


#### 5. Heat





# **Moisture Condensation**

To prevent the unit from possible damage, do not use the unit for at least 2 hours when there is an extreme or sudden change in temperature.








Operating the remote control

When operating the remote control from behind the projector, the laser light is reflected on the projecting surface and may travel a shorter distance to reach the projector depending on the shape and material of the projecting surface. Preparations

# Dry-cell batteries

- Before using the batteries, be sure to observe the Safety Precautions described in previous pages.

- If the remote control stops working, or if its range decreases, replace all the batteries with new ones.

# The remote control


- Turn off the ON/OFF switch of the remote control when not in use or to store in baggage.
- The remote control may fail to operate if the infrared remote sensor is exposed to bright sunlight or fluorescent lighting.
- · Do not drop or bang.
- Do not leave in hot or humid locations.
- · Do not get wet or place on top of wet objects.
- · Do not take apart.
- In rare cases, ambient conditions could impede the operation of the remote control. If this happens, point the remote control at the main unit again, and repeat the operation.

# Operating a computer using the remote control

A computer can be operated using the projector's remote control. This function is available on any computer with the Windows® 98/98SE, Windows® Me, Windows® 2000, or Windows<sup>®</sup> XP OS, that is equipped with a USB port which can support USB1.1 (The mouse remote control receiver is also supported on OS 9 or OS X for the Macintosh). However, please note that Toshiba does not guarantee the operation of all computers.

# Connecting a computer

Connect the mouse remote control receiver (supplied) to a computer.



The remote control may fail to operate if the mouse remote control receiver is exposed to bright sunlight or fluorescent lighting.

In such a case, change position or direction of the mouse remote control receiver and retry.

# Operating a computer

Operate remote control's buttons towards the mouse remote control receiver.

Moving the mouse pointer

Press the mouse control button in the direction you wish the mouse pointer to move. then press.

• To left click Press the L-CLICK button.

• To right click


Press the R-CLICK button.

To drag and drop

Holding down the L-CLICK button, move the mouse control button until the mouse pointer is over the desired location, then release the L-CLICK button.






# **Placement Styles**

As shown in the figures below, this device can be placed in 4 different styles. The factory setting is "floor-mounted front projection." Set the [Projection mode] in the **Default setting** menu **p.41**, in accordance with your needs.





# WARNING

Always obey the instructions listed in IMPORTANT SAFETY INSTRUCTIONS when placing the unit. Attempting to clean/replace the lamp at a high site by yourself may cause you to drop down, thus resulting in injury.

If you wish to mount the projector on the ceiling, be sure to ask your dealer to do so. Mounting the projector on a ceiling requires special ceiling brackets (sold separately) and specialized knowledge. Improper mounting could cause the projector to fall, resulting in an accident. If the projector is ceiling-mounted, install the breaker for turning off the power in case of anomaly. Let

everyone involved with the use of the projector know that fact.





# Connection

# **Before connection**

- Read the owner's manual of the device you are connecting to the projector.
- Some types of computer cannot be used or connected to this projector. Check for an RGB output terminal, supported signal p.87, etc.
- Turn off the power of both devices before connecting.
- The figure is a sample connection. This does not mean that all of these devices can or must be connected simultaneously. (Dotted lines mean items can be exchanged.)




### Notes

- The COMPUTER 1 IN terminal functions identically to the COMPUTER 2 IN terminal.
- The MONITOR OUT terminal outputs signals from the COMPUTER 1 IN terminal or the COMPUTER 2 IN terminal, or outputs Y/PB/PR as selected with the INPUT button. If no input is selected, the MONITOR OUT terminal outputs the input signals last selected for each input terminal
- Signals are output from MONITOR OUT terminal even in standby mode. However, from AUDIO OUT terminal, no audio signal is output.
- A computer monitor cannot accept Y/PB/PR signals correctly.
- The AUDIO IN terminal doubles for devices connected to COMPUTER terminals 1 and 2.
- When an AUDIO OUT terminal is connected, sound is not output from the projector speaker.
- Output volume of AUDIO OUT terminal can be adjusted by the VOL button.
- Moving pictures played back on computers using DVD software may appear unnatural if it is projected with this projector, but it is not a malfunction.





- Do not block the air intake or exhaust. Doing so could cause a fire due to internal overheating.
- Do not place your hands, face, or other objects near the air exhaust. Doing so could cause burns, deform/break the object.

# Notes

- The start-up screen will disappear after a moment. You can dismiss the start-up screen before this by performing any operation. You can also configure the start-up screen not to appear via the **Display setting** menu **p38**.
- The first time you use the projector after purchase, after the start-up screen disappears, the start menu is displayed p.26.
- When [Key lock] is [On], the operation buttons of the projector do not work p.43 .
- When [**Password**] is [**On**], enter password then the start-up screen is displayed after the Password entry screen disappears **p.33**.


# Turning the power off

# Press the ON/STANDBY button.

A message appears on the screen, confirming that you wish to shut off the power. This message will disappear after a moment. (This operation is no longer valid after the message disappears.)

# Press the ON/STANDBY button again.

The screen turns off, but the internal cooling fan continues to operate for a short while. Then, the projector goes into standby mode.





During cooling, the LAMP indicator flashes. In this state, the power cannot be turned back on.

If you are in a hurry, there is no problem with unplugging the power cord in this state.

After the LAMP indicator goes off, the FAN indicator keeps lighted and the cooling fan continues to operate for a short while, in order to expel excess internal heat.

# Note

• The projector consumes about 9W of power in standby. We recommend that you unplug the power cord if you will not be using the projector for an extended period. (When [Wireless standby] is [On], it consumes about 12W during standby.)

# PRECAUTION

• If the power cord is unplugged before cooling is complete, give the lamp time (about 5 minutes) to cool before plugging it back in. If the lamp overheats, it may fail to light.

# **Basic operations**

# Turn on the power.

Turn on the power by following the instructions in "**Turning the power on**" p.24 The Easy setup function works to automatically adjust the screen focus and correct the keystone distortion. If RGB signals are input, auto-setting is also made. This operation does not take place when [Easy setup] in the Default setting menu is [Off] p.41.

### Select the language and the lamp power (When using the first time).

When the projector is used for the first time after purchase, the start menu for language (to display the menus and messages on the screen) and lamp power selection and configuration is displayed in English. (If the screen is out of focus, adjust it according to the step  $(\mathbf{G})$ .)

(1) Use the **O** or **O** button to select the desired language and press the 🕘 button. Message for setup confirmation is displayed in a selected language.

Then, the menu for lamp power selection and configuration is displayed. It is automatically set as Standard. To change the setting, follow the step (2).

(2) Use the **O** or **O** button to select the lamp power and press the **O** button.

The lamp power, if selected, will be toggled without pressing the **2** button. The display automatically disappears in a few seconds.

### Notes

- When the projector is turned on the next time, the start menu does not appear upon startup. However, if [Reset all] is executed from the Default setting menu p.41, the start menu will be displayed the next time when the power is turned on.
- The language can also be set via the **Display setting** menu **p.38** and Lamp power via the **Default setting** menu p.41.
- · This owner's manual assumes that English has been selected.

# Activate the connected device.

Turn on and start the connected device such as a computer.

# Press the INPUT button.

An image of the connected equipment is projected.

Each time you press the INPUT button, it switches to the input of the connected equipment that is outputting video signals.

# Notes

- When [Auto input search] is set to [Off] in the Default setting menu p.41 (factory setting is [On]), the **Input select** menu appears if you press the **INPUT** button **p.42**.
- If no signal is being output from the connected equipment, pressing the INPUT button does not change the input and "There is no other input signal." will appear.

# O Projector placement angle adjustments

The placement angle and the height of the projected image can be adjusted by the foot adjuster.

(1) Lift up the front of the projector to the desired angle, then press the foot adjuster release button.


The foot adjuster extends. Release the button to lock the position.

- (2) To fine adjust the angle, twist the foot adjuster.
- (3) To adjust the horizontal angle, use the right and left tilt adjusters.
- To stow the foot adjuster, hold up the projector while pressing the foot adjuster release button, then slowly lower the projector.

### Notes

- While a text entry screen (e.g., the Password entry screen) is displayed, the remote control's FOCUS and ZOOM buttons function as numeric keys, and therefore cannot be used to adjust the screen size or focus. In such a case, use the FOCUS and ZOOM buttons on the projector to make adjustment or retry after quitting the text entry screen.
- Note that lamp characteristics may rarely cause the brightness to fluctuate slightly.
- A lamp is consumable item. If used for extended periods, images will appear dark, and the lamp could burn out. This is characteristic of a lamp, and is not malfunction. (The lifetime of the lamp depends on conditions of use.)
- The DMD<sup>™</sup> is made using extremely advanced technology, but there may be black spots (pixels that do not light) or bright spots (pixels that are constantly lit) on the panel. Please note that these are not malfunctions.
- Although this projector supports a wide range of RGB signals p.87, any resolutions not supported by this projector (XGA) will be expanded or shrunk, which will affect image quality slightly. To view high-quality images, it is recommended that the computer's external output should be set to XGA resolution.
- With some models of computer having LCD displays or the like, displaying images simultaneously on the projector and the monitor's display may prevent the images from displaying properly. If this happens, turn off the computer's LCD display. For information on how to turn off the LCD display, see the owner's manual of your computer.
- If no signal is being input from the connected equipment or signal input is stopped while projecting, the "No signal" will appear.
- If a signal not supported by the projector is input, the "Unsupport signal" will appear.
- If an unavailable operation button is pressed, the X icon will appear.

# Using handy features

#### Easy setup

This function automatically adjusts the screen focus and corrects the keystone distortion (Auto focus and Auto keystone functions).

- Press the EASY SETUP button on the projector or on the remote control. The icon 🥺 will appear during processing.
- Before pressing the EASY SETUP button, be sure to set Auto focus and select the items to be adjusted by Auto adjustment p.41.
- With [Power on Easy setup] in the Default setting menu set to [On], the screen focus is automatically adjusted and the keystone distortion (vertical) is corrected when the power is turned on.

(Automatic keystone distortion correction and auto-setting are selected by factory setting.)

 The following screen appears during Auto focus.

#### Note

· A message appears on the screen if the auto-adjustment fails.

#### Precautions

- Auto focus function is effective for projection distance from 1.1 m (30 inch at maximum zoom) to 5.5 m (150 inch at maximum zoom).
- Depending on the room temperature and brightness as well as the projected image condition and the projecting surface condition and material, the adjustment may not be properly made. When such a case arises, adjust the screen focus manually.
- Improper adjustment or correction may also occur if the AF sensor is obstructed or the window gets dirty. Remove the obstruction and clean the AF sensor window in such a case.
- After performing Easy setup at power-on, the projected image may appear to be out of focus after a while. In that case, perform Easy setup again.
- · Avoid impact on the projector. Otherwise, Auto focus may not work properly.

This function automatically adjusts the projector settings such as sampling phase, frequency, screen position, and clamp for each type of the input signal by using simple operations.

#### Remote Control

#### Press the remote control's AUTO SET button.

For computer input, the reaction will appear during processing. You can set as well by selecting [Auto setting] in the Image adjustment menu p.36

#### Notes

- The image may not be projected or auto adjustment/setting may not be performed correctly for input signals other than those supported by the projector p.87, p.88.
- If auto setting fails adjustment, adjust manually with [Position] in the Image adjustment menu p.36).

# Correcting the keystone distortion







- The 👰 icon will appear while freeze is in effect.
- Other operation will also release the freeze.
- Even if an image is frozen on the projector, the pictures are running on the video or other equipment.
- If you use this function on commercial video software, broadcast or cable-broadcasting except for the purpose of your private viewing and listening, it may infringe the copyright protected by the copyright laws.

# Password function

When the password function is added and [**Password**] is set to [**On**], image projection requires an entry of the preset password at power-on.

To add the password function, perform the following procedure:

(The password function, once added, cannot be deleted. Set [Password] to [Off] if you do not want to use it after addition.)

- Notes: This password is different from that for the wireless LAN.
  - When adding the password function, switch the input to other than Wireless or USB.

# How to add password

- ${\ensuremath{\textcircled{0}}}$  Set the projector to the operating status or the standby mode.
- Select and hold the **O** button until the LAMP, TEMP, and FAN indicators light in orange.



# Detailed description

#### [Screen size]

- If "Thru" is selected for [Screen size], portions exceeding the native resolution ( $1024 \times 768$  pixels) will not appear on the screen. Note that for RGB signals with clock frequency 140MHz or lower, all input pixel signals are sampled. However, if the clock speed is higher than this, the RGB pixel signal is thinned before sampling.
- The wireless/USB input can be selected only when the wireless LAN USB adapter is connected to the projector. Selecting the "Full" mode allows the display in the same aspect ratio with that for the video signal.

<**Power on Easy setup**>: Switches **on/off** the Easy setup operation when the power is turned on.

#### Note

 The Easy setup automatically switches off when [Ceiling] or [Rear ceiling] is selected for projection mode.

#### [Lamp power]

When [Lamp power] is set to [Low], the screen becomes a little darker, but the cooling fan noise gets quieter.

#### [Fan mode]

Setting [**Fan mode**] to [**High**] increases the cooling fan speed. (The cooling fan noise gets louder.) Set this option to use the projector, for example, at high altitude (over 1,500 meters above sea level).

• Do not set Fan mode to [High] when using the projector at a lower altitude.

#### [Wireless standby]

When [Wireless standby] is set to [On], the wireless LAN is switched to the standby state as the projector enters standby. While the wireless LAN is in standby, the projector can be powered on using the remote control function of the Wireless Utility. When [Wireless standby] is set to [Off], the projector cannot be powered on with the remote control function of the Wireless Utility.

#### [Remote control]

Sets a remote control code from 4 types. You can set each code respectively for up to 4 projectors. The factory setting is [1].

To switch codes, set the same code for the projector and the remote control. A remote control code is applied after the setting is done.

• You cannot operate the remote control if the codes of the projector and the remote control do not match.

#### Remote control code setting for remote control

Remove the battery cover and set the same **remote control code switch** as the projector. **p.17** (Use a screwdriver with thin tip to set.)



#### [Key lock]

Protect from operating errors by locking on the control panel buttons of the projector. (The remote control operations are available.)

Control panel operations are locked after the setting is done, and accordingly operation with the control panel buttons is disabled.

- To release the key lock, set the [Key Lock] to [Off] using remote control. Pressing the [RETURN] button on the projector for 10 seconds also sets the [Key Lock] to [Off]. (In the latter case, the LAMP, TEMP, and FAN indicators light in orange for 3 seconds.)
- When Wireless or USB input is selected, the [Key Lock] cannot be set to [Off] with the [RETURN] button on the projector.

# How to use the USB terminal

The supplied wireless LAN USB adapter allows users to connect the projector to a computer via wireless communication, which supports IEEE802.11b/g wireless LAN  $\fbox{0.46}$ . (Toshiba does not guarantee the operation of all computers that are IEEE802.11b/g compliant.)


This projector can connect with a commercial USB memory and a USB memory card reader that are USB2.0 compliant, a digital camera or the like and display the JPEG files saved in those devices. **p.54** 

(Toshiba does not guarantee the operation of all USB 2.0-compliant devices.) To connect or disconnect a USB device, use the following procedure:

# ■ Connecting USB device

#### Plug the USB device.

Make sure the orientation is correct then plug the USB device in until it stays securely.



# ■ Disconnecting USB device

(1) Switch the input to Wireless/USB and press the MENU button twice to display the Setting display (2), then select and run Unplug device in the Control setting menu.

The processing for disconnecting a USB device starts.

- ② The message "Safe to remove the USB device" appears on the screen.
- **③ Unplug the USB device.**

Be sure to perform the above operations. Disconnecting a USB device during operation may cause a malfunction or data corruption.

#### Notes

- The projector may not recognize a supported USB device. In such a case, unplug the USB device then re-plug it.
- The USB terminal does not support the supplied mouse remote control receiver or a commercial mouse controller.
- A USB hub is also not supported.

#### Precaution

• Disconnecting the power plug while the USB device is operating may cause a malfunction or data corruption.

# Setting up the wireless LAN

#### Functions

The following functions are available via wireless communications, when the wireless LAN USB adapter and dedicated **Wireless Utility** software **p.63** included with this projector are used.

Note: A wireless LAN USB adapter except the supplied one (or recommended by Toshiba) does not work with this product. Please ask your dealer about the available wireless LAN USB adapter.

#### 1) Displaying a computer's screen via the projector


The computer's desktop screen can be sent, as well as the screens of a variety of software applications, to the projector for display. Likewise, the sound being played on a computer can also be sent to the projector.

- 2) Displaying an image saved on a computer via the projector JPEG files can be sent to the projector for display. Likewise, the sound being played on a computer can also be sent to the projector.
- **3) Displaying an image file saved on a computer via the projector** Video files can be sent to the projector for image display. As well, the sound stored in the video file is sent to the projector.
- 4) Operating the projector by means of a computer Some of the same functions available from the remote control can be performed.

#### ■ Communication mode

This projector supports both Ad hoc and Infrastructure Communication modes.


#### Ad hoc communication mode



This is transmission mode to communicate between wireless LAN equipment. This mode is applicable, for example, to a presentation in the conference room, as it requires no other facilities. This function can only be used if the projector is in range of the computer's wireless signals.

Toshiba does not guarantee the converage of the radio wave in the form of figures. The converage varies depending on the performance of each wireless LAN equipment, existence of obstacles or other wireless LAN equipment used by nearby working groups, etc. The coverage is generally estimated on the assumption that wireless LAN equipment be used in an unobstructed office or conference room.

#### Infrastructure communication mode



A mixed wireless and wired LAN can be created via wireless LAN access points. (Communication between wireless LAN devices is also allowed.) Connecting to the rest of the world via a wired LAN or the Internet generally requires a high level of security.

Use the appropriate transmission mode for your network environment.


# ■ Caution when using the wireless LAN functions

The Wireless LAN in this unit uses the 2.4 GHz waveband. If there is a similar wireless LAN in the area, or a wireless device using the 2.4 GHz waveband, or a microwave oven, the communication efficiency of this apparatus will be reduced, and may become unusable, but it is not a fault. If this happens, check an area away from the current location that will not cause radio interference to medical, industrial and public equipment, and change to it, or stop using the unit.

#### • Details on individual items

#### • [Easy Connect (USB memory)]

This feature allows users to easily connect the projector to a computer over wireless networks, without making **Network settings** via **Wireless Utility**.

#### • [Network settings]

#### <Mode>

Your projector is set to **Ad hoc** in the factory. Change the setting if you want to use the projector in **Infrastructure** mode.

#### <Standards>

When you have set **Mode** to **Ad hoc**, **Standards** must be set. The **Standards** is set to **IEEE802.11g** when purchased, and may not work normally depending on the wireless LAN terminal to be connected with. In that case, change the **Standards** to **IEEE802.11b**.

#### <Channel>

Usually, you do not have to set this item. If a network group having the same **SSID** already exists in the projector's coverage, the channel is changed automatically to the channel of that network group.

- Note 1: If a set channel is in bad connections for wireless connection, try the other channels to avoid the effects of radio waves to select the one in possibly the best communication conditions.
- Note 2: To communicate in Ad hoc mode with a computer that cannot change the channel, start up the projector before the computer.

#### <SSID>

This is an ID code for connecting to specific individuals over a wireless LAN. This may also be called "**Network group**" or "**Network name**". Please read the following carefully.

- Note 1: The **SSID** is set to **TDPJ** when shipped from the factory. If you leave this setting as it is, security may be compromised due to access by a third party using the "**Wireless Utility**" within the projector's possible communication area. Before using the projector, therefore, be sure to set **SSID** to a character string different from the default.
- Note 2: When you use the Ad hoc communication mode, if there is a similar **SSID** network group (for example TDPJ, TDPJ1, TDPJ2, etc.) in the possible communication area, it is possible that your projector name will not be displayed in the **Wireless Utility** projector list column. If this is the case, set **SSID** to a completely different character string.

#### <Encryption>

Enable or disable encryption for security purposes.

Note: **Encryption** is factory-set to **Off**. If you use the projector with this setting left unchanged, security may be compromised due to access by a third party using the Wireless Utility within the projector's coverage. Before using the projector, therefore, be sure to set **Encryption** to **On**.

#### <Network authentication>

When you have set **Encryption** to **On**, the authentication method for wireless LAN must be set. By default, **Open** is selected. Select a method identical to that of the wireless LAN terminal to be connected with.

#### <Key index>

When you have set **Encryption** to **On**, Key index must be set. By default, "1" is selected. Select a key index identical to that of the wireless LAN terminal to be connected with.

Note: Since the range of key index varies by product type (1 to 4 or 0 to 3), make settings with attention.

#### <WEP key>

When you have set **Encryption** to **On**, the **WEP key** must be set. For use at an encryption level of **64-bit**, specify a string of 5 arbitrary characters or a string of ten characters in hexadecimal notation. For use at the **128-bit** level, specify a string of 13 arbitrary characters or a string of 26 characters in hexadecimal notation.

Note: Alphabetic characters (A to F, a to f) used in hexadecimal notation are case insensitive; the uppercase characters and their lowercase equivalents are handled to be identical.

The higher the number of bits, the stronger the encryption, and hence the harder it will be for a third party to decipher your communications. However, setting higher encryption levels may slow down communication speed. To set the highest security level, specify a **128-bit** WEP key. For higher security, avoid using a word found in a dictionary and change the key sometimes.

Set the following item if you have set the communication mode to Infrastructure.

#### <DHCP>

If you set **DHCP** to **Use**, the IP address of the projector is assigned automatically by the DHCP server. If your network environment does not assign IP addresses automatically, set **DHCP** to **Not use**, then set the following items **IP address**, **Subnet mask** and **Gateway** manually.

#### <IP address>

When **DHCP** is set to **Not use**, consult with your network administrator for the settings below and set the **IP address** manually.

An IP address is a unique number assigned to a terminal. The format is a string of four dot-separated three-digit numbers. (Example: 111.112.xxx.xxx)

#### <Subnet mask>

A subnet mask is used to determine what subnet the IP address assigned to a terminal belongs to. (Example: 255.255.xxx.xxx)

#### <Gateway>

This value specifies the device, such as a router, to be used to access servers outside the network. It is identified by the IP address. (Example: 111.112.xxx.xxx)

#### • [Setting initialization]

This item resets the wireless LAN settings to their factory defaults.

#### • [Projector name]

This can be used to identify projectors when communicating with multiple projectors, or if there is a possibility that another person who is out of communication range will be using the same projector. It is recommended this is set to prevent wrong transmission.

#### • [WEB browser]

#### <Browser authentication>

Browser authentication and Password are factory-set to Off and no string, respectively. You should set them as soon as possible.

#### <Password>

If you have forgotten your password, set it again using the menu on the main unit.

#### Computer settings

Refer to instruction manuals of your computer or wireless LAN adapter to perform the following settings.

- Select Ad hoc (for some wireless LAN adapters, this is Peer-to-Peer Group).
- [Channel] : You may need to set channels depending on the wireless LAN adapter being used. Make the [Channel] settings identical to the computer settings.
- Set **SSID** (for some types of wireless LAN adapter, use **Network name** instead) as the same as projector's **SSID** (at factory shipment, this is set to **TDPJ**).
- If Encryption, Network authentication, Key index and WEP key are set on the projector, set to the same values.

#### Note

 The Easy Connect utility p.68 allows users to easily connect the projector to a computer over wireless networks, without making network setting. For Easy Connect support, the computer requires a wireless LAN environment that is NDIS5.1 compliant. Refer to the user's manual supplied with the wireless LAN adapter or the wireless LAN embedded computer for more information. This projector can read JPEG files stored in a USB memory and display them on the screen.

This allows you to give presentations without a computer, create an advertising screen board using the slideshow function, and more. (The projector cannot reproduce animation effects such as those produced by Microsoft<sup>®</sup> PowerPoint<sup>®</sup>.)

### ■ USB memories

#### The USB terminal

The USB terminal of the projector is USB2.0 compliant and can connect with a USB memory, a USB memory card reader/writer, a digital camera and the like.

#### USB devices whose operation has been verified

Toshiba does not guarantee the operation of all USB devices.

- Toshiba USB memory : U2A series (64MB, 128MB, 256MB,512MB)
- Toshiba USB memory : U2B series (128MB, 256MB)
- SanDiskUSB memory : SDCZ2 series (128MB,256MB,512MB,1GB)
- SanDiskUSB memory :SDCZ4 series (128MB,256MB,512MB)
- Toshiba USB card R/W : IPCS078A
- SanDiskUSB card R/W : SDDR-88-J70

This projector does not support Toshiba IPCS060A series USB memory. Note that this projector does not support all USB memories, USB card readers/writers, and digital cameras.

#### Backing up data

Toshiba recommends that you back up the data saved in the USB memory before use. (Toshiba assume no liability for losses incurred by data lost through the use of this projector.)

### ■ JPEG files

- (1) Supported file extensions are jpg, JPG, jpeg, and JPEG.
- (2) The maximum number including both folders and files is 512.
- (3) Some JPEG files are not supported by this projector.

The limitations in (3) above can be alleviated by converting the JPEG file with the supplied **JPEG Conversion Tool p.74** software application.

# Setting slideshow options

Slideshow is the function to display the JPEG image files stored in a USB memory one after another at fixed time intervals. When switching from one image to the next, Slideshow can add various display effects (transitions) to them. If you select **Slide Show**, the following items can be set.

#### • Details on individual items

#### • [Auto. demo]

- **On**: A slide show begins automatically when a USB memory is inserted and input switches to Wireless/USB. At this time, the JPEG files in the root directory of the USB memory are used in the slide show. If the input has already been switched to Wireless/USB, the slide show begins automatically when the USB memory is inserted.
  - To pause the slide show, press the 🕘 button. Pressing this button again allows the slide show to begin. To stop the slide show, press the **RETURN** button.
- **Off:** A list of thumbnails will be displayed when connecting with a USB memory or the like. Select a desired JPEG file from the list.

### Note

• The Auto Demo function does not work when using a USB memory card reader to mount multiple media.

#### • [Interval]

You can set the display interval of time (in seconds or minutes) for slide shows to be played automatically.

[Display effect]

When playing a slide show, the projector can give various display effects or transitions to each slide being displayed.

The transitions available are listed below:

None

Display each slide normally.

Wipe

Display the next slide gradually upward (Wipe  $\uparrow$ ), downward (Wipe  $\downarrow$ ), to the left (Wipe  $\leftarrow$ ), or to the right (Wipe  $\rightarrow$ ), over the current slide.

Dissolve

Display the next slide gradually in a certain fixed block pattern over the current slide. Cover

Display the next slide as sliding upward (Cover  $\uparrow$ ), downward (Cover  $\downarrow$ ), to the left (Cover  $\leftarrow$ ), or to the right (Cover  $\rightarrow$ ), over the current slide.

Checker

Display the next slide gradually from the left using checkered blocks over the current slide.

Zoom/Rotate zoom

Display the next slide by enlarging it gradually, either straight from the center (Zoom) or while turning it starting from the center (Spin zoom), over the current slide.

Belt wipe

Display the next slide gradually in stripes from both sides, over the current slide.

Blind

Display the next slide, as if it opened like a window blind, over the current slide.

• [Play icon]

The slideshow icon can be displayed.

Standard

The projector handles the slideshow icon as follows depending on the "On/Off" setting of **Icon** on the projector's menu.

- Icon On: The projector displays the icon upon the start of playing a slide show and turns it off after a few seconds.
- Icon Off: The projector does not display the icon.
- Continuous

The projector keeps the icon displayed during the slide show.

#### [Thumbnail display]

Select the form of a thumbnail list.

- All: Displays a thumbnail preview of JPEG files, and if any JPEG files exist in the folder displays the leading thumbnail image.
- File: Displays only a thumbnail image of JPEG files. The thumbnail image of the JPEG files in the folder is not displayed.







# Plug a USB memory.

Plug a USB memory according to the procedure in "Connecting USB device" **p.45**. The projector starts loading data from the USB memory and displays a thumbnail list on the screen.



# Searching for a target file

- Use the 🖸 🖓 🔇 🕒 buttons to move the orange frame over the desired file or folder.
- If there are multiple pages of thumbnails, click the 
   button on the bottom row to go to
   the next page, and the 
   button on the top row to go to the previous page.
- To open a folder, move the orange frame to the desired folder and press the 🕘 button. You can navigate down up to 5 levels using the same procedure. Pressing the **RETURN** button returns you to the next or other upper level folder.

# Oisplaying slides

- Pressing the button with a file selected displays the image in that file only in fullscreen view on the screen as a slide. Pressing the button enters the automatic play mode.
- To return to the thumbnail list display screen, press the **RETURN** button.

#### Changing slides

Pressing the **C b** buttons with a slide displayed changes slides.

(C: previous slide; C: next slide. These buttons are not available during an automatic play.)

# 6 Rotating a slide

Pressing the 🔿 🕥 buttons with a slide displayed rotates the slide 90 degrees. The rotation information is preserved as long as you remain in the current folder.

(C: Rotate left; C: Rotate right. These buttons are not available during an automatic play.)

#### Notes

- The thumbnail display order and slide order goes in order from shortest file name to longest. If two file names have the same number of characters, they are ordered numerically if numbers are used in the file name, and alphabetically otherwise.
- It is possible to give presentations without using a computer by converting presentations created with Microsoft<sup>®</sup> PowerPoint<sup>®</sup> into JPEG files using the JPEG Conversion Tool, and storing them on a USB memory. p.74

Note, however, that functions such as animation effects and hyperlinks cannot be used, so it should be tested before the actual presentation.

- Freeze function can not be used during slide show or automatic play.
- · A slide show is terminated when the input is switched to another.
- With some USB memories, the slideshow playback may stop in the midway. When encountering such a phenomenon, use another USB memory because the current one is not supported.

<Status notification>: Sends alarm information to the specified E-mail address when an error such as lamp blowout occurs.

<SMTP server>: Set an IP address of the SMTP server.

<Port number>: Enter a port number of the SMTP server.

<Destination address>: Enter within 60 characters. (Example: xxx@xxx.xxx)

#### Note

• The Email function does not support transmission to the SMTP server that requires authentication.

# Checking the projector status

# Status display

To check the current status of the projector, select **Status display** in step 2 in **"Projector settings" .** The following items of information will then be displayed.

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# Installing the applications

If you will use the wireless LAN USB adapter function, install the application on the supplied CD-ROM onto your computer.

### Application Types and Major Functions

#### Wireless Utility

This application is used for wireless connections. Use it to send the images from the computer's screen to your projector, and display on the screen. In addition, also use it to transmit the sound being played on a computer to the projector.

#### JPEG Conversion Tool

Use to convert JPEG and other files into a format that can be displayed as a slide show using a USB memory.


#### How to install

In the supplied CD-ROM, select the Wireless Utility folder and the JPEG Conversion Tool folder, and run setup.exe, respectively. Follow the instructions on your computer screen.

During the installation, a dialog box may appear with the message "Digital Signature Not Found" and the prompt "Do you want to continue the installation?". Click on the [Yes (Y)] button to continue the installation.

When installation is finished, the following shortcuts will appear on your computer's desktop:

#### How to uninstall

Select [Start Menu]  $\rightarrow$  [Settings]  $\rightarrow$  [Control Panel]  $\rightarrow$  [Add/Remove Programs], and remove Toshiba Data Projector and JPEG Conversion Tool from currently installed programs.

- Your computer screen may temporarily go out during installation, but it is not an errors.

# Using the Wireless Utility

# Displaying a computer's screen via the projector

### Caunch the Wireless Utility software application.

When the Wireless Utility launches, the Screen Image transmission mode window appears on the computer screen.

To switch to the Screen Image transmission mode window from another mode, click on the Screen Image icon 🔄 .

# Select Transmission mode.

Click on Update automatically or Update manually. See step (7) for the meanings of Update automatically and Update manually.

# Click on the Advanced button.

The Screen Image: Advanced Settings dialog appears. Set the dialog as shown below, as necessary.

Interruption

Check the No Interruptions checkbox to prevent other computers from interrupting the projector, for example, during presentation in the Update automatically mode.

Window

Select the Place in Tasktray at the start of transmission checkbox to iconify the Wireless Utility and place it in the computer's tasktray when transmission initiated.

To display the window, double click on this icon, or right click and select **Open** from the popup menu. Even with the Wireless Utility window minimized, you can use the pop-up menu to stop or resume transmission as described in step (2) and later

Transmission Mode (Image)

Selecting High quality improves the quality of the projected image, but lowers communication speed. Selecting High speed has the opposite effect.

Transmission Mode (Sound)

Check the Transmit sound to a projector (Only when connected with only one projector) checkbox to transmit the sound being played on a computer to the projector. Note: The sound can be sent when only one projector is selected.

# Select the screen image you wish the projector to display.

#### Select Desktop

The computer screen image is transmitted as-is. **Select application window** 

Select a running application (e.g. Microsoft<sup>®</sup> PowerPoint<sup>®</sup>), and send that application's window only.

The desktop and a list of running applications are displayed. Select the desired application from this list. (If the desired application is not on the list, launch it. Note that if too many applications are running, it will consume the computer's resources, which could slow communication speed.)


# To halt transmission from Update automatically, click on the stop button.

If the **Wireless Utility** icon has been placed in the tasktray, double click on the icon to display the window, then halt transmission, or right click on the icon, and halt transmission.

# Notes

- It may not be possible to transmit the images from movie player or other video applications.
- When using "**Update automatically**", the transmitted image refresh rate depends on the performance of the computer you are using and the surrounding radio wave environment.
- The projector screen may have a few differences from the computer screen.
- If you selected application window in step <a>O</a>, if that application is not active (in use), the image may not be correctly displayed by the projector.
- The projector ID is the MAC address of the wireless LAN USB adapter inserted into the projector.
- Playing contents protected by copyright is not supported.
- To transmit sound, press the end of button then launch the application that plays the contents including the sound.

# How to use the JPEG Conversion Tool

The JPEG Conversion Tool converts JPEG files not supported by the projector, image files in other formats, Microsoft® PowerPoint® files, and the like into JPEG files supported by the projector. The JPEG files converted with this tool can be displayed by sending them using the wireless LAN p.65, or saving them on a USB memory.

Drag the Image Quality Settings slider to the left or right to set the image guality of the file after conversion. Lower values create smaller files, but lower the image quality. (It is not possible to restore the quality of an image after it has been lowered.)

### ■ Converting an image file

This converts JPEG files using compression formats not supported by the projector, Windows® metafiles (wmf), and bitmapped files (bmp) into JPEG files.

- (1) In the Conversion Method field, select Converting image file. (Status on launch)
- (2) In the File settings field, click on the Browse button for **Original Image File Name.** The **Open** dialog box appears.
- (3) In the **Open** dialog box:
  - (a) Specify the location of the file to be converted; and
  - (b) In the **Files of Type** field, click on the **v** button to select the file format. A list of files of that format appear in the Open dialog box.
- (4) In the Open dialog box, select the file to convert, then click on the Open button.
- (5) In the JPEG Conversion Tool window, in the File settings field, select Browse for File name after conversion. The Save As dialog box appears.
- (6) In the Save As dialog box:
  - (a) Specify the location in which to save the converted file:
  - (b) Enter a file name of up to 8 characters in the File Name field; and
  - (c) Press the Save button.
- (7) (a) In the JPEG Conversion Tool, click on the Conversion button.
  - (b) A confirmation dialog box opens. Click Yes. The computer converts the file. When it finishes a message appears informing you that a "JPEG file has been created".

# Converting files created with Microsoft<sup>®</sup> PowerPoint<sup>®</sup>

This process provides presentations without using a computer by converting presentation files created with Microsoft® PowerPoint® into JPEG files, storing them on a USB memory, and displaying them in a slide show.

- To use this conversion mode. Microsoft<sup>®</sup> PowerPoint<sup>®</sup> must be installed on the computer.
- Only static images are supported by this process. Animation and audio are not supported.

Presentation files created with Microsoft® PowerPoint® usually consist of several slides. For this reason, the tool creates a folder with the name specified in step (5), below, and file for each slide is created in the folder (starting with slide001.jpg).

- (2) In the File settings field, click on the Browse button for PPT File Name.

The **Open** dialog box appears.

(3) In the **Open** dialog box:

(4) In the JPEG Conversion Tool window, in the File settings field, click on the Create button for New folder name.

The Folder create dialog box appears.

- (6) In the Folder create dialog box, click on the Selection button. The Browse Folders dialog box appears.



# About lamp

The product's light source is a mercury lamp that lights at increased internal pressure. Be sure to fully understand the following characteristics of the lamp and handle it with extreme care.

- The lamp may burst with a loud noise due to impact or deterioration, or fail to light at the expiration of its life.
- How long it takes before the lamp bursts or the life expires may vary greatly by lamp. Some may burst shortly after first use.
- Burst is likely to happen if the lamp is used after the replacement period has elapsed.
- When the lamp bursts, the broken pieces of glass may get inside the product or be released outside from the openings for ventilation.
- When the lamp bursts, a slight amount of mercury gas enclosed in the lamp along with glass dust may be released from the openings for ventilation.

#### ■ Immediately replace the lamp when a sign appears on the screen.

- · When the replacement time approaches, a message will appear on the screen.
- The risk of burst will increase if the lamp is continuously used without being replaced.
- Frequently check the used hours and prepare spares when the replacement time approaches. (Refer to "Status display". p.44)

#### When the lamp is broken

- If glass components, including a lamp and a lens, should break, handle the broken pieces with care to avoid injury and contact your dealer for repair service.
- In the event of lamp burst, unplug the product from the wall outlet, leave and completely ventilate the room. Then, thoroughly clean the area around the projector and discard any edible items placed in that area.
- When the lamp bursts, consult a doctor if glass dust or mercury gas gets into your eyes or you breathe it.

# Lamp replacement

A lamp is consumable supplies. If used for extended periods, images will appear dark, and the lamp could burn out. This is characteristic of a lamp, and is not malfunction. (The lifetime of the lamp depends on condition of use.) If this happens, replace it with a new one.

# 

- If the projector is mounted on the ceiling, it is recommended to use your Toshiba dealership when the lamp has to be exchanged. Uncovering the lamp while the projector is mounted on a ceiling may lead to a danger of damage from falling pieces of glass if the lamp is broken. Besides, working at high elevations can also be hazardous. Do not attempt to replace the lamp by yourself.
  When replacement is required, be sure to use:
- When replacement is required, be s TLPLW9 for TDP-TW95 or TLPLW10 for TDP-TW100 (sold separately).

- If you have been using the projector, the lamp will be very hot, and may cause burn injuries. Wait for the lamp to cool (for longer than 1 hour) before replacing it.
- If the lamp should break, please handle with care to avoid injury due to broken pieces and contact your dealer for repair service.



- The Lamp time item in the Status display menu indicates the time of lamp use (as a rough guide). **D.44**
- It is recommended that the lamp be replaced after 2,000 hours of use. When [Lamp time] reaches 2,000 hours, the C icon and a message will appear. (After 2,000 hours, they will appear when the power is on at the first time every 100 hours.) This display disappears when you press the D button.
- Attach the lamp cover correctly so that it is not loose. If it is not attached correctly, the projector may fail to be powered on or the lamp may fail to come on.
- Always replace the lamp with a new one.
- The lamp is made out of glass. Do not touch the glass surface with your bare hands, bang it, or scratch it. (Dirt, jolts, scratches and the like could break the lamp.)

### Used Lamps

This projector's lamps contain trace amounts of environmentally harmful inorganic mercury. Be careful not to break used lamps, and dispose of them in accordance with local regulations.

# Lens and main unit cleaning


• Request cleaning and maintenance of a ceiling-mounted unit from your projector dealership. Attempting to clean/replace the lamp at a high site by yourself may cause you to fall down, thus resulting in injury.

### Lens cleaning

- Clean the lens with a commercially available blower and/or lens cleaner.
- The lens is easily scratched, so do not rub it with hard objects, or strike it.

# ■ Main unit cleaning

- Clean the main unit after unplugging the power cord.
- Wipe dirt off the main unit gently with a soft cloth.
- Do not wipe the main unit with a damp cloth. Doing so may allow water to get inside, resulting in an electric shock or failure.
- Do not use benzene, thinner and the like as they may deform or discolor the unit or damage the paint surface.
- When using a chemically treated cloth, follow the precautions included with the cloth.




