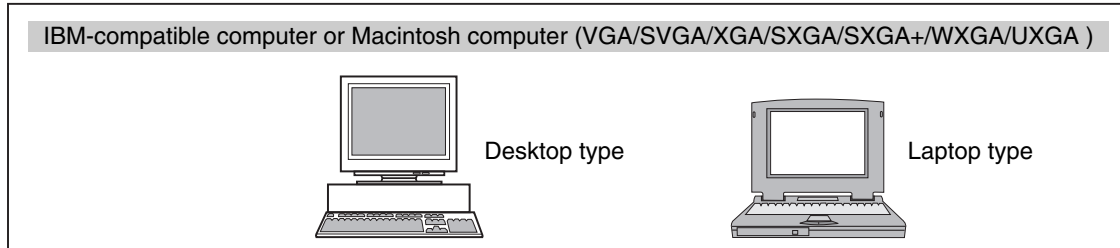

# BEFORE OPERATION

## REMOTE CONTROL OPERATION

### Left Side



#### ALL OFF SWITCH

When using the remote control, turn this switch to "ON." And turn it to "ALL OFF" when it is not in use.

#### INSIDE THE BATTERY COMPARTMENT BOX

This Remote Control provides the DIP switches into the battery compartment box.

Slide the SW4 (LASER ON/OFF switch) to the "OFF" position. The Laser Pointer function is not operated. Set the Switches 1-3 as shown in table below depending on the Code No. that you want to select as the remote control code. (See page 41.)

#### LASER POINTER (DRAG ON) INDICATOR

Lights red while the laser beam is emitted from the Laser Light Window. Lights green when dragged to the "ON" position. (p.45)

#### MUTE BUTTON

Used to mute the sound. (p.23)

#### DRAG ON/OFF BUTTON

Used to select the DRAG ON/OFF position. (p.45)

#### LEFT CLICK BUTTON

Used as a PC mouse in Wireless Mouse Operation. Press this button and the mouse pointer button to drag the selected screen object. (p.45)

#### LASER BUTTON

Used to operate the Laser Pointer function. The laser beam is emitted when pressing this button for one minute.

When using the Laser Pointer for more than one minute, release this button and press it again.

#### FOCUS BUTTON

Used to adjust focus. (p.22)

#### POWER ON-OFF BUTTON

Used to turn the projector on or off. (pp.20-21)

#### AUTO PC ADJ. BUTTON

Use to operate the AUTO PC Adjustment function. (p.26)

#### IMAGE BUTTON

Used to select the image level. (pp.29, 33)

#### KEystone BUTTON

Used to correct keystone distortion. (pp.22, 38)

#### MOUSE POINTER

Used as a PC mouse in Wireless Mouse Operation. (p.45)

#### RIGHT CLICK BUTTON

Used as a PC mouse in Wireless Mouse Operation. (p.45)

#### LENS SHIFT BUTTON

Used to select the Lens Shift function. (p.22)

#### WIRED REMOTE JACK

When using as a Wired Remote Control, connect a remote control cable (optional) to this jack.

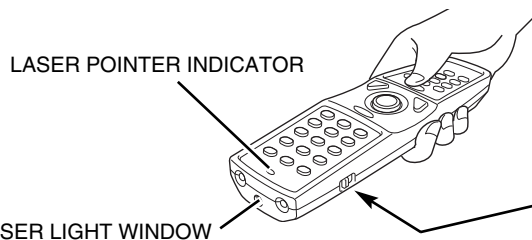
Battery installation is required when using as a Wired Remote Control.

## LASER POINTER FUNCTION

This remote control emits laser beam from the Laser Light Window when used as a Laser Pointer. When the LASER button is pressed, the laser light goes on. When the LASER button is being pressed for more than one minute or it is released, the light goes off. The LASER POINTER INDICATOR lights RED and LASER is emitted with RED light to indicate the laser beam is being emitted.

The Laser emitted is the Class II laser. Do not look into the Laser Light Window or shine laser beam onto yourself or other people. The three marks shown below are caution labels for the laser beam.

**CAUTION:** Use of controls, adjustments, or performance of procedures other than those specified herein may result in hazardous radiation exposure.

- 2 Connect the projector's AC power cord into an AC outlet. The LAMP indicator lights RED, and the READY indicator lights GREEN.
- 3 Press the POWER ON-OFF button on the top control or on the remote control. The LAMP indicator dims, and the cooling fans start to operate. The preparation display appears on the screen and the countdown starts.
- 4 After the countdown, the input source that was selected the last time and the Lamp control status icon (see page 41) appear on the screen.

If the projector is locked with a PIN code, a PIN code Input Dialog Box appears. Enter a PIN code as instructed below.

#### To Enter a PIN code

Select a number by pressing the POINT LEFT/RIGHT button and fix the number with the SELECT button. The number changes to "\*" if you fixed a wrong number, move the pointer to "Set" or "Clear" once by pressing the POINT DOWN button, then return to "PIN code." Enter the correct number.

Repeat this step to complete entering a four-digit number.

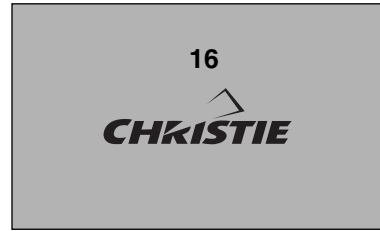
When the four-digit number is fixed, the pointer automatically moves to "Set." Press the SELECT button so that you can start to operate the projector.

If you entered a wrong PIN code, "PIN code" and the number (\*\*\*\*) turn red and disappear. Enter a PIN code all over again.

#### What is PIN code?

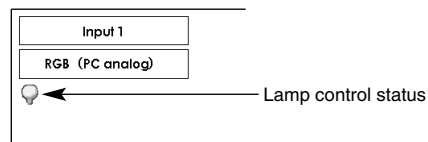
PIN (Personal Identification Number) code is a security code that allows the person who knows it to operate the projector. Setting a PIN code prevents unauthorized use of the projector.

A PIN code consists of a four-digit number. Refer to the PIN code lock function in SETTING Menu on page 43 for locking operation of the projector with your PIN code.

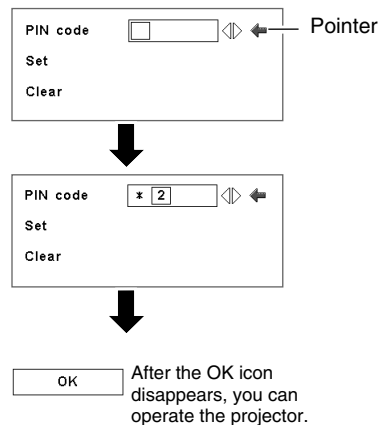

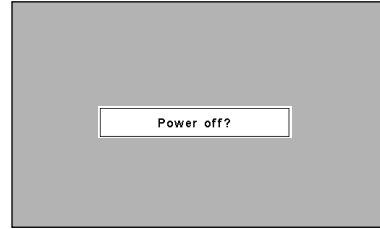


#### CAUTION ON HANDLING PIN CODE

If you forget your PIN code, the projector can no longer be started. Take special care in setting a new PIN code; write down the number in a column on page 60 of this manual and keep it at hand. Should the PIN code be missing or forgotten, consult your dealer or service center.

## TURNING OFF THE PROJECTOR

- 1** Press the POWER ON-OFF button on the top control or on the remote control, and “Power off?” appears on the screen.
- 2** Press the POWER ON-OFF button again to turn off the projector. The LAMP indicator lights bright and the READY indicator turns off. After the projector is turned off, the cooling fans operate (for 90 seconds). During this “cooling down” period, the projector cannot be turned on.
- 3** When the projector has cooled down, the READY indicator lights GREEN again and you can turn projector on. After cooling down completely, unplug the AC power cord.



“Power off?” disappears after 4 seconds.



TO MAINTAIN THE LIFE OF LAMP, ONCE YOU TURN THE PROJECTOR ON, WAIT AT LEAST FIVE MINUTES BEFORE TURNING IT OFF. DO NOT UNPLUG THE AC POWER CORD WHILE COOLING FANS ARE RUNNING OR BEFORE THE READY INDICATOR LIGHTS GREEN AGAIN. OTHERWISE IT WILL RESULT IN SHORTENING THE LAMP LIFE.

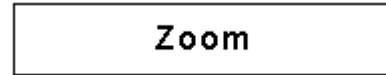
**Note:**

- The projector cannot be turned on during the cooling period with the READY indicator turned off. You can turn it on again after the READY indicator becomes GREEN again.
- When the On start function is “On,” this projector is turned on automatically by connecting the AC power cord to an AC outlet. (See page 41 for the On start function.)
- Continuous use may result in shortening the lamp life. Turn off the projector and rest it for about an hour in every 24 hours.
- The running speed of cooling fans is changed according to the temperature inside the projector.
- If the WARNING TEMP indicator blinks RED, see “WARNING TEMP INDICATOR” on page 46.

**Auto** When the projector cannot recognize a connected signal as PC system provided in this projector, the Auto PC Adjustment function operates to adjust the projector and "Auto" is displayed on the SYSTEM Menu icon. When the image is not provided properly, a manual adjustment is required. (See pages 27–28.)

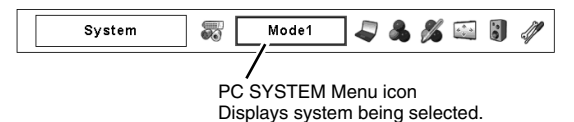
**-----** There is no signal input from the computer. Make sure the connection of a computer and the projector is set correctly. (See "TROUBLESHOOTING" on page 50.)

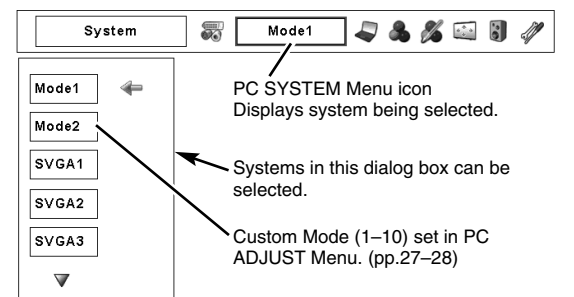

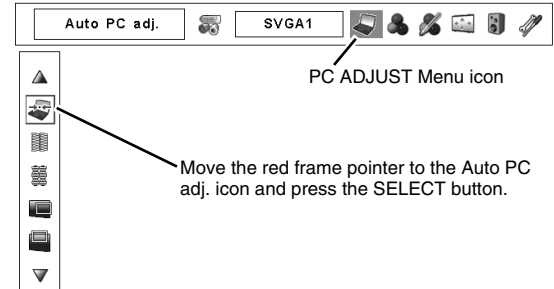

## MANUAL PC ADJUSTMENT

This projector can automatically tune to display signals from most personal computers currently distributed. However, some computers employ special signal formats which may not be tuned by the Multi-Scan system of this projector. If this happens, the projector cannot reproduce proper image and it may be recognized as a flickering; non-synchronized; non-centered; or skewed picture.

Manual PC Adjustment of this projector enables you to precisely adjust several parameters to match with those special signal formats. This projector has 10 independent memory areas to store those parameters manually adjusted, which allows you to recall setting for a specific computer whenever you use it.

Note: The PC ADJUST Menu cannot be operated when the digital signal input on the DVI terminal is selected on PC SYSTEM Menu. (p.25)

## Logo

This function allows you to customize the screen logo with Logo select, Capture, and Logo PIN code lock functions.



### Logo select

This function decides the start-up display as follows:

- User . . . the image you captured
- Default . the factory-set logo
- Off . . . . count-down only



### Capture

This function enables you to capture the image being projected and use it for a starting-up display.

After capturing the projected image, go to the Logo select function and set it to "User." Then the captured image will be displayed when turning on the projector the next time.

To capture the image, select [Yes]. To cancel the Capture function, select [No].

#### NOTE:

- Before capturing an image, select Standard in the IMAGE SELECT Menu to capture proper image. (See pages 29, 33.)
- A signal from a computer can be captured up to XGA (1024 x 768).
- Certain signals may not be captured properly.
- When capturing the image that has been adjusted by the Keystone function, the adjusted data is automatically reset and the projector captures an image without keystone correction.
- When starting to capture a new image, the previously stored image is cleared even if you cancel the capturing.
- Once you exit the Logo Menu after setting the Logo lock to "On," you are required to enter the PIN code every attempting to change the Logo setting.



### Logo PIN code lock

This function prevents an unauthorized person from changing the Logo setting.

- Off . . . . the Logo setting can be changed freely from the Logo function.

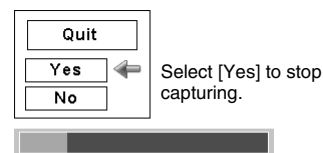
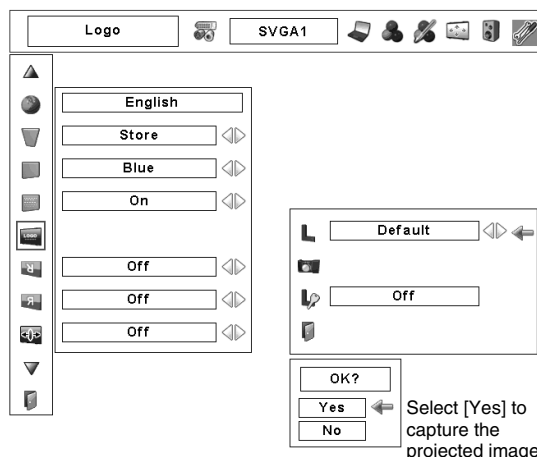

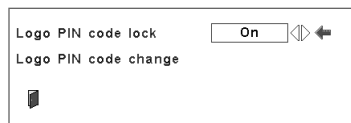

## Menu position

This function is used to adjust the On-Screen Menu display position. When the SELECT button is pressed, the adjustment screen is displayed (arrows appear). Use the POINT UP/DOWN/LEFT/RIGHT button(s) to adjust the position. After making the adjustment, press the SELECT button to return to the Menu screen.

## Power management

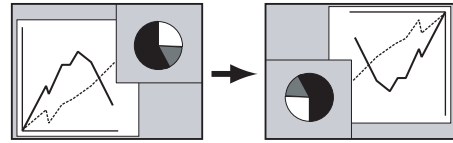
For reducing power consumption as well as maintaining the lamp life, the Power management function turns off the projection lamp when the projector is not used for a certain period.

If the input signal is interrupted and no button is pressed for more than 30 seconds, the timer display with “No signal” appears on the screen to start the countdown. The countdown time can be set between 1 and 30 minutes.

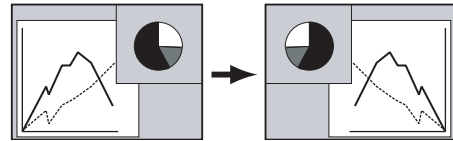

- Be sure to turn the projector off properly (see “TURNING OFF THE PROJECTOR” on page 21). If the projector is turned off in the incorrect sequence, such as unplugging the AC power cord before completing the cool-down etc., the On start function does not operate properly.



## Lamp control

This function allows you to change the brightness of the screen.

- . . . . brightness according to the input signal.
- . . . . normal brightness.
- . . . . lower brightness reduces the lamp power consumption and extends the lamp life.



## Remote control

The eight different remote control codes (Code 1–8) are assigned to this projector: the factory-set, initial code (Code 1) and the other seven codes (Code 2 to Code 8). This switching function prevents interference from other remote controls when several projectors or video equipment next to each other are operated at the same time. For example, when operating the projector in “Code 7”, the code for both the projector and the remote control must be switched to “Code 7.”

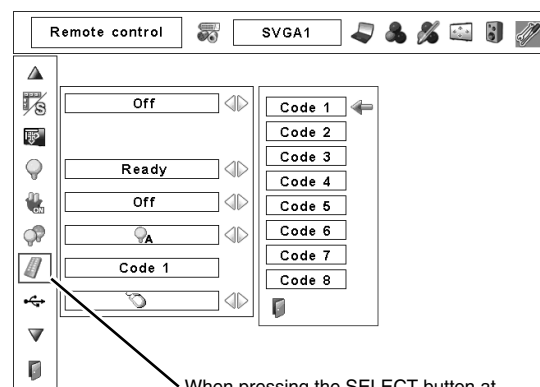

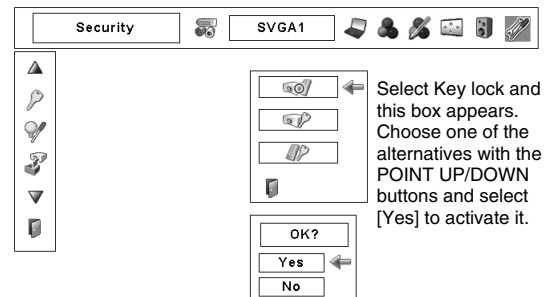

## PIN code lock

This function prevents the projector from being operated by an unauthorized person and provides the following settings for security options.

- Off . . . . the projector is not locked with the PIN code.
- On1 . . . requires to enter the PIN code every time turning on the projector.
- On2 . . . requires to enter the PIN code to operate the projector once the power cord is disconnected; as long as the AC power cord is connected, the projector can be operated without a PIN code.

Whenever you change the PIN Code Lock setting or the PIN code (the four-digit number), you are required to enter the PIN code. "1234" is set as the initial PIN code at the factory.

### To Enter a Logo PIN code

## WIRELESS MOUSE

Remote control is not only able to operate this projector but also functions as a wireless mouse for most personal computers. The MOUSE POINTER, DRAG ON/OFF button, and two CLICK buttons are used for wireless mouse operation.

The Wireless mouse function is available only when the PC mouse pointer is displayed on the screen.

### INSTALLATION

To use the remote control as a wireless mouse for a computer, installation of a mouse driver (not supplied) is required. Make sure that the mouse driver is properly installed on your computer and that the mouse port (or USB port) of the computer is activated.

- 1 Connect the mouse port (or USB port) of your computer to the CONTROL PORT (or USB connector) of this projector with the Control cable (or USB cable). (See pages 12–13 for connection.)
- 2 Turn on the projector first, and then turn your computer on. If the computer is switched on first, the Wireless mouse function may not work properly.

Note: When your computer has no mouse port, connect the Serial port of your computer to the Control port of the projector with the Control cable for Serial port (supplied).

### OPERATING WIRELESS MOUSE

When controlling the PC mouse pointer, use the MOUSE POINTER, DRAG ON/OFF button, LEFT CLICK button, and RIGHT CLICK button on the remote control.

#### MOUSE POINTER

Used to move the PC mouse pointer. The pointer moves to the direction you are pressing.

#### LEFT CLICK button

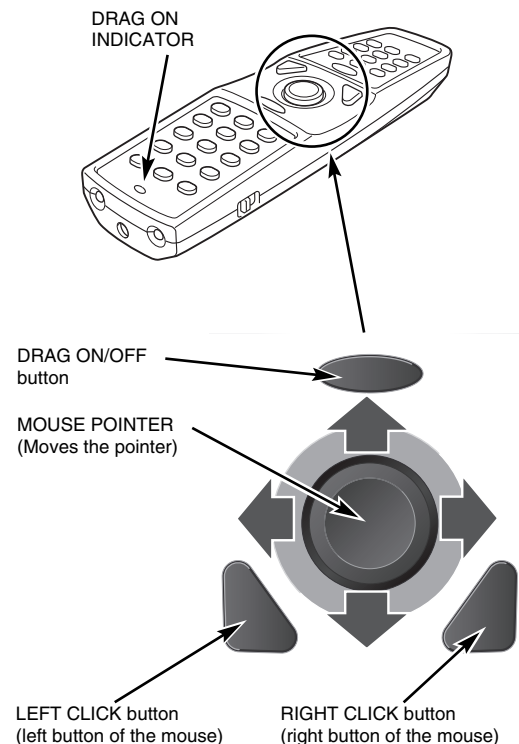
This button has the same function as the left button in a PC mouse. To drag a selected screen object, hold down this button and press the MOUSE POINTER.

#### RIGHT CLICK button

This button has the same function as the right button in a PC mouse.

#### DRAG ON/OFF button

Use this button and the MOUSE POINTER to drag a selected screen object. Press and release the DRAG ON/OFF button, then the DRAG ON INDICATOR lights green and the remote control is in Drag mode. Use the MOUSE POINTER to drag an screen object. Press and release the DRAG ON/OFF button again or press any other button to drop the object.



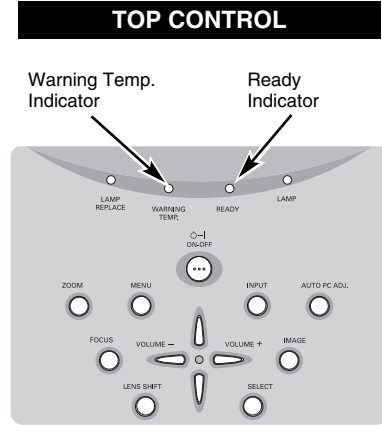
# MAINTENANCE

## WARNING TEMP. INDICATOR

The Warning Temp. indicator blinks red to let you know the internal temperature of the projector exceeds a normal level. If the temperature goes up further, the projector will be turned off automatically and the Ready indicator goes out. (The Warning Temp. indicator continues blinking.) After the cooling-off period, the Ready indicator lights on again and the projector can be turned on by pressing the POWER ON-OFF button on the top control or the remote control. When you turn on the projector, the Warning Temp. indicator goes out.

If the Warning Temp. indicator is still blinking, check the following matters:

- The ventilation slots of the projector may be blocked. In such a case, reposition the projector so that the ventilation slots are not obstructed.
- The air filters may be clogged with dust particles. Clean them by following the section "AIR FILTER CARE AND CLEANING" on the next page.
- If the WARNING TEMP. indicator remains on after performing above checks, the cooling fans or internal circuits may be malfunctioning. Contact the service station.



### When both of the Warning Temp. and Ready indicators are blinking:

When the projector detects an internal problem, it shuts down automatically and both the Warning Temp. and Ready indicators start blinking. In this condition, the projector cannot be turned on even if you press the POWER ON-OFF button on the top control or remote control. If this happens, unplug and reconnect the AC power cord, and then turn on the projector again to check the operation. If the projector shuts down again or cannot to be turned on, internal checking and repair is required. Unplug the AC power cord and contact the service station.

## AIR FILTERS CARE AND CLEANING

Air filters help prevent dust from accumulating on the optical elements inside the projector. To whatever extent the air filters become clogged with dust particles, the cooling fans' effectiveness is reduced, which may result in an internal heat build-up and adversely affect the life of the projector. Therefore, for appropriate care and use of the projector, regular cleaning of the air filters is necessary.

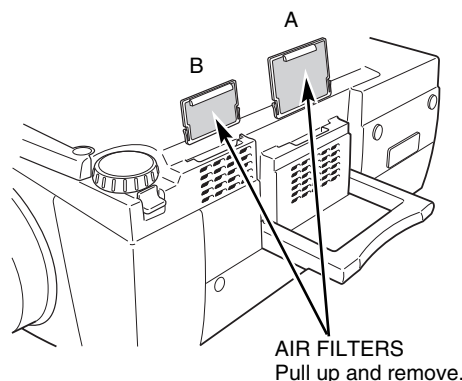
How often the air filters should be cleaned really depends upon the environment in which the projector is being operated. As a rough guide, under a normally clean operating environment, the air filters should be cleaned approximately every 200 hours of use. However, if the projector is being operated in a somewhat dusty or smoky environment, the air filters should be cleaned more often; for consistently good projector operation and performance, timely cleaning of the air filters is a very important factor. When appropriate, clean the air filters following the steps below.

- 1** Turn off the projector and unplug the AC power cord from an AC outlet.
- 2** Turn over projector and remove the air filters by pulling the latches upward.
- 3** Clean the air filters with a brush or rinse them softly. When rinsing the air filters, dry them well.
- 4** Replace the air filters properly. Make sure that the air filters are fully inserted to the projector.



### CAUTION

Do not operate the projector with the air filters removed. Dust may accumulate on the LCD Panel and projection mirror degrading the picture quality. Do not put anything into the air intake vents. It may result in malfunction of the projector.



**NOTE:** If the dust cannot be removed by cleaning, it is probably time to replace the air filters with new ones. Please consult your dealer.

### RECOMMENDATION

**We recommend avoiding dusty/smoky environments when operating the projector. Usage in these environments may cause a poor image quality.**

When using the projector under dusty or smoky conditions, dust may accumulate on a lens, liquid crystal panels, or optical elements inside the projector. Such condition may degrade the quality of the projected image.

When the symptoms above are noticed, contact your authorized dealer or service station for proper cleaning.

## CLEANING PROJECTION LENS

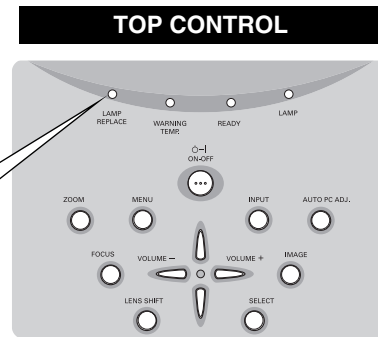
Follow these steps to clean the projection lens:

- 1** Turn off the projector and unplug the AC power cord from an AC outlet.
- 2** Apply a non-abrasive camera lens cleaner to a dry soft cleaning cloth. Avoid using an excessive amount of cleaner. Abrasive cleaners, solvents, or other harsh chemicals might scratch the surface of the lens.
- 3** Gently wipe with the cleaning cloth over the projection lens.
- 4** When the projector is not in use, put the lens cap.

# LAMP REPLACEMENT

When the projection lamp of this projector reaches its end of life, the LAMP REPLACE indicator lights yellow. If this indicator lights yellow, replace the projection lamp with a new one promptly.

This indicator lights yellow when the projection lamp reaches its end of life. Replace the projection lamp with a new one promptly.



## CAUTION

Allow the projector to cool for at least 45 minutes before you open the lamp cover. The inside of the projector can become very hot.



## CAUTION

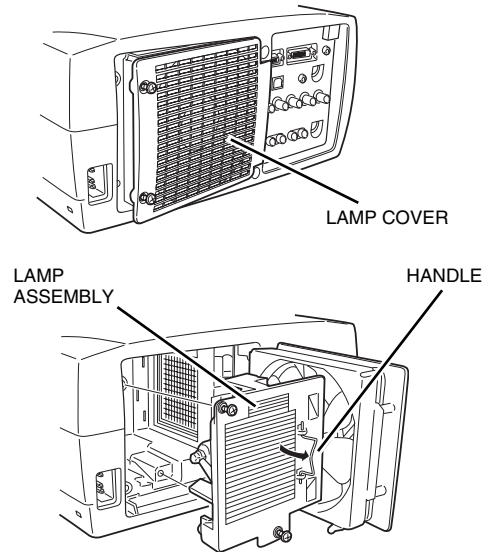
For continued safety, replace with a lamp assembly of the same type. Do not drop the lamp assembly or touch a glass bulb! The glass can shatter and may cause injury.

Follow these steps to replace lamp assembly.

- 1** Turn off the projector and unplug the AC power cord. Allow the projector to cool for at least 45 minutes.
- 2** Loosen the two (2) screws with a screwdriver and open the lamp cover.
- 3** Loosen the two (2) screws with a screwdriver and pull out the lamp assembly by using the built in handle.
- 4** Replace the lamp assembly with a new one and tighten the two (2) screws. Make sure that the lamp assembly is set properly. Put back the lamp cover and tighten the two (2) screws.
- 5** Connect the AC power cord to the projector and turn on the projector.
- 6** Reset the Lamp replacement counter (refer to "LAMP REPLACE COUNTER" on the next page).

**NOTE:**

- Do not reset the Lamp replacement counter when the projection lamp is not replaced.

## LAMP REPLACE COUNTER

Be sure to reset the Lamp replacement counter after the lamp assembly is replaced. When the Lamp replacement counter is reset, the LAMP REPLACE indicator stops lighting.

- 1 Turn the projector on and press the MENU button to display the On-Screen Menu. Press the POINT LEFT/RIGHT buttons to move the red frame pointer to the SETTING Menu icon
- 2 Press the POINT UP/DOWN buttons to move the red frame pointer to Lamp counter and then press the SELECT button. The next box appears.
- 3 Press the POINT UP/DOWN buttons to select Reset and then press the SELECT button. The “Lamp replacement counter reset?” appears. Move the pointer to [Yes] and then press the SELECT button.
- 4 Another confirmation dialog box appears and select [Yes] to reset the Lamp replacement counter.

**NOTE:**

- Do not reset the Lamp replacement counter until after the projection lamp is replaced.

## LAMP HANDLING PRECAUTIONS

This projector uses a high-pressure lamp which must be handled carefully and properly. Improper handling may result in accidents, injury, or create a fire hazard.

- Lamp lifetime may differ from lamp to lamp and according to the environment of use. There is no guarantee of the same lifetime for each lamp. Some lamps may fail or terminate their lifetime in a shorter period of time than other similar lamps.
- If the projector indicates that the lamp should be replaced, i.e., if the LAMP REPLACE indicator lights up, replace the lamp with a new one IMMEDIATELY after the projector has cooled down. (Follow carefully the instructions in the LAMP REPLACEMENT section of this manual.) Continuous use of the lamp with the LAMP REPLACE indicator lighted may increase the risk of lamp explosion.
- Lamp may explode as a result of vibration, shock or degradation as a result of hours of use as its lifetime draws to an end. Risk of explosion may differ according to the environment or conditions in which the projector and lamp are being used.

### IF A LAMP EXPLODES, THE FOLLOWING SAFETY PRECAUTIONS SHOULD BE TAKEN.

If a lamp explodes, disconnect the projector's AC plug from the AC outlet immediately. Contact an authorized service station for a checkup of the unit and replacement of the lamp. Additionally, check carefully to ensure that there are no broken shards or pieces of glass around the projector or coming out from the cooling air circulation holes. Any broken shards found should be cleaned up carefully. No one should check the inside of the projector except those who are authorized trained technicians and who are familiar with projector service. Inappropriate attempts to service the unit by anyone, especially those who are not appropriately trained to do so, may result in an accident or injury caused by pieces of broken glass.

## TROUBLESHOOTING

Before calling your dealer or service center for assistance, check the items below once again.

1. Make sure you have connected the projector to your computer or video equipment as described in “CONNECTING PROJECTOR” on pages 12–14.
2. Check the cable connection. Make sure that all computers, video equipment, and power cords are properly connected.
3. Make sure that all power is switched on.
4. If the projector still does not produce an image, restart your computer.
5. If an image still does not appear, disconnect the projector from your computer and check your computer monitor’s display. A problem may be noticed with your graphics controller rather than with the projector. (When you reconnect the projector, be sure to turn the computer and monitor off before you turn on the projector. Turn on equipment in the order of the projector and computer.)
6. If a problem still persists, check the following solutions.

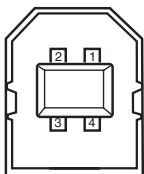
