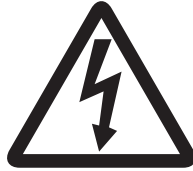

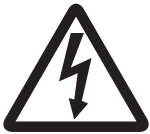

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# Important safeguards

Please read all these instructions regarding your projector and retain them for future reference. Follow all warnings and instructions marked on the projector.

1. Read instructions  
All the safety and operating instructions should be read before the appliance is operated.
2. Retain instructions  
The safety and operating instructions should be retained for future reference.
3. Warnings  
All warnings on the appliance and in the operating instructions should be adhered to.
4. Instructions  
All operating instructions must be followed.
5. Cleaning  
Unplug this projector from the wall outlet before cleaning it. Do not use liquid aerosol cleaners. Use a damp soft cloth for cleaning.
6. Attachments and equipment  
Never add any attachments and/or equipment without the approval of the manufacturer as such additions may result in the risk of fire, electric shock or other personal injury.
7. Water and moisture  
Do not use this projector near water or in contact with water.
8. Accessories  
Do not place this projector on an unstable cart, stand, tripod, bracket or table. Use only with a cart, stand, tripod bracket, or table recommended by the manufacturer or sold with the projector. Any mounting of the appliance should follow the manufacturer's instructions and should use a mounting accessory recommended by the manufacturer.



An appliance and cart combination should be moved with care. Quick stops, excessive force and uneven surfaces may cause the appliance and cart combination to overturn.

9. Ventilation  
Slots and openings in the cabinet are provided for ventilation, ensuring reliable operation of the projector and to protect it from overheating. Do not block these openings or allow them to be blocked by placing the projector on a bed, sofa, rug, or bookcase. Ensure that there is adequate ventilation and that the manufacturer's instructions have been adhered to.

10. Power sources  
This projector should be operated only from the type of power source indicated on the marking label. If you are not sure of the type of power, please consult your appliance dealer or local power company.
11. Power-cord protection  
Power-supply cords should be routed so that they are not likely to be walked on or pinched by items placed upon or against them. Pay particular attention to cords at plugs, convenience receptacles, and points where they exit from the appliance. Do not put the power cord under a carpet.
12. Overloading  
Do not overload wall outlets and extension cords as this can result in a fire or electric shock.
13. Objects and liquids  
Never push objects of any kind through openings of this projector as they may touch dangerous voltage points or short-out parts that could result in a fire or electric shock. Never spill liquid of any kind on the projector.
14. Servicing  
Do not attempt to service this projector by yourself. Refer all servicing to qualified service personnel.
15. Damage requiring service  
Unplug this projector from the wall outlet and refer servicing to qualified service personnel under the following conditions:
  - (a) If the power-supply cord or plug is damaged.
  - (b) If liquid has been spilled, or objects have fallen into the projector.
  - (c) If the projector does not operate normally after you follow the operating instructions. Adjust only those controls that are covered by the operating instructions. An improper adjustment of other controls may result in damage and may often require extensive work by a qualified technician to restore the projector to its normal operation.
  - (d) If the projector has been exposed to rain or water.
  - (e) If the projector has been dropped or the cabinet has been damaged.
  - (f) If the projector exhibits a distinct change in performance - this indicates a need for service.
16. Replacement parts  
When replacement parts are required, be sure that the service technician has used replacement parts specified by the manufacturer or parts having the same characteristics as the original part. Unauthorized substitutions may result in fire, electric shock or other hazards.
17. Safety check  
Upon completion of any service or repair to this projector, ask the service technician to perform safety checks determining that the projector is in a safe operating condition.

## ***Important safeguards (continued)***

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### **WARNING:**

#### **Unplug immediately if there is something wrong with your projector.**

Do not operate if smoke, strange noise or odor comes out of your projector. It might cause fire or electric shock. In this case, unplug immediately and contact your dealer.

#### **Never remove the cabinet.**

This projector contains high voltage circuitry. An inadvertent contact may result in an electric shock. Except as specifically explained in the User Manual do not attempt to service this product by yourself. Please contact your dealer when you want to fix, adjust or inspect the projector.

#### **Do not modify this equipment.**

It can lead to fire or electric shock.

#### **Do not keep using the damaged projector.**

If the projector is dropped and the cabinet is damaged, unplug the projector and contact your dealer for inspection. It may lead to fire if you keep using the damaged projector.

#### **Do not face the projector lens to the sun.**

It can lead to fire.

#### **Use correct voltage.**

If you use incorrect voltage, it can lead to fire.

#### **Do not place the projector on uneven surface.**

Place the projection on a leveled and stable surface only. Please do not place equipment on unstable surfaces.

#### **Do not look into the lens when it is operating.**

It may hurt your eyes. Never let children look into the lens when it is on.

#### **Do not touch the air outlet grille and bottom plate, which become hot.**

Do not touch them or put other equipment in front of the air outlet grille. The air outlet grille and bottom plate, when heated, may cause injury or damage to other equipment. Also, do not set the projector on the desk which is easily affected by heat.

#### **Do not look into the air outlet grille when projector is operating.**

Heat, dust, etc. may blow out of it and hurt your eyes.

#### **Do not insert your fingers in the space between the lens and the cabinet.**

The lens may shift causing injury or damage to the projector.

#### **Do not block the air inlet and outlet grilles.**

If they are blocked, heat may be generated inside the projector, causing deterioration in the projector quality and fire.

#### **Do not use flammable solvents (benzene, thinner, etc.) and flammable aerosols near the projector.**

Flammable substances may ignite causing fire or breakdown because the temperature inside the projector rises very high while the lamp is illuminating.

#### **Do not use the projector with condensation on it.**

It can lead to breakdown or other failure.

#### **Place of installation**




For safety's sake, refrain from setting the projector at any place subjected to high temperature and high humidity. Please maintain an operating temperature, humidity, and altitude as specified below.

- Operating temperature: between +41°F (+5°C) and +95°F (+35°C)
- Operating humidity: between 30% and 90%
- Never put any heat-producing device under the projector so that the projector does not overheat.
- Do not attach the projector to a place that is unstable or subjected to vibration.
- Do not install the projector near any equipment that produces a strong magnetic field. Also refrain from installing near the projector any cable carrying a large current.
- Place the projector on a solid, vibration free surface; otherwise it may fall, causing serious injury to a child or adult, and serious damage to the product.
- Do not stand the projector; it may fall, causing serious injury and damage to the projector.
- Slanting the projector more than  $\pm 10^\circ$  (right and left) or  $\pm 15^\circ$  (front and rear) may cause trouble or explosion of the lamp.
- Do not place the projector near air-conditioning unit, heater, or humidifier to avoid hot or moist air to the exhaust and ventilation hole of the projector.

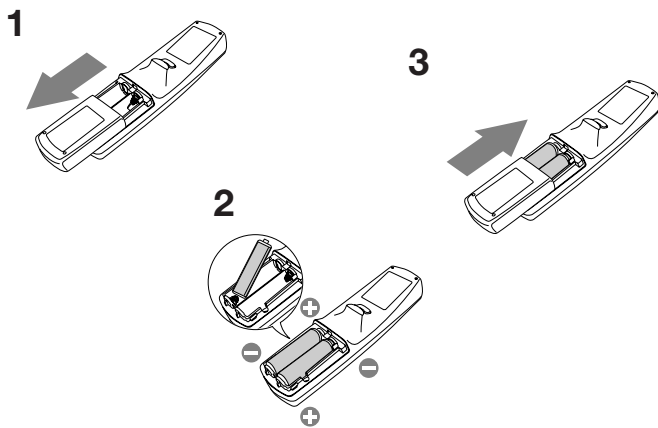

- The attached power cords are to be used exclusively for this product. Never use them for other products.

### Inserting the batteries into the remote control



### Inserting the batteries into the remote control

1. Remove the rear lid of the remote control.
2. Check the polarity (+), (-) of the batteries, and set them correctly, inserting their (-) side first.
  - If the battery is inserted from the (+) side first, inserting the (-) side is difficult because the coil spring end hits on the battery side. If the battery is forced to insert in this way, the outer label of the battery may get ripped and it may cause a short-circuit and heating.
3. Attach the rear lid.

### Important:

- Use two size-AA batteries (R6).
- Replace the 2 batteries with new ones when the remote control is slow to operate.

### Removing the batteries from the remote control

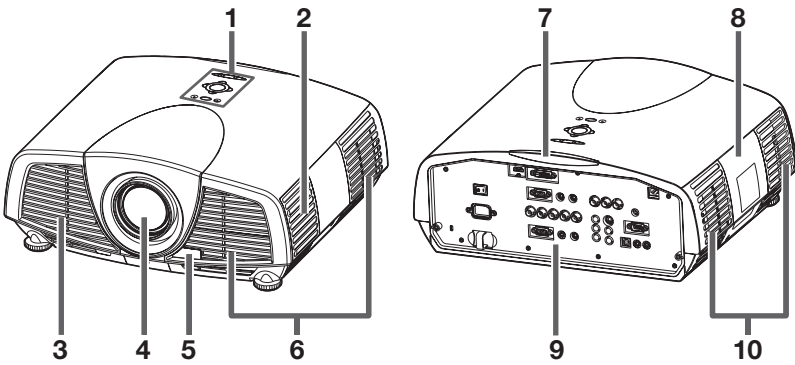
Remove the back lid of the remote control and take out the batteries.

### Caution:

- Use of a battery of wrong type may cause explosion.
- Only Carbon-Zinc or Alkaline-Manganese Dioxide type batteries should be used.
- Dispose of used batteries according to your local regulations.
- Batteries may explode if misused. Do not recharge, disassemble, or dispose of them in fire.
- Be sure to handle the batteries according to the instructions.
- Load the batteries with its positive (+) and negative (-) sides correctly oriented as indicated on the remote control.
- Keep batteries out of reach of children and pets.
- Remove the batteries, if the remote control is not used for a long time.
- Do not combine a new battery with an old one.
- If the solution of batteries comes in contact with your skin or clothes, rinse with water. If the solution comes in contact with your eyes, rinse them with water and then consult your doctor.

- Pressing the LASER button emits a laser beam. Even when you keep holding down the LASER button, it is emitted only one minute. To keep emitting it longer, press the LASER button again.
- You can disable the LASER button to prevent laser radiation due to misuse of the button.

### How to disable the LASER button

While holding the LASER button down, press the ▼ button 3 times.

### How to enable the LASER button

While holding the LASER button down, press the ▲ button 3 times.

- Whenever the batteries are replaced, the LASER button is enabled.

## About the laser beam

This remote control is a Class 2 laser product. (Max. output: 1 mW, Wavelength: 620-640 nm)  
Beam Divergence: 6 m distance about 10.0 mm x 10.0 mm (±6.0 mm)

### Caution:

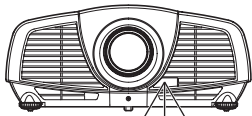
- Pressing the LASER button on the remote control emits a laser beam. Do not look into the laser beam directly. Do not point the laser beam at anyone. Looking at the laser beam directly may damage eyesight.
- Use of controls or adjustments or procedures other than those specified herein may result in hazardous radiation exposure.
- This remote controller cannot be repaired.



# Using the remote control

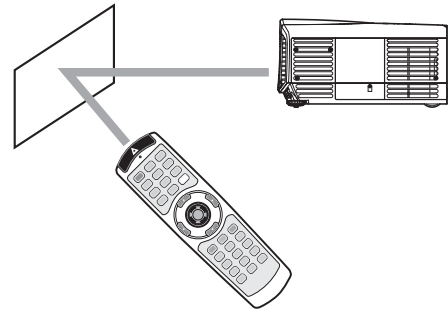
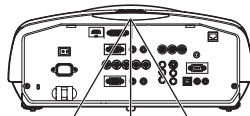
## Operational range of the remote control

Front of projector



Operate the remote control within a distance of 10 m (30 feet) from the projector, pointing the light beam at the remote control photo-sensor (front or rear) of the projector.

Rear of projector

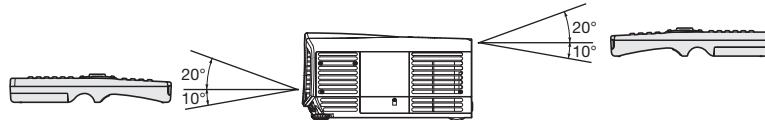


- Keep the remote control photo-sensor out of direct sunlight or fluorescent lamp light.
- Keep the remote control photo-sensor at least 2 m (6 feet) away from fluorescent lamps. Otherwise, the remote control may malfunction.
- If there is an inverter-operated fluorescent lamp near the remote control, the remote control operation may become unstable.
- When you use the remote control too close to the remote control sensor, the remote control may not work correctly.

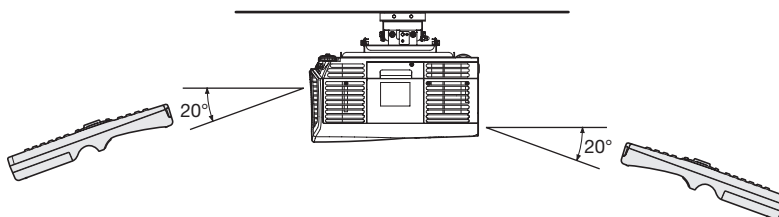
When operating the remote control, keep the distance from the remote control to the projector via the screen within about 5 m (15 feet). The operable range of the remote control, however, depends on the characteristics of the screen.

### Vertical directions

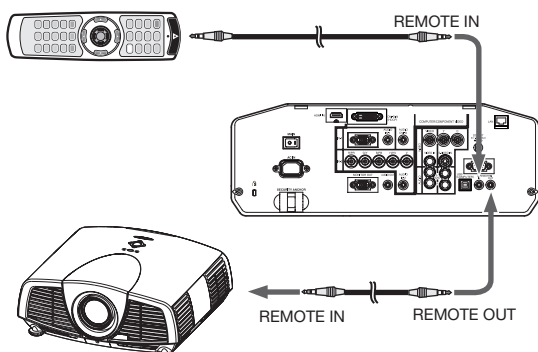


### Vertical directions (ceiling mount)



## Using the wired remote control

Attached remote control for this projector can be used as a wired remote control with remote control cable. Wired remote control is useful for operating in a distance or outside of the operating area.



- For connection, use the pin-pin cable of  $\phi 3.5$  stereo type, which is commercially available. However, some cable may not work correctly.
- When REMOTE OUT terminal on this projector is connected to the REMOTE IN terminal on the other projector, the two projectors can be controlled together by using the remote control.
- When the remote control is connected with remote control cable, it does not work as a wireless remote control.
- When using the wired remote control, the laser beam may be darker. It is normal.

# Setting up your projector

## Setting up the screen

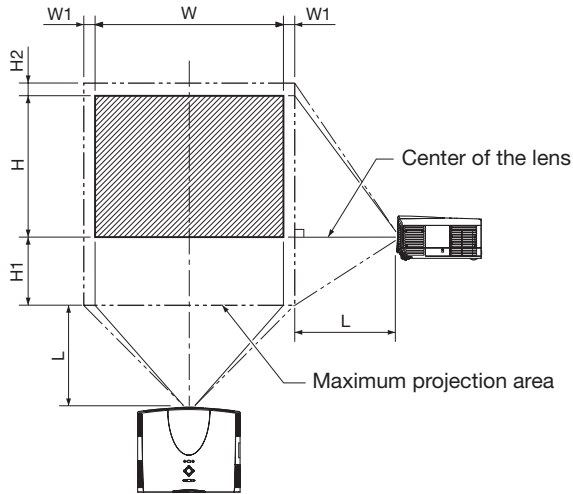
Install the screen perpendicularly to the projector. If the screen can not be installed in such a way, adjust the projection angle of the projector. (See page 11.)

- Install the screen and projector so that the projector’s lens is placed at the same height and horizontal position of the screen center.
- Do not install the screen where it is exposed to direct sunlight or lighting. Light directly reflecting on the screen makes the projected images whitish and hard to view.

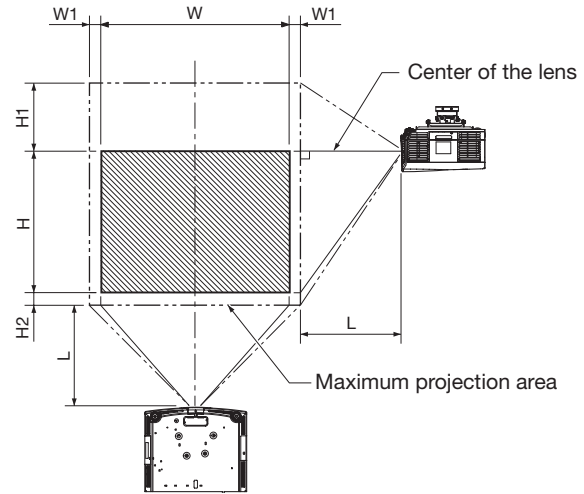

- The above figures are approximate and may be slightly different from the actual measurements.
- The lens shift height and width show distances from the factory default position.

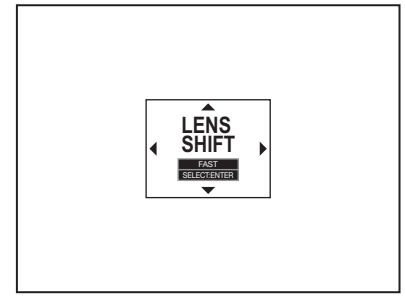
- Depending on the installation conditions, warm air that is emitted from the exhaust vents may flow into the intake vent, causing the projector to display “TEMPERATURE!!” and then stop projecting images.

## Setting up your projector (continued)

### Adjusting the position of the projected image

To adjust the positions of the projector and the screen, use LENS SHIFT button.

1. Press the LENS SHIFT button.
  - The LENS SHIFT menu appears at the center of the screen.
2. Press the ▲, ▼, ◀ or ▶ button to move the image position.
  - When the ▼ button is pressed, the image moves down.
  - When the ▲ button is pressed, the image moves up.
  - When the ▶ button is pressed, the image moves to the right.
  - When the ◀ button is pressed, the image moves to the left.
- When the ENTER button is pressed while the LENS SHIFT menu is displayed, the shift mode can be switched between FAST and STEP. When FAST is selected, the lens shifts in a large amount with the ▲, ▼, ◀ or ▶ button, and it shifts in a small amount when STEP is selected.
- When the LENS SHIFT menu is displayed while no video signal is input to the projector, a crosshatch appears on the entire screen.
- Be careful not to be caught in the opening in the lens while the lens is moving.
- While the lens shift is working, the screen may flicker.



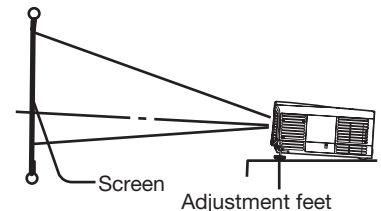
### Correcting skewed or distorted image

For the best projection, project images on a flat screen installed at 90 degrees to the floor. If necessary, tilt the projector using the two adjustment feet on the bottom of the projector.

1. Tilt up the projector to the appropriate angle.
2. Rotate the adjustment feet for fine adjustment.

#### Important:

- Don't transport the projector with its adjustment feet extended. Otherwise the adjustment feet may be damaged.



### When fine streaks are seen on projected images

This is due to interference with the screen surface and is not a malfunction. Replace the screen or displace the focus a little. (See page 16 or 22 for focus adjustment.)

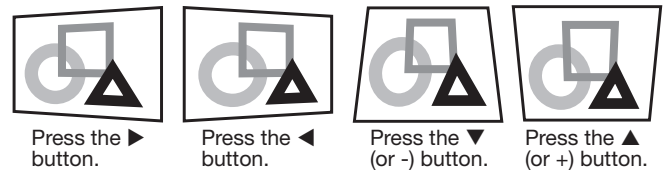
### When projected images are distorted to a trapezoid

When the screen and the projector are not placed perpendicularly to each other, projected images become trapezoidal. If you cannot make the projector and the screen perpendicular to each other by mechanical adjustments, adjust keystone.

#### To adjust keystone:

Press the KEYSTONE button on the projector or the remote control to display KEYSTONE, and adjust the image by pressing the ▶, ◀, ▲ or ▼ button (or VOLUME + or - button on the remote control).

#### Important:

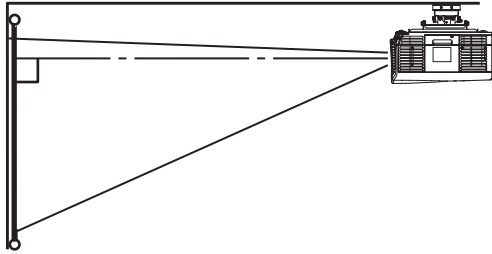
- For proper keystone adjustment results, reset the lens to the factory-adjusted position using LENS SHIFT RESET in the INSTALLATION menu before carrying out keystone adjustment. (See page 30.)
- When the keystone adjustment is carried out, the adjustment value is indicated. Note that this value doesn't mean a projection angle.
- The allowable range of the adjustment value in the keystone adjustment varies depending on the installation conditions.
- When the keystone adjustment takes effect, the resolution decreases. In addition, stripes may appear or straight lines may bend in images with complicated patterns. They are not due to product malfunctions.
- When the keystone adjustment is performed, the displayed image may be distorted.
- Depending on the installation conditions of the projector and the screen, a perfect rectangular image and the proper aspect ratio may not be obtained.
- Noise may appear on the screen during the keystone adjustment because of the type of the video signal being projected and the setting values of the keystone adjustment. In such cases, set the keystone adjustment values in the range where the image is displayed without noise.
- When horizontal and vertical keystone adjustments are performed in combination, the adjustable range becomes narrower than in the case when they are performed separately.
- In the keystone adjustment with the option lens, the proper aspect ratio may not be obtained.

## Setting up your projector (continued)

### Front projection, ceiling mounting

For ceiling mounting, you need the ceiling mount kit designed for this projector. Ask a specialist for installation. For details, consult your dealer.

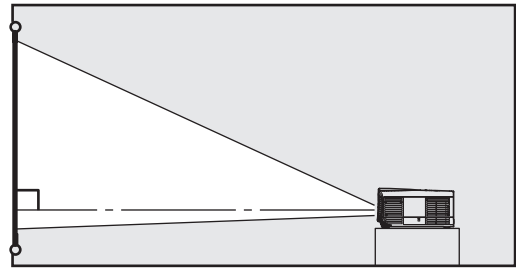
- The warranty on this projector does not cover any damage caused by use of any non-recommended ceiling mount kit or installation of the ceiling mount kit in an improper location.



- When using the projector mounted on the ceiling, set IMAGE REVERSE in the INSTALLATION menu to MIRROR INVERT. See page 30.
- When the projector is mounted on the ceiling, images may appear darker than those projected in the case of tabletop mounting. This isn't a product malfunction.
- Ask your installation specialist to provide a breaker. When you do not use the projector, be sure to shut down the main power by the breaker.
- Do not install the projector where the exhaust vents are exposed to air emitted by an air conditioning. Such installation may cause a breakdown.
- Do not install the projector near a fire alarm because it emits hot air from its exhaust vents.

### Rear projection

Ask a specialist for installation. For details, consult your dealer.



- For rear projection, set IMAGE REVERSE in the INSTALLATION menu to MIRROR. See page 30.

#### Caution:

- Placing the projector directly on a carpet impairs ventilation by the fans, causing damage or failure. Put a hard board under the projector to facilitate ventilation.
- Place the projector at least 50 cm (or 20 inches) away from the wall to prevent the air inlet grille and the air outlet grilles that emit hot air from being blocked.
- Do not use the projector in the following locations and manners, which may cause fire or electric shock.
  - In a dusty or humid place.
  - In a sideways position, or with the lens facing down.
  - Near a heater.
  - In an oily, smoky, or damp place such as a kitchen.
  - In direct sunlight.
  - Where the temperature rises high, such as in a closed car.
  - Where the temperature is lower than +41°F (or +5°C) or higher than +95°F (or +35°C).

#### Important:

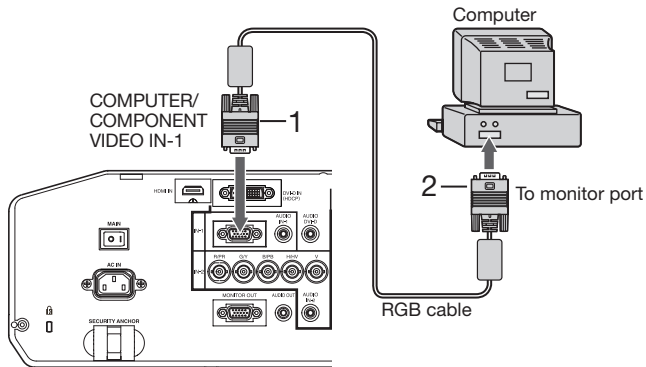
- We don't recommend using the projector at an altitude of 1500 meters or higher. Use at an altitude of 1500 meters or higher may affect the projector's life.

# Viewing computer images

## A. Connecting the projector to a computer

### Preparation:

- Make sure that the power of the projector and that of the computer are turned off.
- When connecting the projector to a desktop computer, disconnect the RGB cable that is connected to the monitor.

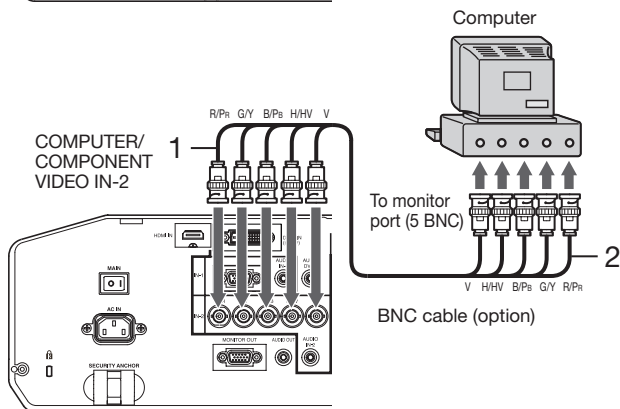


### For analog connection:

(For using the COMPUTER/COMPONENT VIDEO IN-1 terminal.)

1. Connect one end of the supplied RGB cable to the COMPUTER/COMPONENT VIDEO IN-1 terminal of the projector.
2. Connect the other end of the RGB cable to the monitor port of the computer.

- When viewing images supplied from an analog-connected computer, press the COMPUTER 1 button on the remote control.

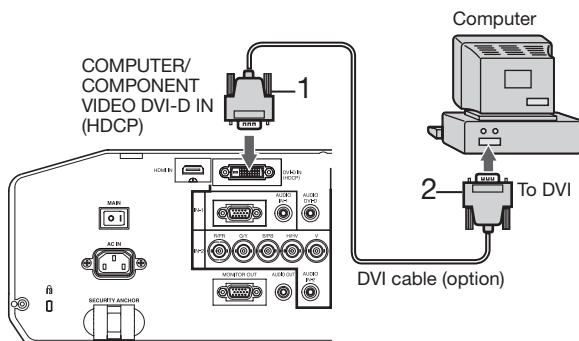


### For analog connection:

(For using the COMPUTER/COMPONENT VIDEO IN-2 terminal.)

1. Connect one end of a commercially available BNC cable to the COMPUTER/COMPONENT VIDEO IN-2 terminal of the projector.
2. Connect the other end of the BNC cable to the 5 BNC terminals of the monitor port of the computer.

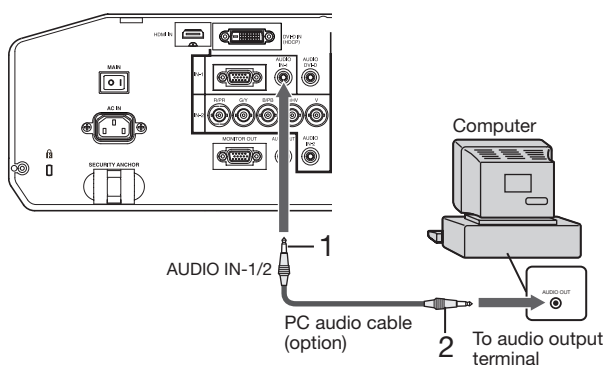
- When viewing images supplied from an analog-connected computer, press the COMPUTER 2 button on the remote control.



### For digital connection:

1. Connect one end of a commercially available DVI cable to the COMPUTER/COMPONENT VIDEO DVI-D IN (HDCP) terminal of the projector.
2. Connect the other end of the DVI cable to the DVI terminal of the computer.

- When viewing images supplied from a digital-connected computer, press the DVI-D(HDCP) button on the remote control.
- Turn on the main power switch of the projector before starting the computer.



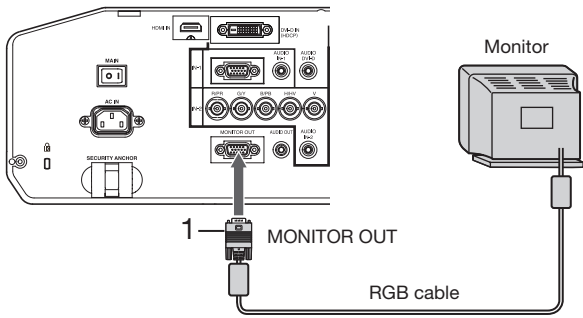
### For audio connection:

1. Connect one end of a commercially available PC audio cable to the AUDIO IN-1/2 terminal of the projector.
2. Connect the other end of the PC audio cable to the audio output terminal of the computer.

- This projector uses stereo pin jack for its audio input. Check the type of the audio output terminal of the connected computer and prepare a proper cable for connection. Some computers don't have the audio output terminal.
- Speaker output is mono.
- No audio is output from the projector's speaker and the AUDIO OUT terminal during power standby.

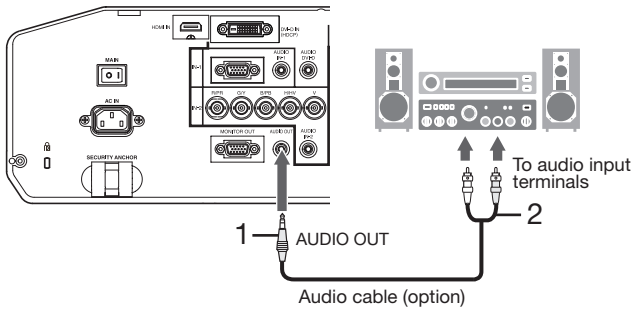
- Additional devices, such as a conversion connector and an analog RGB output adapter, are required depending on the type of the computer to be connected.
- Use of a long cable may decrease the quality of projected images.
- Images may not be projected correctly, depending on the type of the connected computer.
- When DVI-D signal is input, some signal setting menus are unavailable.
- Also read the instruction manual of the equipment to be connected.
- Contact your dealer for details of connection.

## Viewing computer images (continued)



### For monitor connection:

1. Connect the RGB cable from the monitor to the MONITOR OUT terminal of the projector.
- No video signal is output from the MONITOR OUT terminal during power standby.



### For audio output connection:

1. Connect one end of a commercially available audio cable to the AUDIO OUT terminal of the projector.
2. Connect the other end (white and red) of the audio cable to the audio input terminals (L, R) of the audio equipment.
- When the audio cable is connected to the AUDIO OUT terminal, the speaker output is muted.

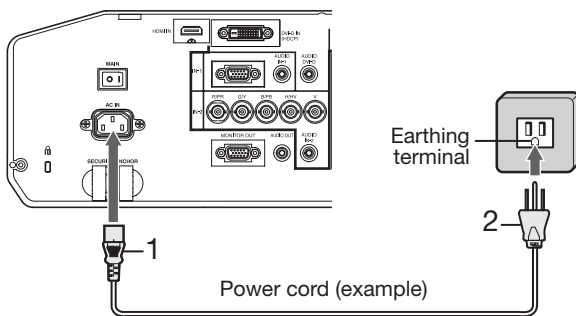
## About DDC

The COMPUTER/COMPONENT VIDEO IN-1 terminal of this projector complies with the DDC1/2B standard and the COMPUTER/COMPONENT VIDEO DVI-D IN (HDCP) terminal complies with the DDC2B standard. When a computer supporting this standard is connected to this terminal, the computer will automatically load the information from this projector and prepare for output of appropriate images.

- When connecting a DDC-supporting computer to the projector, turn on the main power switch of the projector before starting the computer.

## B. Plugging the power cord

- In order to ensure the safety in case of trouble with the projector, use an electrical outlet having an earth leakage breaker to supply the power to the projector. If you do not have such outlet, ask your dealer to install it.



1. Plug the attached power cord into the power cord inlet of this projector.
2. Plug the other end of the power cord into a power outlet.

- The power cords for use in the U.S. and Europe are included with this projector. Use the appropriate one for your country.
- This projector uses the power plug of 3-pin grounding type. Do not take away the grounding pin from the power plug. If the power plug doesn't fit your wall outlet, ask an electrician to change the wall outlet.
- The provided power cord for the U.S. is rated at 120 V. Never connect this cord to any outlet or power supply using other voltages or frequencies than rated. If you use a power supply using other voltage than rated, prepare an appropriate power cord separately.
- Use 100-240 V AC 50/60 Hz to prevent fire or electric shock.
- Do not place any objects on the power cord or do not place the projector near heat sources to prevent damage to the power cord. If the power cord should be damaged, contact your dealer for replacement because it may cause fire or electric shock.
- Do not modify or alter the power cord. If the power cord is modified or altered, it may cause fire or electric shock.

### Caution:

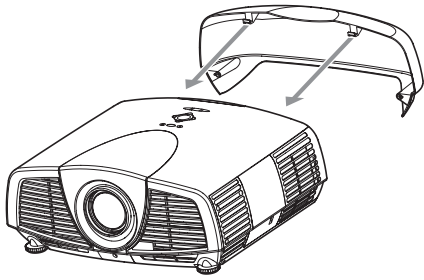
- Plug in the power cord firmly. When unplugging, hold and pull the power plug, not the power cord.
- Do not plug in or out the power cord with your hand wet. It may cause electric shock.

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### C. Installing the terminal cover

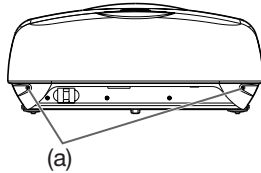
This projector includes a terminal cover. If necessary, install the terminal cover to the projector.



1. Fit two hooks of the terminal cover into the projector.
2. Tighten the attachment screws (a) firmly.

**Important:**

- Don't carry the projector by the terminal cover.



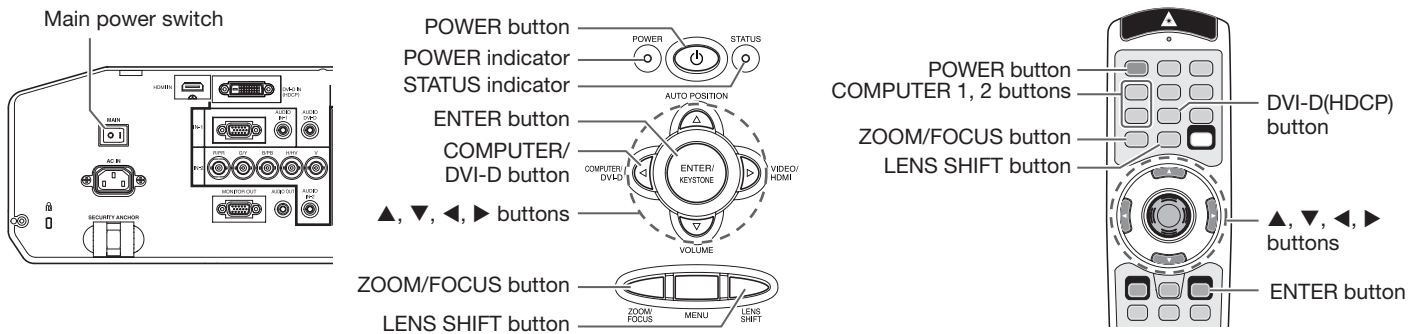


## Viewing computer images (continued)

### D. Projecting images

#### Preparation:

- Remove the lens cap.



- Put the projector into standby mode by pressing the main power switch. The POWER indicator lights up red.
  - If the projector was turned off before the lamp was cooled down sufficiently last time, the fan may start rotating and the POWER button may not work after the main power switch is turned ON. (The STATUS indicator blinks green.) After the fan stops rotating, press the POWER button to turn back on the POWER indicator.
- Turn on the power of the connected computer.
- Press the POWER button.
  - It may take about 1 minute for the lamp to light up.
  - The lamp fails to light up on rare occasions. In such a case, wait for a few minutes and then try again.
  - Do not cover the lens with the lens cap while the lamp is on. Do not strip off the aluminium sheet inside the lens cap.
  - After the POWER button is pressed, the image may flicker before the lamp becomes stable. This is not a product malfunction.
  - The lamp operation becomes stable in 1 minute after the power is turned on and then the lamp mode selected in the menu is activated. During the activation, displayed images may be disturbed.
  - The projector starts warming up when the POWER button is pressed. During the warm-up process, images may appear dark and no commands are accepted.
  - By blinking red, the STATUS indicator indicates that the lamp should be replaced soon. Replace the lamp when the STATUS indicator blinks red. (See page 42.)
- Press the ZOOM/FOCUS button to display the ZOOM/FOCUS menu.
- Adjust with the ◀ or ▶ button to get a fine picture.
  - When the ENTER button is pressed while the ZOOM/FOCUS menu is displayed, the adjustment mode is switched between FAST and STEP. When FAST is selected, the speed of focus controlled by the ◀ or ▶ button becomes fast, and it becomes slow when STEP is selected.
- Select an input source.
  - Press the COMPUTER/DVI-D button on the projector or the COMPUTER 1, COMPUTER 2 or DVI-D(HDCP) button on the remote control that is corresponding to the terminal in use.
  - The input source is switched from COMPUTER 1 to COMPUTER 2 to DVI at every press of the COMPUTER/DVI-D button on the projector.
  - The projector automatically selects the appropriate signal format. The selected signal format is displayed on the screen.
  - You cannot change the input source while the menu is being displayed.
  - Though it may take some time before an image is displayed on the screen depending on the type of the input signal, such symptom is not a malfunction.
  - Images may not be projected in the correct position, depending on the type of the input signal. In such a case, press the AUTO POSITION button. (See page 18.)
  - When COMPUTER 1 or COMPUTER 2 is chosen as the source, images supplied from the computer may flicker. Press the ◀ or ▶ button on the remote control to reduce flicker, if it occurs. (Fine adjustment)
- Adjust the position of the projector to keep an appropriate projection distance with which images are projected in their specified sizes.
- Adjust the position of the projector so that the projector and the screen are perpendicular to each other. (See page 10.)
  - When the projector cannot be positioned perpendicularly to the screen, adjust the projection angle. (See page 11.)

## Viewing computer images (continued)

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9. Press the ZOOM/FOCUS button to display the ZOOM/FOCUS menu.
10. Adjust with the ▲ or ▼ button to get an approximate size.
  - When the ENTER button is pressed while the ZOOM/FOCUS menu is displayed, the adjustment mode is switched between FAST and STEP. When FAST is selected, the speed of zoom controlled by the ▲ or ▼ button becomes fast, and it becomes slow when STEP is selected.
11. Press the LENS SHIFT button. The LENS SHIFT menu appears at the center of the screen.
12. Press the ▲ or ▼ button to adjust the vertical position and ◀ or ▶ button to adjust the horizontal position of the displayed image.
  - When the image is not displayed within the screen, adjust the projection angle. In addition, perform the keystone adjustment, if necessary. (See page 11.)

Repeat steps 4, 5 and 9 to 12, if necessary.

### Important:

- Focus, zoom and lens shift adjustment is possible in the normal picture mode only.
- When a 16:9 image is kept displayed for a long time before displaying 4:3 image, the afterimages of the black bars may appear on the 4:3 image screen. Consult your dealer in this case.

### To stop projecting:

13. Press the POWER button.
  - A confirmation message is displayed.
  - To cancel the procedure, leave the projector for a while or press any button except the POWER button.
14. Press the POWER button again.
  - The lamp goes out and the projector goes into a standby mode. In this standby mode, the STATUS indicator blinks green.
15. Wait about 2 minutes for the STATUS indicator to be turned off.
  - During this period of 2 minutes in the standby mode, the intake fan and exhaust fan rotate to cool the lamp.
  - The air outlet fans rotate faster as the temperature around the projector rises.
  - Though the fans make loud sounds during cooling, such symptom is not a malfunction.
16. Turn off the main power switch.
  - The POWER indicator will go out.
  - If the main power switch should be turned off or the power cord should be unplugged accidentally while either the air inlet fan or the air outlet fans are operating or the lamp is on, allow the projector to cool down for 10 minutes with the power off. To light the lamp again, press the POWER button. If the lamp doesn't light up immediately, repeat pressing the POWER button 2 or 3 times. If it should still fail to light up, replace the lamp.
  - Cover the lens with the lens cap to protect it from dust.
  - For safety's sake, unplug the power cord from the outlet.
  - When you repeat turning off the main switch within 30 minutes from the lamp illumination, an error may occur in the clock function of this product.

### Instant Shut Down

You can turn off this projector just by turning off the power switch or unplugging the power cord without pressing the POWER button.

- Don't shut down the projector while the STATUS indicator is blinking after the lamp lights up because the lamp's life may be shortened.
- Don't turn the projector back on right after shutting it down because the lamp's life may be shortened. (Wait about 10 minutes before turning the projector back on.)
- Before shutting down the projector, be sure to close the menu screen. If you shut down the projector without closing the menu, the setting data of the menu may not be saved.
- If you shut down the projector while controlling the projector using the network function, the application software such as ProjectorView may fail. For details, see "User Guide of LAN Control Utility" contained in the CD-ROM.

## Viewing computer images (continued)

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### AV mute

The video and audio signals are temporarily muted when the AV MUTE button is pressed. To cancel muting, press the AV MUTE button again.

- It takes several seconds before muting is completely canceled.
- If AV MUTE MODE in the INSTALLATION menu is set to IMAGE, the splash screen will appear when the AV MUTE button is pressed.
- You can alter the splash screen optionally. See page 37.
- The audio from the AUDIO OUT terminal is also muted by pressing the AV MUTE button.

### AUTO POSITION button

When the image supplied from the computer is displaced, carry out the following procedure.

1. Project a bright image containing as many texts and characters as possible.
  2. When the screen saver has been enabled, disable it.
  3. Press the AUTO POSITION button.  
The projector automatically makes optimum positional settings for the input signal.
- If the projected image is still displaced even after pressing the AUTO POSITION button several times, refer to the procedure to adjust computer images. (See pages 35 and 36.)
  - When you carry out this procedure with a dark image, the image may be displaced.

### When connecting to a notebook computer:

When the projector is connected to a notebook computer, images may not be projected in some cases. In such cases, set the computer so that it can output signals externally. The setting procedure varies depending on the type of the computer. See the instruction manual of your computer.

### Example of the setting procedure for external output

Press the [Fn] key and any of the keys [F1] to [F12] at the same time. (The key to be pressed depends on the type of the computer you use.)

### Setting of the resolution

If the resolution of the computer doesn't match with that of the projector, projected images may be obscured. Ensure that their resolutions are the same (see page 51). For the method to change the output resolution of the computer, contact the manufacturer of the computer.

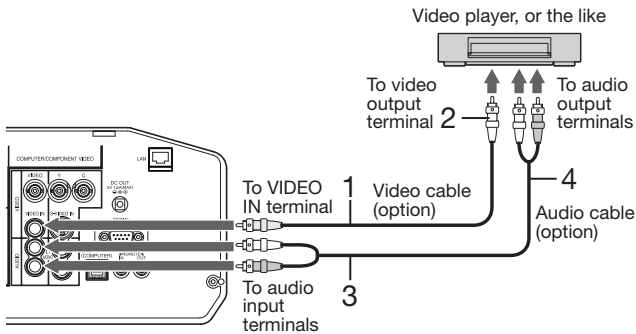
# Viewing video images

## A. Connecting the projector to video equipment

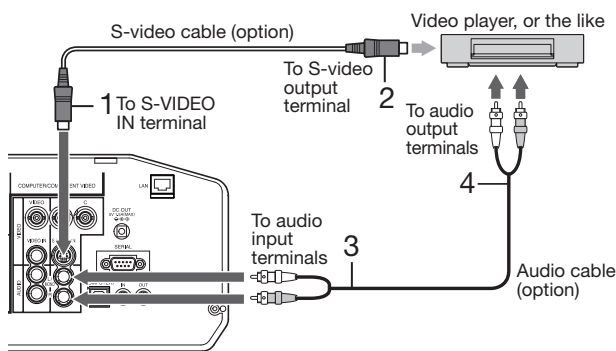
### Preparation:

- Make sure that the power of the projector and that of the video equipment are turned off.

### Connecting to a video player, etc.

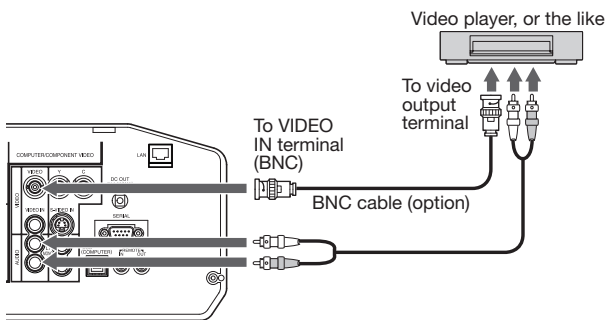


1. Connect one end of a commercially available video cable to the VIDEO IN terminal of the projector.
2. Connect the other end of the video cable to the video output terminal of the video equipment.
3. Connect one end of a commercially available audio cable to the audio input terminals (L/MONO, R) of the projector.
4. Connect the other end of the audio cable to the audio output terminals (L, R) of the video equipment.



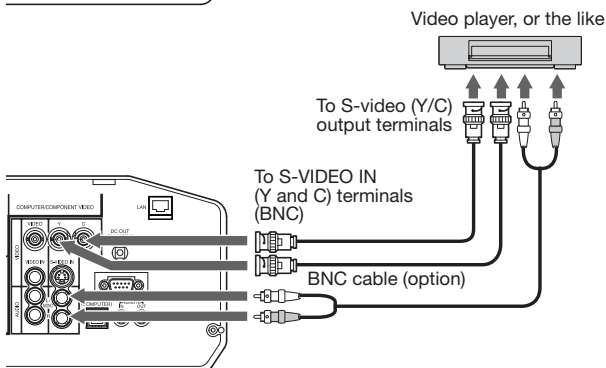
### When the video equipment is equipped with the S-video output terminal, make the connection as follows:

1. Connect one end of a commercially available S-video cable to the S-VIDEO IN terminal of the projector.
2. Connect the other end of the S-video cable to the S-video output terminal of the video equipment.
3. Connect one end of a commercially available audio cable to the audio input terminals (L/MONO, R) of the projector.
4. Connect the other end of the audio cable to the audio output terminals (L, R) of the video equipment.



### When using the BNC connector: (For VIDEO input)

- When the video output terminal of the connected video equipment is BNC type, use the VIDEO IN terminal (BNC type).
- Select VIDEO as the input source.
- When using the VIDEO IN terminal (BNC type) and the VIDEO IN terminal (RCA type) at the same time, the video signal input to the VIDEO IN terminal (RCA type) takes priority.



### When using the BNC connector: (For S-VIDEO input)

- When the video output terminals of the connected video equipment are BNC (Y/C) type, connect Y and C to the S-VIDEO IN (Y and C) terminals (BNC type) respectively.
- Select S-VIDEO as the input source.
- When using the S-VIDEO IN (Y and C) terminals (BNC type) and the S-VIDEO IN terminal (S type) at the same time, the video signal input to the S-VIDEO IN terminal (S type) takes priority.

- When connecting a monophonic video device, use the white (L) terminal to connect the audio cable. (The same audio signal is output from the channels L and R of the AUDIO OUT terminal.)
- Also read the instruction manual of the equipment to be connected.
- Contact your dealer for details of connection.

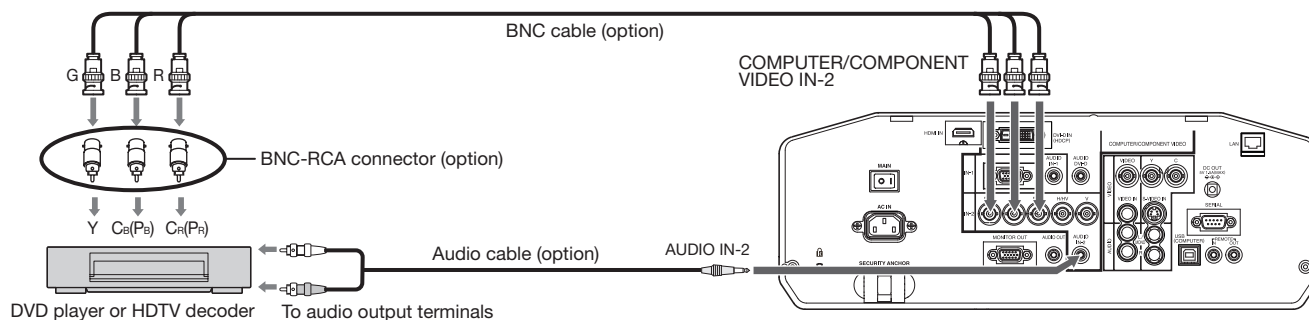
### When a TV tuner or VCR is connected:

When you use this projector with a TV tuner or VCR connected, no image may appear or a message of "NO SIGNAL" may appear on the screen when you change the channel via any channel that is not being received. In such a case, set the channels of the TV tuner or VCR again. To avoid such symptom, use the TV tuner or VCR with its channel skip function (that is a function not to display channels that are not being received) enabled.

## Viewing video images (continued)

### Projector + DVD player or HDTV decoder

Some DVD players have an output connector for 3-line fitting (Y, C<sub>B</sub>, C<sub>R</sub>). When connecting such DVD player with this projector, use the COMPUTER/COMPONENT VIDEO IN-2 terminals.



- The terminal's names Y, P<sub>B</sub>, and P<sub>R</sub> are given as examples of when a HDTV decoder is connected.
- The terminal's names vary depending on the connected devices.
- Use BNC cables for connection.
- Image may not be projected correctly with some DVD players.
- If colors aren't displayed correctly when the projector is connected to a high-definition video device having R, G, and B output terminals, set COMPUTER INPUT to RGB in the SIGNAL menu. (See page 32.)

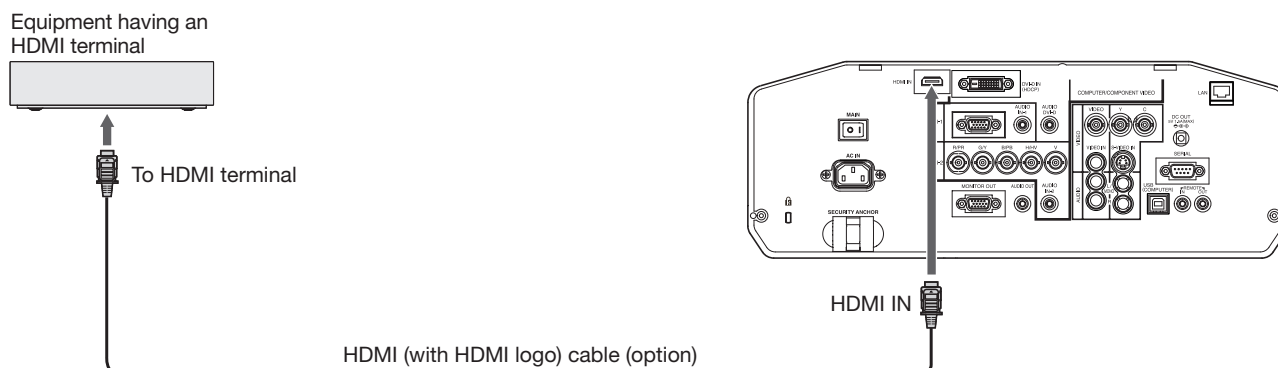
### Connecting to video equipment having a HDMI terminal or DVI-D terminal

You can project high-quality images by connecting the COMPUTER/COMPONENT VIDEO DVI-D IN (HDCP) terminal of this projector to video equipment having a HDMI output terminal or DVI-D terminal. In addition, this projector supports HDCP and is able to receive encrypted digital video data that are output from DVD players.

- HDCP (High-bandwidth Digital Content Protection), developed by Intel Corporation, is a method to encrypt digital video data for the purpose of copy protection.
- HDMI (High-Definition Multimedia Interface) is fully backward compatible with computers, displays and consumer electronics devices incorporating the DVI standards.
- This projector can be linked with video devices equipped with HDMI output terminal or DVI-D output terminal. However, with some of them, this projector may not display any image or not operate correctly.
- If this projector doesn't display any image or not operate correctly, see the operation manual of the video device for its connection.
- Use of a long cable may decrease the quality of projected images.

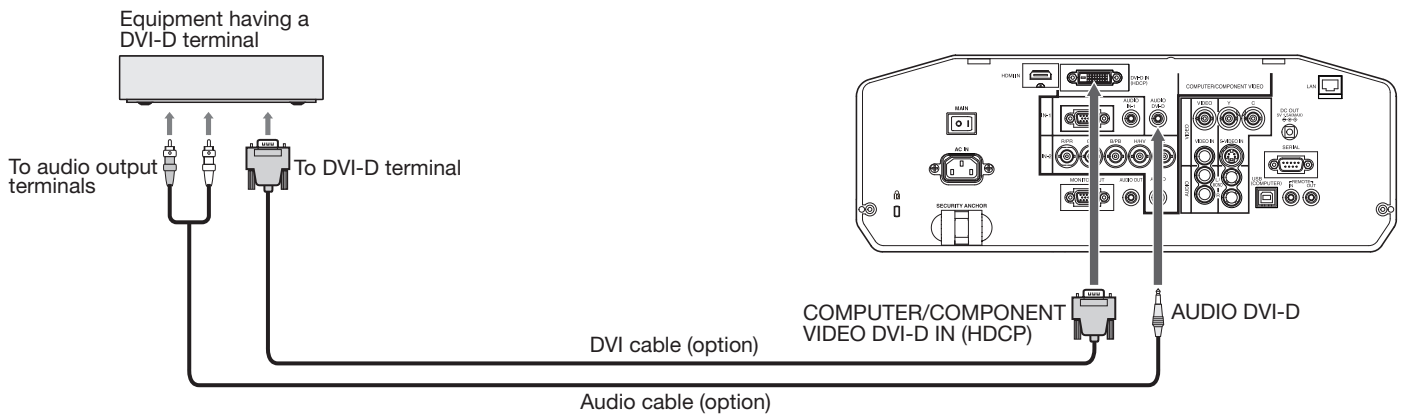
#### Connection (for video equipment having an HDMI terminal)

- Use a commercially available HDMI (with HDMI logo) cable.
- You don't have to connect any cable for audio input. You can input video and audio using an HDMI cable only.
- When HDMI audio isn't output, it may be output by turning off the power of the video equipment with the projector and the video equipment connected to each other and then turning back on the power.
- Some cables may not be connected correctly depending on the size and shape of their connectors.



## Viewing video images (continued)

### Connection (for video equipment having a DVI-D terminal)



- For connection to the DVI-D terminal, use a commercially available DVI cable.
- Use AUDIO DVI-D terminal for audio input.
- Some cables may not be connected correctly depending on the size and shape of their connectors.
- When DVI is selected as the input source, settings of FINE SYNC., TRACKING, HOLD, etc. are unavailable.

### When you connect this projector and a digital device (such as a DVD player) via the HDMI IN or COMPUTER/COMPONENT VIDEO DVI-D IN (HDCP) terminal, black color may appear dark and deep, depending on the type of the connected device.

- This depends on the black level setting of the connected device. There are 2 kinds of methods to digitally transfer image data, in which different black level settings are employed respectively. Therefore, the specifications of the signals output from DVD players differ, depending on the type of the digital data transfer method they use.
- Some DVD players are provided with a function to switch the methods to output digital signals. When your DVD player is provided with such function, set it as follows.  
EXPAND or ENHANCED → NORMAL
  - See the users guide of your DVD player for details.
  - When your digital device does not have such function, set INPUT LEVEL to ENHANCED in the ADVANCED MENU of the IMAGE menu of this projector, or adjust the black color by viewing the image.

## B. Plugging in the power cord

Plug the power cord in the same way as in the case of “Viewing computer images.” (See page 14.)

## C. Installing the terminal cover

If necessary, install the terminal cover to the projector in the same way as in the case of “Viewing computer images.” (See page 15.)

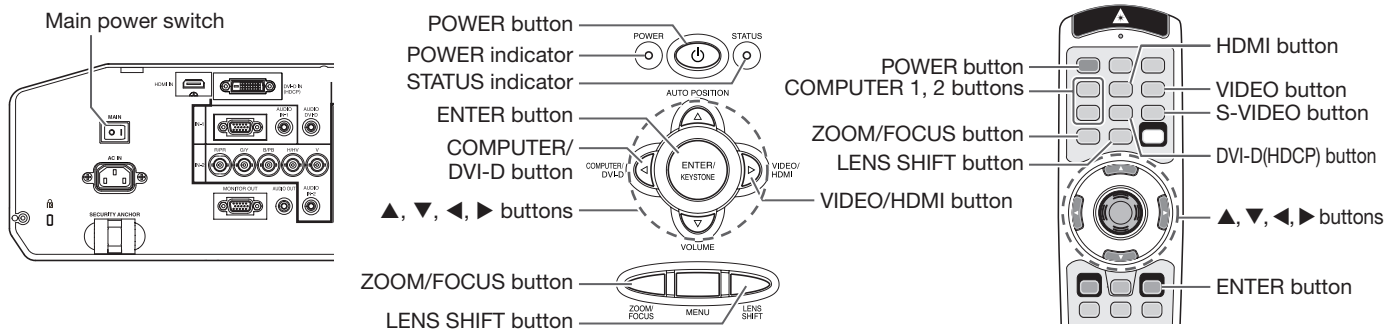

### D. Projecting images

#### Preparation:

- Remove the lens cap.



- Put the projector into standby mode by pressing the main power switch. The POWER indicator lights up red.
  - If the projector was turned off before the lamp was cooled down sufficiently last time, the fan may start rotating and the POWER button may not work after the main power switch is turned ON. (The STATUS indicator blinks green.) After the fan stops rotating, press the POWER button to turn back on the POWER indicator.
- Turn on the power of the connected video equipment.
- Press the POWER button.
  - It may take about 1 minute for the lamp to light up.
  - The lamp fails to light up on rare occasions. In such a case, wait for a few minutes and then try again.
  - Do not cover the lens with the lens cap while the lamp is on. Do not strip off the aluminium sheet inside the lens cap.
  - After the POWER button is pressed, the image may flicker before the lamp becomes stable. This is not a product malfunction.
  - The lamp operation becomes stable in 1 minute after the power is turned on and then the lamp mode selected in the menu is activated. During the activation, displayed images may be disturbed.
  - The projector starts warming up when the POWER button is pressed. During the warm-up process, images may appear dark and no commands are accepted.
  - By blinking red, the STATUS indicator indicates that the lamp should be replaced soon. Replace the lamp when the STATUS indicator blinks red. (See page 42.)
- Press the ZOOM/FOCUS button to display the ZOOM/FOCUS menu.
- Adjust with the ◀ or ▶ button to get a fine picture.
  - When the ENTER button is pressed while the ZOOM/FOCUS menu is displayed, the adjustment mode is switched between FAST and STEP. When FAST is selected, the speed of focus controlled by the ◀ or ▶ button becomes fast, and it becomes slow when STEP is selected.
- Select an input source.
  - Press the VIDEO/HDMI button on the projector or the VIDEO, S-VIDEO or HDMI button on the remote control that is corresponding to the terminal in use.
  - The input source is switched between VIDEO, S-VIDEO and HDMI at every press of the VIDEO/HDMI button on the projector.
  - You cannot change the input source while the menu is being displayed.
  - Though it may take some time before an image is displayed on the screen depending on the type of the input signal, such symptom is not a malfunction.
  - Some images become easier to view when the setting of aspect ratio is changed. (See page 24.)
  - When projecting images from a DVD player that is connected to the COMPUTER/COMPONENT VIDEO DVI-D IN (HDCP) terminal, press the COMPUTER/DVI-D button on the projector to select DVI or press the DVI-D (HDCP) button on the remote control.
  - When projecting images from a DVD player that is connected to the COMPUTER/COMPONENT VIDEO IN-1 or COMPUTER/COMPONENT VIDEO IN-2 terminal, press the COMPUTER/DVI-D button on the projector or the COMPUTER 1 or COMPUTER 2 button on the remote control.
  - When COMPUTER 1 or COMPUTER 2 is chosen as the source, images supplied from the computer may flicker. Press the ◀ or ▶ button on the remote control to reduce flicker, if it occurs. (Fine adjustment)



## Viewing video images (continued)

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7. Adjust the position of the projector to keep an appropriate projection distance with which images are projected in their specified sizes.
8. Adjust the position of the projector so that the projector and the screen are perpendicular to each other. (See page 10.)
  - When the projector cannot be positioned perpendicularly to the screen, adjust the projection angle. (See page 11.)
9. Press the ZOOM/FOCUS button to display the ZOOM/FOCUS menu.
10. Adjust with the ▲ or ▼ button to get an approximate size.
  - When the ENTER button is pressed while the ZOOM/FOCUS menu is displayed, the adjustment mode is switched between FAST and STEP. When FAST is selected, the speed of zoom controlled by the ▲ or ▼ button becomes fast, and it becomes slow when STEP is selected.
11. Press the LENS SHIFT button. The LENS SHIFT menu appears at the center of the screen.
12. Press the ▲ or ▼ button to adjust the vertical position and ◀ or ▶ button to adjust the horizontal position of the displayed image.
  - When the image is not displayed within the screen, adjust the projection angle. In addition, perform the keystone adjustment, if necessary. (See page 11.)

Repeat steps 4, 5 and 9 to 12, if necessary.

### Important:

- Focus, zoom and lens shift adjustment is possible in the normal picture mode only.

### To stop projecting:

13. Press the POWER button.
  - A confirmation message is displayed.
  - To cancel the procedure, leave the projector for a while or press any button except the POWER button.
14. Press the POWER button again.
  - The lamp goes out and the projector goes into a standby mode. In this standby mode, the STATUS indicator blinks green.
15. Wait about 2 minutes for the STATUS indicator to be turned off.
  - During this period of 2 minutes in the standby mode, the intake fan and exhaust fan rotate to cool the lamp.
  - The air outlet fans rotate faster as the temperature around the projector rises.
  - Though the fans make loud sounds during cooling, such symptom is not a malfunction.
16. Turn off the main power switch.
  - The POWER indicator will go out.
  - If the main power switch should be turned off or the power cord should be unplugged accidentally while either the air inlet fan or the air outlet fans are operating or the lamp is on, allow the projector to cool down for 10 minutes with the power off. To light the lamp again, press the POWER button. If the lamp doesn't light up immediately, repeat pressing the POWER button 2 or 3 times. If it should still fail to light up, replace the lamp.
  - Cover the lens with the lens cap to protect it from dust.
  - For safety's sake, unplug the power cord from the outlet.
  - When you repeat turning off the main switch within 30 minutes from the lamp illumination, an error may occur in the clock function of this product.

### Instant Shut Down

You can turn off this projector just by turning off the power switch or unplugging the power cord without pressing the POWER button.

- Don't shut down the projector while the STATUS indicator is blinking after the lamp lights up because the lamp's life may be shortened.
- Don't turn the projector back on right after shutting it down because the lamp's life may be shortened. (Wait about 10 minutes before turning the projector back on.)
- Before shutting down the projector, be sure to close the menu screen. If you shut down the projector without closing the menu, the setting data of the menu may not be saved.
- If you shut down the projector while controlling the projector using the network function, the application software such as ProjectorView may fail. For details, see "User Guide of LAN Control Utility" contained in the CD-ROM.

## Viewing video images (continued)

### Volume from the speaker

Press the VOLUME + or - button to change the volume from the speaker.

The volume control bar will appear on the screen.



- The volume control bar will disappear about 10 seconds after the VOLUME button is released.
- The VOLUME buttons don't function while the menu selection bar or the menu is being displayed.
- When a high-level audio signal, such as a DVD audio signal, is supplied to the AUDIO IN terminals, the output from the speaker may be distorted.
- When the audio cable is connected to the AUDIO OUT terminal, the speaker output is muted.
- The volume of the audio from the AUDIO OUT terminal is also changed by pressing the VOLUME buttons.
- The volume of the audio from the AUDIO OUT terminal varies within the range between 0 and 31.

### Setting the aspect ratio

You can change the aspect ratio of the input video signal (or the ratio of width to height of the image). Change the setting according to the type of the input video signal.

#### How to change the settings:


##### With the remote control:

1. Press the ASPECT button.
  - Every time the ASPECT button is pressed, the aspect mode changes from NORMAL to 16:9, to FULL, and back to NORMAL.
    - NORMAL:  
Select to change the aspect ratio automatically depending on the input signal. (Select this option for normal use.)
    - 16:9:  
Select to expand squeezed (or horizontally compressed) images such as DVD images to 16:9.
    - FULL:  
Select to project images in full size (1024 x 768 pixels) irrespective of type of input signal.

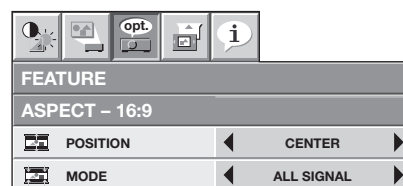
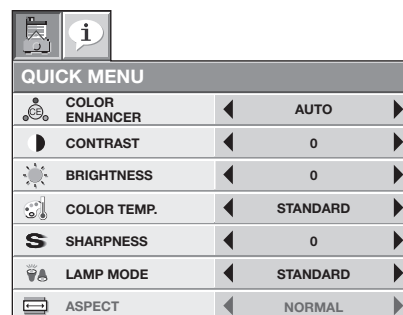
##### With the QUICK MENU or FEATURE menu:

(See page 26 for menu setting.)

1. Display the QUICK MENU or FEATURE menu.
2. Select ASPECT by pressing the ▲ or ▼ button.
3. Select your desired aspect ratio by pressing the ◀ or ▶ button.

When 16:9  is selected with the FEATURE menu, you can make further settings using the following procedures.

4. Press the ENTER button.
5. Select an item you want to set by pressing the ▲ or ▼ button and select a setting by pressing the ◀ or ▶ button.
  - POSITION:  
You can select the image display position within the screen from UPPER, CENTER, and LOWER.
  - MODE:  
You can select whether or not to display signals at 16:9 depending on their type.
    - ALL SIGNAL:  
All signals are always displayed at 16:9 irrespective of their type.

## To adjust the color (COLOR and TINT):

You can adjust the color of the projected image using the menu.  
(See page 26 for menu setting.)

1. Display the QUICK MENU or IMAGE menu.
2. Select COLOR or TINT by pressing the ▲ or ▼ button.

There are different kinds of white color. Color temperature is a way to show the differences in white. White of which temperature is low appears reddish. When the color temperature rises, white appears bluish. For example, you can change the color temperature using the following procedures.

To raise the color temperature: Increase the CONTRAST B (blue) and decrease the CONTRAST R (red).


To reduce the color temperature: Decrease the CONTRAST B (blue) and increase the CONTRAST R (red).

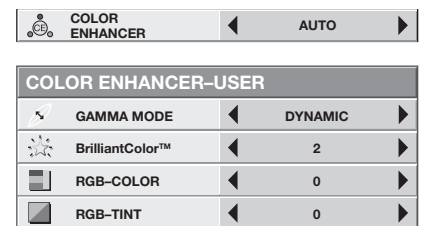
- If you set all of CONTRAST R, G, and B to negative values, the original brightness of the image can't be obtained even when you maximize CONTRAST in the IMAGE menu.

## Color Enhancer

You can set the user-defined balance between the brightness and hue using the menu. (See page 26 for menu setting.)

### With the IMAGE menu:

1. Display the IMAGE menu.
2. Select COLOR ENHANCER by pressing the ▲ or ▼ button.
3. Select USER  by pressing the ◀ or ▶ button.
4. Press the ENTER button.
5. Select an item you want to set by pressing the ▲ or ▼ button.



### GAMMA mode

Use this item to set the gamma optimally.

DYNAMIC ..... Select when viewing images supplied from the computer.

NATURAL ..... Select when viewing images supplied from the video device.

DETAIL ..... Select when viewing images of which brightness should be kept relatively low, such as movies and music performance.

### BrilliantColor™

Use this item to make the colors having medium brightness such as yellow and skin tone look natural. Press the ◀ button to decrease the value to lessen the effect. Press the ▶ button to increase the value to heighten the effect. (BrilliantColor™ doesn't work at value 0.)

6. Select a setting value by pressing the ◀ or ▶ button.
- For more enhanced color reproduction, set BrilliantColor™ to 0. The white portion of the color wheel will be disabled and you can reproduce true-to-life images.

### RGB-COLOR

Use to adjust the color intensity of the projected image. Every time the ▶ button is pressed, the color becomes thicker. Every time the ◀ button is pressed, the color becomes lighter.


### RGB-TINT

Use to adjust the color balance of the projected image. Every time the ▶ button is pressed, the image appears more greenish. Every time the ◀ button is pressed, the image appears more reddish.

### Important:

- You can adjust Color Enhancer also by pressing the CE button on the remote control.

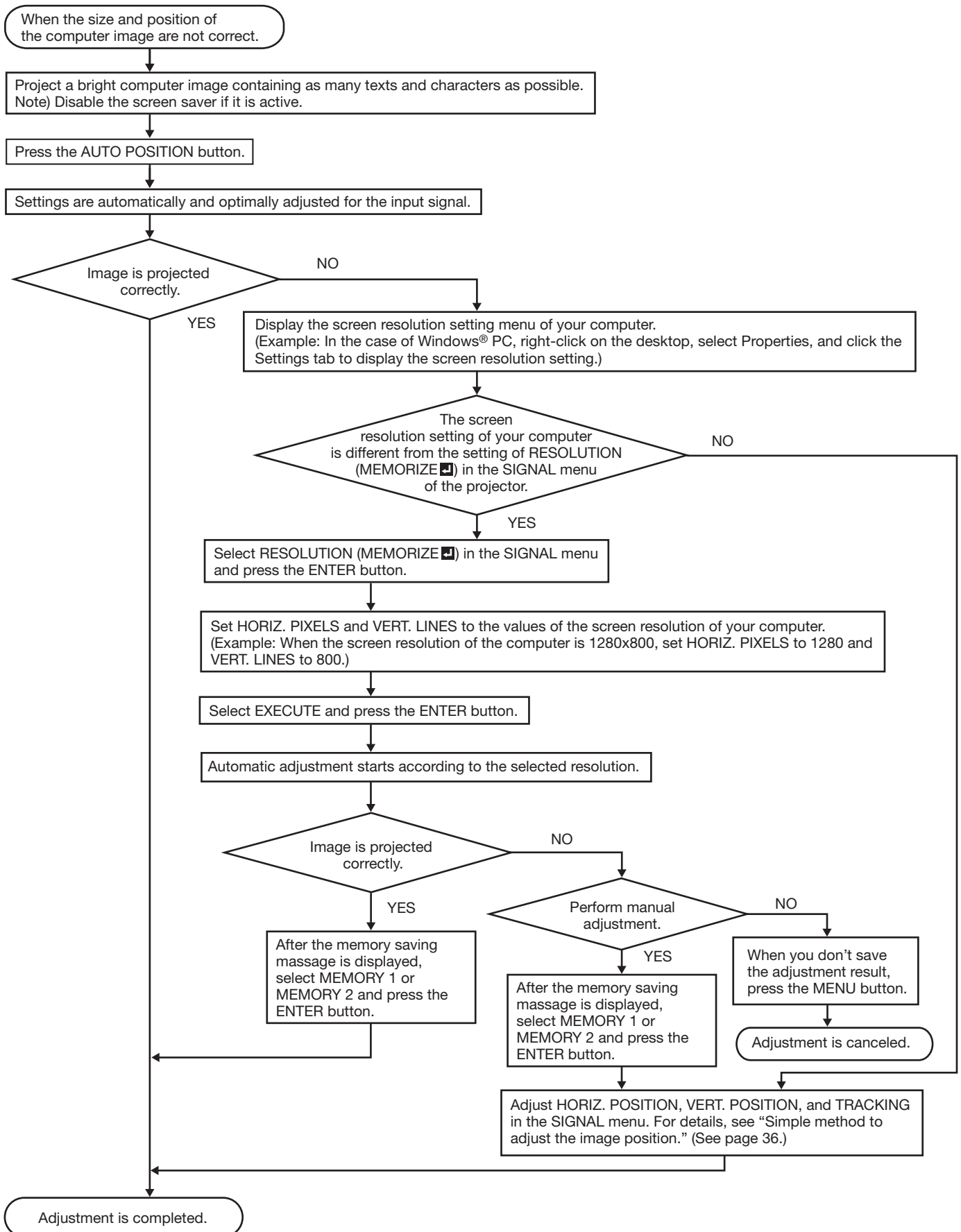
### With the remote control:

1. Press the CE button on the remote control.  
A window for color enhancer adjustment appears on the upper right of the screen.
2. Press the ◀ or ▶ button to select USER .
3. Press the ENTER button.
4. Press the ▲ or ▼ button to select GAMMA MODE, BrilliantColor™, RGB-COLOR or RGB-TINT.
5. Press the ◀ or ▶ button to adjust the selected item.

## Adjusting projected images (continued)

### How to adjust the computer image

This projector automatically selects a proper signal format according to the type of video signal supplied from the computer. However, video signals from the computer may not be projected correctly depending on the types of the computer and images to be projected. In such a case, make adjustment according to the flowchart below.





## Adjusting projected images (continued)

### How to adjust the image supplied from the computer using the menu:

Carry out the following procedures according to the symptoms.

- Wide strips appear. .... Adjust TRACKING in the SIGNAL menu.
- The projected image flickers.
- The projected image is blurred.....Adjust FINE SYNC. in the SIGNAL menu.
- The projected image is displaced horizontally. ....Adjust HORIZ.POSITION in the SIGNAL menu. Every time the ◀ button is pressed, the image moves to the right. Every time the ▶ button is pressed, the image moves to the left.
- The projected image is displaced vertically.....Adjust VERT.POSITION in the SIGNAL menu. Every time the ◀ button is pressed, the image moves down. Every time the ▶ button is pressed, the image moves up.
- The top part of the image flags. .... Change the setting of HOLD in the SIGNAL menu. Select ON , press the ENTER button, and adjust BEGIN or END to minimize the flagging.
- A solid black or solid white appears in the image. .... Adjust CLAMP POSITION or CLAMP WIDTH in the SIGNAL - USER menu.
- The motion doesn't run smoothly.....Adjust VERT. SYNC in the SIGNAL - USER menu. Select AUTO for normal use.
- Noise appears on the right or left half of the image. ....Adjust SHUTTER(LS) or SHUTTER(RS) in the SIGNAL - USER menu.
- Noise appears on the top or bottom part of the image.....Adjust SHUTTER(U) or SHUTTER(L) in the SIGNAL - USER menu.

1. Display the SIGNAL menu.
2. Press the ▲ or ▼ button to select an item to adjust.
3. Adjust the selected item by pressing the ◀ or ▶ button.

#### To cancel the menu:

4. Press the MENU button.
- Do not change the settings of the SIGNAL menu in normal use.

### Simple method to adjust the image position

#### To adjust the horizontal position:

1. Align the left edge of the image with the left side of the screen by adjusting HORIZ.POSITION. Then, align the right edge of the image with the right side of the screen by adjusting TRACKING.
2. Repeat step 1 above to complete the adjustment of the horizontal position.

#### To adjust the vertical position:

3. Align the upper edge of the image with the upper side of the screen by adjusting VERT.POSITION.

### LPF (Progressive filter)

You can select whether or not to enable the LPF.

Vertical or horizontal streak noise may appear on the projected image, depending on the type of the DVD player or game console you use. In such a case, you can reduce such streak noise by enabling the LPF. However, projected images become softened slightly.



# Advanced features

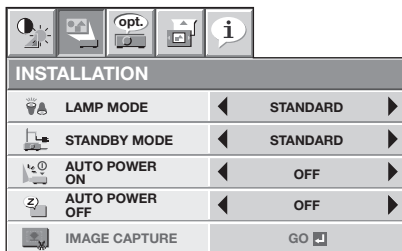
## Setting of the image displayed during startup or muting

You can display your desired image as the startup screen (or splash screen). Using the menu, you can also use such image as a background that is displayed while the video is muted or no signal is supplied.

- You can capture the images from the COMPUTER1, COMPUTER2, DVI, and HDMI input sources.

### Setting procedure

1. Display your desired image.
2. Display the INSTALLATION menu.
3. Select IMAGE CAPTURE by pressing the ▲ or ▼ button.



4. Press the ENTER button.
  - Image capture starts and the captured image is displayed.
  - Once you press the ENTER button, you cannot use other functions until the capturing completes.
  - When the resolution of the captured image is lower than XGA, the image is enlarged to XGA when displayed.
  - When the resolution of the captured image is higher than XGA, only the portion within the XGA range is captured.

### Important:

- Images with complicated patterns may not be captured. In such cases, change the image to be captured.
- Some images can't be captured correctly because of their signal type. For details, see page 51.
- You can't change the new startup screen back to the original startup screen. (Even when you select RESET ALL in the FEATURE menu, the factory default screen isn't available any longer.) When you want to change the startup screen again, capture another image.
- The captured image will be displayed from the next startup. If the captured image isn't displayed, make sure that the setting of SPLASH SCREEN in the INSTALLATION menu isn't OFF. (See page 30.)
- To display the captured image while the video is muted, set AV MUTE MODE in the INSTALLATION menu to IMAGE. (See page 30.)
- To display the captured image while no signal is supplied, set BACK COLOR in the INSTALLATION menu to IMAGE. (See page 30.)
- In the mute mode, or when no signal is input, it takes longer time to display the captured image.

- You can't set IMAGE CAPTURE when PASSWORD FUNCTION in the FEATURE menu has been set to SPLASH ID SCREEN to enable the password lock.

## Advanced features (continued)

### Password function




This projector is equipped with the password function that is designed for prevention of wrong operation by children and restriction on operation by other than specified users. The password function has 3 modes as follows.

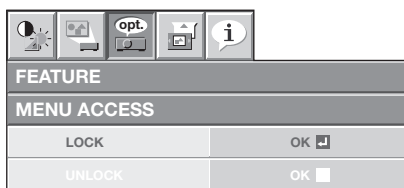
**DISPLAY INPUT** ..... When the projector is turned on, the startup screen (or splash screen) will appear and stay on the screen until the password is entered. When the password is entered, the startup screen will switch to the regular operation screen.

**MENU ACCESS**..... All the buttons except for the POWER button on the projector are disabled. (The buttons on the remote control are enabled.) You can use this mode as a measure of prevention of wrong operation by children and restriction on operation by other than specified users.

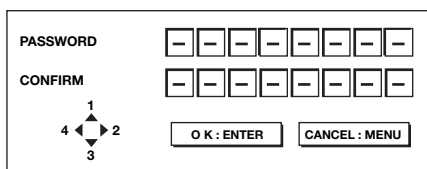
**SPLASH ID SCREEN... IMAGE CAPTURE and SPLASH SCREEN** in the INSTALLATION menu become unavailable. SPLASH SCREEN will be set to ON automatically.

#### To enable the password function:

1. Display the FEATURE menu.
2. Press the ▲ or ▼ button to select PASSWORD FUNCTION.
3. Press the ◀ or ▶ button to change the mode among DISPLAY INPUT , MENU ACCESS  and SPLASH ID SCREEN 
  - When the password has already been set, the mode won't be changed. In such cases, press the ENTER button to cancel the password function and try again.
4. Press the ENTER button.
  - The screen for setting the password function will appear.



5. Press the ENTER button.
  - The screen for entering a password will appear.

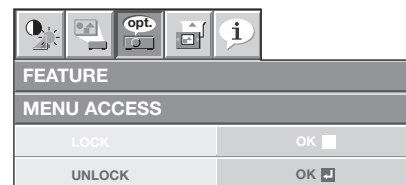


6. Enter a 4 - 8 digit password using the ▲, ▶, ▼ and ◀ buttons on the remote control as shown below. (▲=1, ▶=2, ▼=3, ◀=4)
7. Press the ENTER button.
  - To cancel the procedure, press the MENU button.

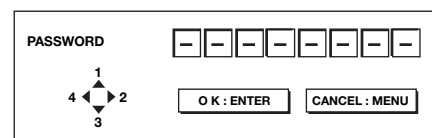
8. Enter the password again for confirmation using the same steps.
9. Press the ENTER button.
  - If the entered passwords don't match, an error message will appear.
  - To cancel the procedure, press the MENU button.

#### To cancel the password function:

1. Display the FEATURE menu.
2. Press the ▲ or ▼ button to select PASSWORD FUNCTION.
3. Press the ENTER button.
  - The screen for canceling the password function will appear.



4. Press the ENTER button.
  - The screen for entering the password will appear.



5. Enter a 4 - 8 digit password using the ▲, ▶, ▼ and ◀ buttons on the remote control as shown below. (▲=1, ▶=2, ▼=3, ◀=4)
6. Press the ENTER button.
  - If you enter a wrong password, an error message will appear.
  - To cancel the procedure, press the MENU button.

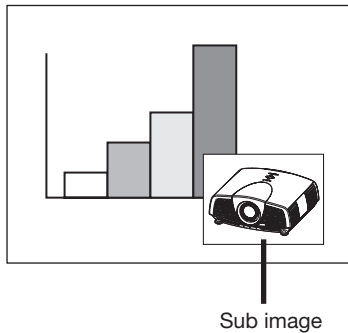
#### Important:

- Disable the password by pressing the MENU and ENTER buttons on the projector at the same time.

### Picture in Picture (PinP)

One of the special features of this projector is the picture-in-picture (PinP) mode. The PinP mode allows you to view the images from different sources at the same time.

- While viewing the image from the COMPUTER1, COMPUTER2, DVI, or HDMI input source, you can display the image from the VIDEO or S-VIDEO input source as a sub image.



#### To use the PinP mode

1. Press the PinP button on the remote control.
2. If necessary, select the desired external input source of the sub image by using the VIDEO or S-VIDEO button on the remote control.
3. Press the PinP button again to exit the PinP mode.

#### To change the position of the sub image:

Press the ◀ or ▶ button on the remote control.

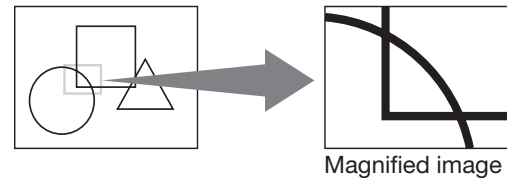
#### Important:

- The PinP mode is available only when the ASPECT ratio is set to NORMAL.
- The PinP mode isn't available with some input signals. For further information, see page 51.
- When the COMPUTER 1, COMPUTER 2, DVI-D (HDCP) or HDMI button on the remote control is pressed, the PinP mode will be canceled.
- When there is no video signal for sub image, you can't change the display position.
- The motion may not run smoothly in the PinP mode.

### Magnifying the displayed image

By pressing the MAGNIFY button on the remote control, you can magnify the image to view the details.

- While viewing the image from the COMPUTER1, COMPUTER2, DVI, or HDMI input source, you can magnify the image.



#### To use the MAGNIFY mode:

1. Press the MAGNIFY button on the remote control.
  - You can select the area to be magnified by pressing the ▲, ▼, ◀, or ▶ button on the remote control.
  - You can change the magnification of the selected area by pressing the + or - button.
2. Press the MAGNIFY button again to exit the MAGNIFY mode.
  - The regular operation screen will appear.

#### Important:

- The MAGNIFY mode doesn't function with some input signals. For details, see page 51.
- In the MAGNIFY mode, you can't adjust the volume.

### Freeze

#### To stop the motion in the image temporarily (or to display a still image):

Press the FREEZE button on the remote control.

- The image will freeze temporarily.

#### To resume the motion in the image:

Press the FREEZE button on the remote control again.

#### Important:

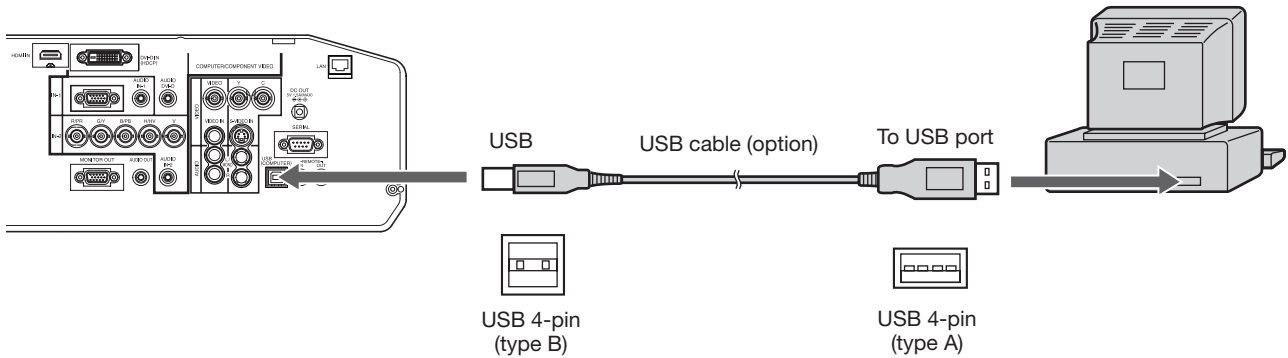
- Do not display a still picture for a long time because the afterimages may persist on the screen.

## Advanced features (continued)

### Mouse remote control

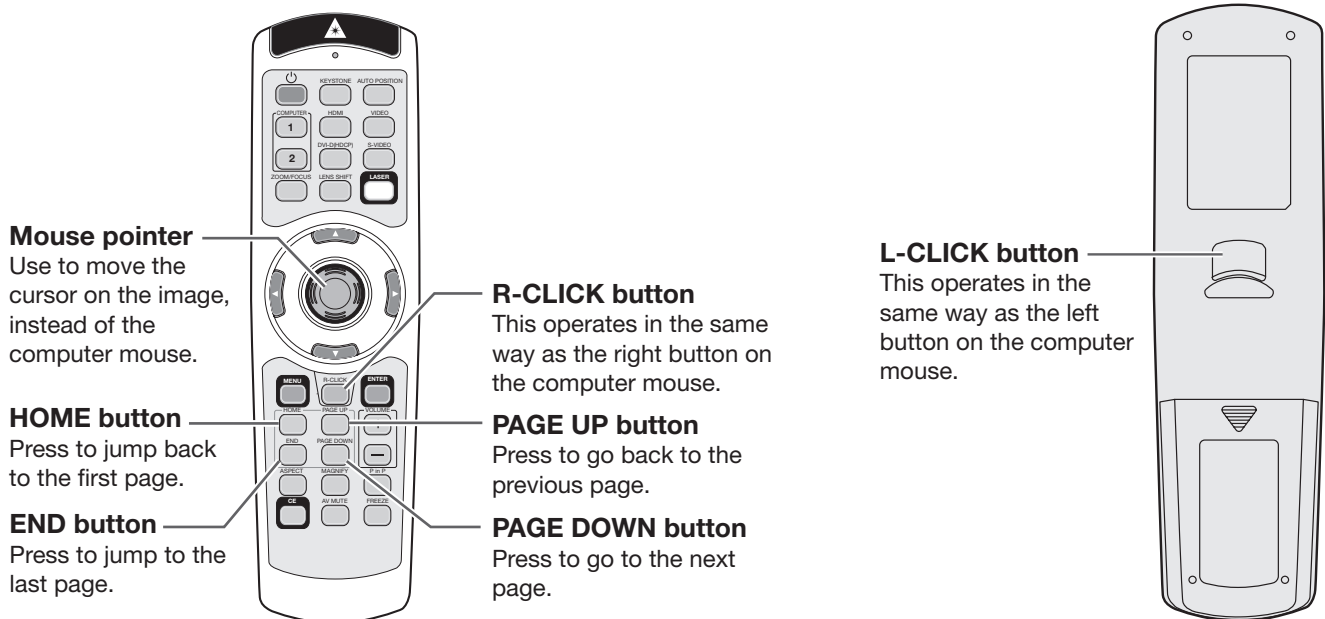
By connecting to personal computer through the USB port, you can operate your computer with the projector remote control.

#### Projector + computer with USB connector



- You can use the mouse remote control function with a computer supporting USB only.
- When the lamp is turned ON, the computer connected with the USB cable may not work correctly. In this case, restart the computer.
- When a computer is connected using a long USB cable, it may not be controlled by the remote control correctly. To extend the cable length, you are recommended to use a repeater.
- You cannot control the computer using the remote control during power standby and for a while after the power is turned on.

### Supervising and controlling by computer

You can supervise and control the projector's operation using a personal computer via a LAN network.

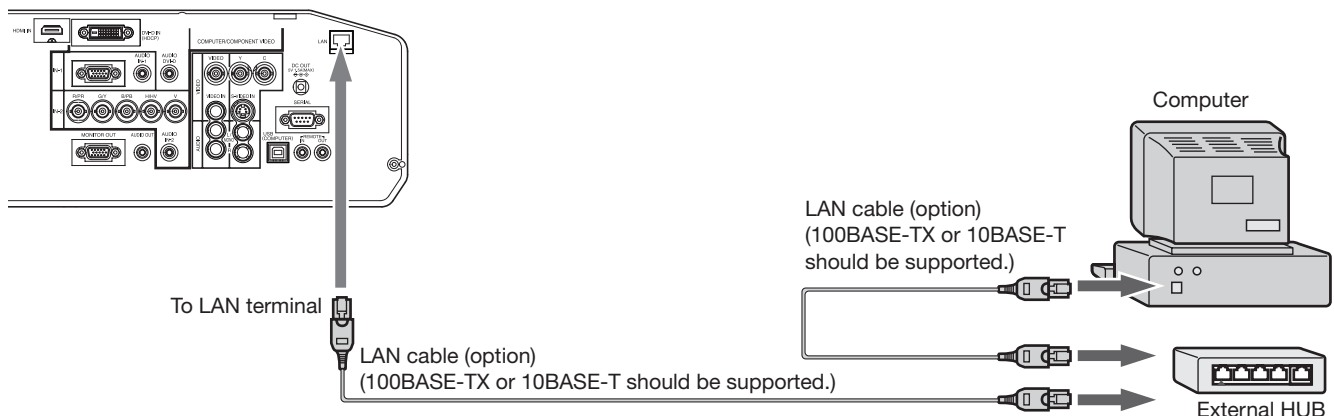

- Use a straight-through category-5 cable for LAN connection.
- Don't touch the metal parts of the LAN connector and LAN cable because static electricity may be discharged from your body, causing damage to the projector.

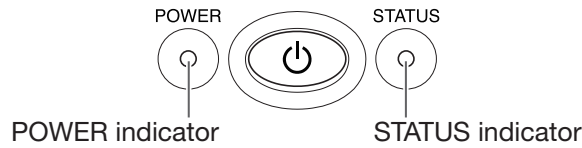

# Replacing the lamp

This projector is equipped with a lamp to project images. This lamp is a consumable. It may burn out or its brightness may decrease during use. In such cases, replace the lamp with a new one as soon as possible. Be sure to replace the lamp with a new lamp separately sold that is exclusive to this projector. Contact your dealer for purchase of the lamp.

Spare lamp	VLT-XD3200LP
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## Warning:

- Be careful not to drop the lamp fixing screws into the inside of the projector. Don't put a metal piece or flammable object into the projector. Using the projector with any foreign object present inside may result in electric shock or fire. When you can't remove the foreign object from the inside, contact your dealer for removal.
- Be sure to install the lamp securely. When the lamp isn't installed properly, it won't illuminate. Improper installation may also result in fire.
- Don't shake the removed lamp or don't lift it above your face. You may be injured in your eye by flying or falling glass fragments.
- Don't replace the lamp immediately after use because the lamp cover is very hot. You may get burned. Turn off the power using the POWER button. After the lamp goes out, wait about 2 minutes until the intake and exhaust fans for cooling the lamp stop rotating. Then turn off the main power switch, unplug the power cord, and wait at least 1 hour to allow the lamp to cool down enough to the touch.
- Do not touch the lamp directly. It may break and cause injury or burn.

## Interval of lamp replacement

The recommended interval of lamp replacement is about 4000 hours<sup>\*1,2</sup> of consecutive use. Such interval differs depending on the operating environment and may be shorter than 4000 hours<sup>\*1,2</sup>. Decrease in luminescence and/or color brightness indicates that the lamp needs to be replaced. When the lamp operation time exceeds 3000 hours<sup>\*1</sup>, the indicator will blink alternately between green and red (while the lamp is lit; when the lamp is not lit, the indicator will be lit red only) and the lamp replacement message will appear on the screen for 1 minute everytime the lamp is turned on. When the lamp has been used for about 3800 hours<sup>\*1</sup>, the replacement message (LAMP EXCHANGE) will appear on the screen for 1 minute every 20 hours<sup>\*1</sup> thereafter. **When the lamp operation time exceeds 4000 hours<sup>\*1,2</sup>, the projector automatically shuts off and can't be used until the lamp is replaced and the lamp operation time is reset.**

\*1: Duration when LAMP MODE of the INSTALLATION menu is set to LOW. When it is set to STANDARD, this duration will be shorted.

\*2: When LAMP MODE is set to STANDARD, this duration will be shorted to 2000 hours.

## Caution:

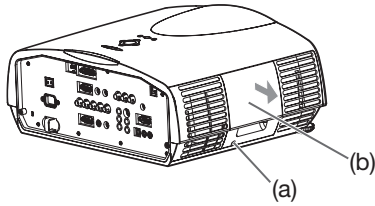
- Don't remove the lamp for any purpose other than replacement. Unnecessary removal of the lamp may result in a breakdown.
- This projector uses a high-pressure mercury lamp as the light source. The high-pressure mercury lamp may explode or fail to illuminate permanently because of an impact, scratch, or deterioration through use. The period of time until explosion or permanent failure to illuminate varies considerably from lamp to lamp, depending on operation conditions. Therefore, the lamp may explode soon after the start of use.
- The possibility of explosion of the lamp increases if you use it beyond its replacement period. When the instruction of lamp replacement appears, replace it with a new one immediately even if the lamp is still lighting normally.
- When the high-pressure mercury lamp explodes, glass fragments will scatter inside or outside the lamp box and the gas charged inside the lamp will diffuse inside or outside the projector. The gas inside the lamp contains mercury. Be careful not to breathe it or avoid it from entering your eye or mouth. If you should breathe it or if it should enter your eye or mouth, see a doctor immediately.
- In the event that the high-pressure mercury lamp exploded, glass fragments may have been scattered inside the projector. Ask your dealer to replace the lamp and to inspect the inside of the projector. When you clean or replace the lamp by yourself, be sure to hold the handle of the lamp. You may get injured by glass fragments.
- When removing the lamp from the ceiling-mounted projector, use the lamp replacement tray packed with the projector or option lamp to prevent glass fragments from scattering.
- Be sure to use the lamp exclusive to this projector, VLT-XD3200LP. Use of other lamps may cause a failure of the projector.



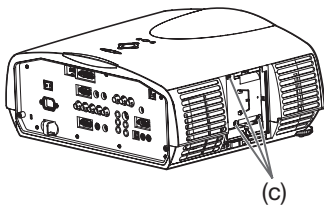
## Replacing the lamp (continued)

### To replace the lamp:

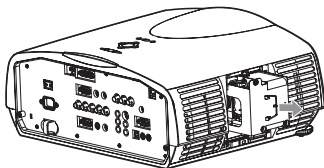
1. Turn off the main power switch and unplug the power cord.
2. Loosen the screw (a) using a Phillips screwdriver (+), and remove the lamp cover (b).



3. Loosen the screws (c) using a Phillips screwdriver (+).

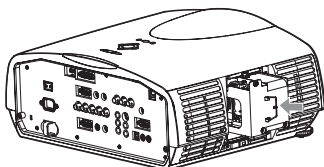


4. Pull the handle.
5. Pull out the lamp box by the handle while holding the projector.



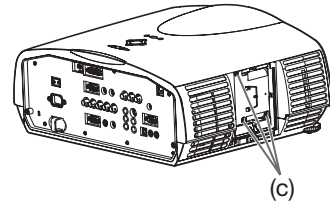
- Pull the lamp box out of the projector slowly. If it is pulled out quickly, the lamp may break scattering glass fragments.
- Do not spill liquid on the removed lamp box or do not place it near any flammable object or where children can reach to prevent injury or fire.

6. Load a new lamp box securely into the projector in the right orientation.

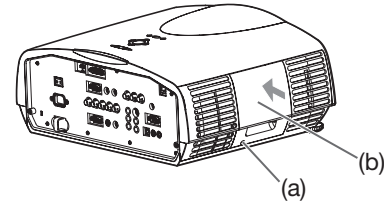


7. Put the handle back to the original position.
  - Make sure that the handle is locked.

8. Tighten up the screws (c) using a Phillips screwdriver (+).



9. Tighten up the screw (a) using a Phillips screwdriver (+) to secure the lamp cover (b).



### Reset of the lamp operation time

10. Plug the power cord into the wall outlet and turn on the main power switch.
11. Press the ◀, ▶, and POWER button on the projector at the same time.

#### Important:

- Unless these 3 buttons are pressed at the same time, the lamp operation time isn't reset.
- Make sure that the STATUS indicator blinks twice and the lamp operation time is reset successfully.
- The projector doesn't turn on if the lamp cover isn't attached securely.
- Be sure to reset the lamp operation time whenever you replace the lamp.
- Do not reset the lamp operation time unless you replace the lamp.
- The lamp is fragile. If it is broken, be careful not to cut yourself with glass fragments.

#### Caution:

- This projector uses a lamp that contains mercury. Disposal of the lamp or the projector with the lamp may be regulated due to environmental considerations. 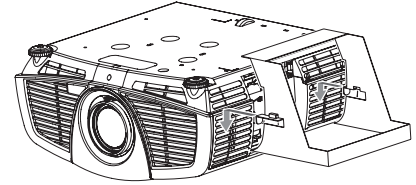
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### When removing the lamp from the ceiling-mounted projector

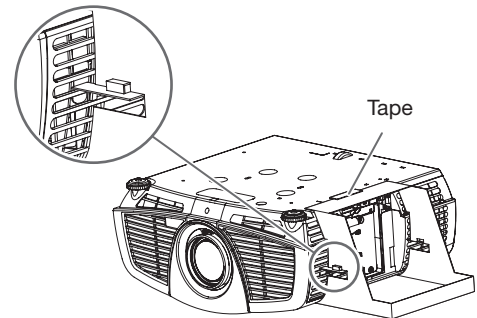
When removing the lamp from the ceiling-mounted projector, use the lamp replacement tray packed with the projector or option lamp to prevent glass fragments from scattering.

- Assemble the lamp replacement tray according to the procedure shown on it.

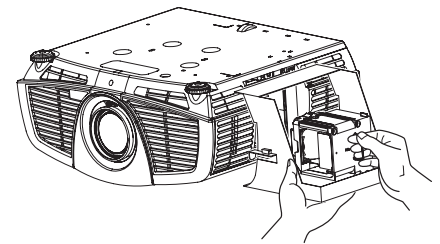
1. Follow steps 1 to 4 on page 44.
2. Attach the lamp replacement tray to the projector as shown in the figure.



3. Secure the lamp replacement tray on the projector using the tape packed with the tray.
4. Pull out the lamp box by the handle while holding the projector.
  - Hold the lamp replacement tray to prevent glass fragments from scattering.
  - Don't put the lamp directly on the lamp replacement tray because it may fall.



5. Detach the lamp replacement tray together with the removed lamp.



6. Follow steps 6 to 11 on page 44.

## Maintenance

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### Warning:

- Do not use flammable solvents (benzene, thinner, etc.) and flammable aerosols when cleaning the projector body and lens. Flammable substances may ignite causing fire or breakdown while the lamp is illuminating.

### Caution:

- Be sure to turn off the lamp and unplug the power cord from the wall outlet before you perform any maintenance on the projector.

### Cleaning of the projector and the ventilation slots

Use a soft cloth to clean the projector and the ventilation grilles. When the grilles become dirty, wipe them with a soft cloth dampened with diluted mild detergent, and then wipe them with a dry cloth.

- Clean the inside of the terminal cover frequently as dust is apt to be collected.

To protect the surface of the projector from fading or deteriorating:

- Do not spray insecticide on or inside the projector.
- Do not use benzine or thinner to clean it.
- Do not let rubber or plastic materials contact with projector.

### Cleaning of the lens

Use a standard lens-cleaning brush or a piece of lens tissue dampened with lens cleaning fluid. The lens surface is fragile. Use only recommended, nonabrasive lens-cleaning materials. Do not touch the lens with your fingers.

# Troubleshooting

Before asking for repair of the projector, check the following. If the symptom persists, stop using the projector, be sure to unplug the power plug, and then contact your dealer.

## No image appears on the screen.

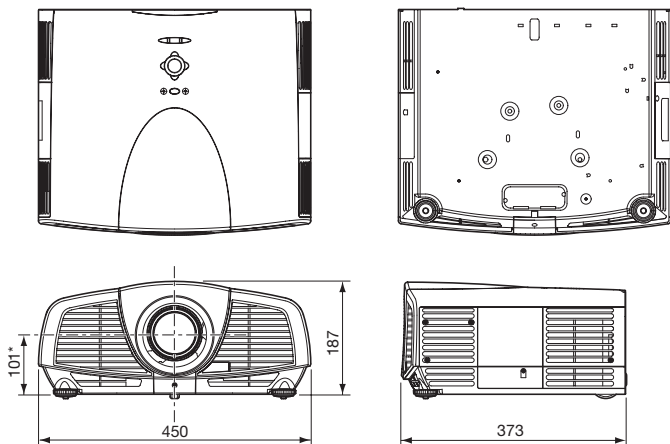

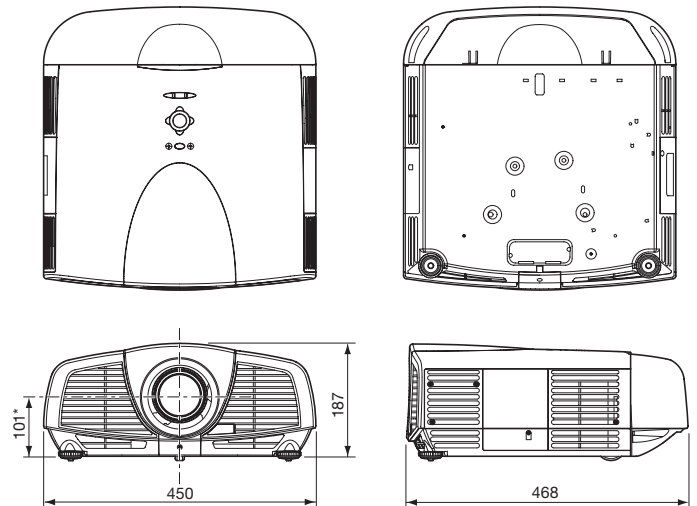
