



Save Original Packing Materials

The original shipping carton and packing materials will come in handy if you ever have to ship your projector. For maximum protection, repack the set as it was originally packed at the factory.

Moisture Condensation

Never operate this unit immediately after moving it from a cold location to a warm location. When the unit is exposed to such a change in temperature, moisture may condense on the crucial internal parts. To prevent the unit from possible damage, do not use the unit for at least 2 hours when there is an extreme or sudden change in temperature.


■ Loading dry-cell batteries into the remote control

1 Remove the battery cover.




2 Insert the dry-cell batteries.




Operating the remote control

Dry-cell batteries

- If the remote control stops working, or if its range decreases, replace all the batteries with new ones.




- The remote control may fail to operate if the infrared remote sensor is exposed to bright sunlight or fluorescent lighting.
- Do not drop or bang.

- Do not get wet or place on top of wet objects.

- In rare cases, ambient conditions could impede the operation of the remote control. If this happens, point the remote control at the main unit again, and repeat the operation.




Placement Styles

As shown in the figures below, this device can be placed in 4 different styles. The factory setting is "floor-mounted front projection." Set the **Projection mode** in the **default setting menu** p.32, in accordance with your needs.










⚠ WARNING

 Attempting to clean/replace the lamp at a high site by yourself may cause you to drop down, thus resulting in injury.
- If you wish to mount the projector on the ceiling, be sure to ask your dealer to do so. Mounting the
 projector on a ceiling requires special ceiling brackets (sold separately) and specialized knowledge.
 Improper mounting could cause the projector to fall, resulting in an accident.
- If the projector is ceiling-mounted, install the breaker for turning off the power in case of anomaly. Let

Projection Distance and Size

a is the distance (m) between the lens and the screen, and corresponds to a range of 1.15 m to 10.00 m. H is the height from the image bottom to the center of the lens.



Connection

Before connection

- Read the owner's manual of the device you are connecting to the projector.
- Some types of computer cannot be used or connected to this projector.
 Check for an RGB output terminal, supported signal p.69, etc.
- · Turn off the power of both devices before connecting.
- The figure below is a sample connection. This does not mean that all of these devices
 can or must be connected simultaneously. (Dotted lines mean items can be exchanged.)



■ Notes

- COMPUTER terminals 1 and 2 function identically.
- The AUDIO IN terminal doubles for devices connected to COMPUTER terminals 1 and 2.

How to use the PC card slot

The wireless LAN PC card enables you to connect the projector wirelessly with a personal computer that supports IEEE802.11b based wireless LAN. p.34 (Please note that communication between all the computers based on IEEE802.11b and this projector is not guaranteed.) You can also use a commercially available memory card to project JPEG image files using this projector. P.42 Please follow the steps below when removing or mounting a PC card.

■ Mounting a PC card

Remove the PC card slot cover.
 Press lightly on the circle ("O") while sliding the cover in the direction of the arrow.




2 Insert the PC card.

After making sure of the card orientation, press it in firmly until it stops.



■ Removing a PC card

1 Look at CARD indicator. If it is off, proceed to step 4.




Press the UNMOUNT button.
Begins processing for PC card removal.

Wait until CARD indicator goes out.

Never remove the PC card while lit. Doing so could damage the PC card or corrupt your data.


4 Press the Eject button.



The Eject button is a bit stiff, so press firmly while supporting the projector. Be careful to avoid injury when doing so.


Press the RESET switch with a thin pin or similar implement (it is at the bottom of a recess).








Be sure to remove the lens cover when the power is turned on. If it is left on, it could become deformed due to heat.



The power turns on, and the following 3 green indicators light: ON, LAMP, and FAN. After a moment, the start-up screen appears.



⚠ CAUTION

- Do not look into the lens while the lamp is on. The strong light from the lamp may cause damage to your eyes or sight.
- · Do not block the air intake or exhaust. Doing so could cause a fire due to internal overheating.
- Do not place your hands, face, or other objects near the air exhaust. Doing so could cause burns, deform/break the object.

Notes

- The start-up screen will disappear after a moment. You can dismiss the start-up screen before this by performing any operation. You can also configure the start-up screen not to appear via the **Display setting menu** p.31.
- The first time you use the projector after purchase, after the start-up screen disappears, the Language menu is displayed 2.24.


■ Turning the power off

Press the ON/STANDBY button.

A message appears on the screen, confirming that you wish to shut off the power. This message will disappear after a moment. (This operation is no longer valid after the message disappears.)

Press the ON/STANDBY button again.

The screen turns off, but the internal cooling fan continues to operate for a short while. Then, the projector goes into standby mode.



- During cooling, the LAMP indicator flashes. In this state, the power cannot be turned back on.
- After the LAMP indicator goes off, the cooling fan continues to operate for a short while, in order to expel excess internal heat. If you are in a hurry, there is no problem with unplugging the power cord or turning off the main power switch in this state.
- C In standby mode

■ Note

The projector consumes about 15W of power in standby. We recommend that you unplug
the power cord or turn off the main power switch if you will not be using the projector for
an extended period.

■ PRECAUTION

If the power cord is unplugged before cooling is complete, give the lamp time (about 5 minutes) to cool before plugging it back in. If the lamp overheats, it may fail to light, and its lifetime will be shortened.

Basic operations

Turn on the power.

Turn on the power by following the instructions in "Turning the power on" p.22.

Select the language and the lamp power (When using the first time).

Then, the menu for lamp power selection and configuration is displayed. It is automatically set as Standard. To change the setting, follow the step ②.

The lamp power, if selected, will be toggled without pressing the button. The display automatically disappears in a few seconds.

Notes

6 Projector placement angle adjustments

The placement angle and the height of the projected image can be adjusted by the foot adjuster.



The speaker volume can be adjusted when an audio signal is being input.

■ Notes

- Note that a lamp characteristics may rarely cause the brightness to fluctuate slightly.
- A lamp is consumable item. If used for extended periods, images will appear dark, and the lamp could burn out. This is characteristic of a lamp, and is not malfunction. (The lifetime of the lamp depends on conditions of use.)
- The DMD[™] is made using extremely advanced technology, but there may be black spots (pixels that do not light) or bright spots (pixels that are constantly lit) on the panel. Please note that these are not malfunctions.
- Although this projector supports a wide range of RGB signals possible.
 any resolutions not supported by this projector (SVGA) will be expanded or shrunk, which will affect image quality slightly. To view high-quality images, it is recommended that the computer's external output should be set to SVGA (800 x 600) resolution.
- With some models of computer having LCD displays or the like, displaying images simultaneously on the projector and the monitor's display may prevent the images from displaying properly. If this happens, turn off the computer's LCD display. For information on how to turn off the LCD display, see the owner's manual of your computer.
- In wireless/card input mode, display is compressed, resulting in slight degradation in image quality.
- If a signal not supported by the projector is input, the "Unsupported signal" will appear.
- If no signal is being input from the connected device, the "No signal" will appear.
- If an unavailable operation button is pressed, the xicon will appear.

Using handy features

■ Using auto setting

This function sets up the projector to the optimum state for each type of the input signal by using simple operations.

Press the SET UP button.

The Set up menu appears.

Press the SET UP button again.

The menu item is automatically adjusted/set. For computer input, the computer input, the processing.



- The image may not be projected or auto adjustment/setting may not be performed correctly for input signals other than those supported by the projector [p.69], p.70.
- · Keystone adjustment cannot be corrected automatically.

Correcting the keystone distortion

When the foot adjuster p.25 is used to change the projector placement angle while projecting the image, the picture will undergo keystone (trapezoidal) distortion. This projector is capable of correcting this keystone distortion.



Manual adjustment

Press the SET UP button to display the Set up menu and select [**Keystone**]. Use the buttons for keystone adjustment. When the adjustment is finished, press the RETURN button. The menu disappears.

Notes

- Depending on the amount of keystone adjustment and the content of images, some information may be lost, or the picture quality may suffer.
- Keystone adjustment is available for the keystone distortion in a slant angle of ± 15 degrees.

■ Cutting off the picture and sound temporarily (Mute)







Wireless communication can be performed via the simple configurations. This function can only be used if the projector is in range of the computer's wireless signals.

For security reason, confirm the specifications of your computer for the distance that the radio wave can reach. The coverage of this projector may vary, depending on the computer and the surrounding environment. When tested with a PC manufactured by Toshiba with built-in wireless LAN system, the coverage is approximately 60 m with an unobstructed path between the projector and computer placed indoors. This figure is not guaranteed and should be considered as merely a guideline.

♦ Infrastructure communication mode



A mixed wireless and wired LAN can be created via access points. Connecting to the rest of the world via a wired LAN or the Internet generally requires a high level of security.

Use the appropriate transmission mode for your network environment.





Details on individual items

• [Mode]

Your projector is set to **Ad hoc** in the factory. Change the setting if you want to use the projector in **Infrastructure** mode.

• [Channel]

Usually, you do not have to set this item. If a network group having the same **SSID** already exists in the projector's coverage, the channel is changed automatically to the channel of that network group.

- Note 1: If a set channel is in bad connections for wireless connection, try the other channels to avoid the effects of radio waves to select the one in possibly the best communication conditions.
- Note 2: To communicate in Ad hoc mode with a computer that cannot change the channel, start up the projector before the computer.

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· [SSID]

This is an ID code for connecting to specific individuals over a wireless LAN. This may also be called "**Network group**" or "**Network name**". Please read the following carefully.

- Note 1: The **SSID** is set to **DPJ** when shipped from the factory. If you leave this setting as it is, security may be compromised due to access by a third party using the "**Wireless Utility**" within the projector's possible communication area. Before using the projector, therefore, be sure to set **SSID** to a character string different from the default.
- Note 2: When you use the Ad hoc communication mode, if there is a similar SSID network group (for example DPJ, DPJ1, DPJ2, etc.) in the possible communication area, it is possible that your projector name will not be displayed in the Wireless Utility projector list column. If this is the case, set SSID to a completely different character string.

[Encryption]

Enable or disable encryption for security purposes.

Note: **Encryption** is factory-set to **Off**. If you use the projector with this setting left unchanged, security may be compromised due to access by a third party using the Wireless Utility within the projector's coverage. Before using the projector, therefore, be sure to set **Encryption** to **On**.

• [Key]

When you have set **Encryption** to **On**, the encryption key must be set. For use at an encryption level of **64-bit**, specify a string of 5 arbitrary characters or a string of ten characters in hexadecimal notation. For use at the **128-bit** level, specify a string of 13 arbitrary characters or a string of 26 characters in hexadecimal notation.

Note: Alphabetic characters (A to F, a to f) used in hexadecimal notation are case insensitive; the uppercase characters and their lowercase equivalents are handled to be identical.

The higher the number of bits, the stronger the encryption, and hence the harder it will be for a third party to decipher your communications. However, setting higher encryption levels may slow down communication speed. To set the highest security level, specify a **128-bit** encryption key. For higher security, avoid using a word found in a dictionary and change the key sometimes.

Set the following item if you have set the communication mode to Infrastructure.

• [DHCP]

If you set **DHCP** to **Use**, the IP address of the projector is assigned automatically by the DHCP server. If your network environment does not assign IP addresses automatically, set **DHCP** to **Not use**, then set the following item **TCP/IP** manually.

• [TCP/IP]

If you have set **DHCP** to **Not use**, ask the network administrator to check for the following items, then perform the **TCP/IP** settings manually.

IP address

An IP address is a unique number assigned to a terminal for connection to the Internet. The format is a string of four dot-separated three-digit numbers. (Example: 111.112.xxx.xxx)

Subnet mask

A subnet mask is used to determine what subnet the IP address assigned to a terminal belongs to. (Example: 255.255.xxx.xxx)

Gateway

This value specifies the device, such as a router, to be used to access servers outside the network. It is identified by the IP address. (Example: 111.112.xxx.xxx)

• [Setting initialization]

This item resets the wireless LAN settings to their factory defaults.

• [Projector name]

This can be used to identify projectors when communicating with multiple projectors, or if there is a possibility that another person who is out of communication range will be using the same projector. It is recommended this is set to prevent wrong transmission.

- If you have forgotten your password, set it again using the menu on the main unit.

■ Computer settings

Refer to instruction manuals of your computer or wireless LAN PC card to perform the following settings.

- Select Ad hoc (for some PC cards, this is Peer-to-Peer Group).
- Set the **Channel** to channel assigned to the projector (in factory reset mode, this is set to **10**).

For some computers, you cannot set the channel in Ad hoc mode.

- Set SSID (for some types of PC card, use Network name instead) as the same as projector's SSID (at factory shipment, this is set to DPJ).
- If **Encryption** and **Key** are set on the projector, set to the same values.

Note: It is imperative that the projector and computer encryption settings are the same. If the settings are different, the encryption may be invalid when sending in the Ad hoc communication mode, so be careful.

Projecting images stored in a memory PC card

This projector can read JPEG files from a memory PC card to display them on the screen. This allows you to give presentations without a computer, create an advertising screen board using the slideshow function, and more. (The projector cannot reproduce animation effects such as those produced by Microsoft® PowerPoint®.)

■ Memory PC cards

PC card slot types

The PC card slot installed on this projector is TYPE II (PCMCIA Release 2.1)-compliant. Please use memory PC cards and conversion adapters compliant with this type of PC card slot.

Only a 3.3-V PC card can be used. (A 5-V only PC card cannot be used.)

Supported storage media types

This projector supports the following types of ATA-compliant storage media. This owner's manual refers to the combination of the ATA conversion adapter and media in use as a "memory PC card."

The TOSHIBA IPC5019A SmartMedia[™] PC card adapter is not ATA-compliant, and so cannot be used by this projector.

Backing up data

Toshiba recommend that you back up the data on the memory PC card before use. (Toshiba assume no liability for losses incurred by data lost through the use of this projector.)

■ JPEG files

- (1) Supported file extensions are jpg, JPG, jpeg, and JPEG.
- (2) The maximum number including both folders and files is 512.
- (3) Some JPEG files are not supported by this projector.

The limitations in (3) above can be alleviated by converting the JPEG file with the supplied JPEG Conversion Tool p.55 software application.

■ Setting slideshow options

Slideshow is the function to display the JPEG image files stored in a memory PC card one after another at fixed time intervals. When switching from one image to the next, Slideshow can add various display effects (transitions) to them. If you select **Slideshow** in step 2 in "**Projector settings**" p.36, the following items can be set.

Details on individual items

• [PC card display] function

- If you set **PC card display** to **Auto.**, the projector switches to wireless/card input mode automatically when a PC card is plugged into the PC card slot. Although this item is provided as one of slideshow options, the setting works the same way even when a wireless LAN PC card is plugged into the PC card slot.
- If you set PC card display to Manual, the projector makes no response to the plugging of a PC card into the PC card slot.

• [Auto. demo] function

- If you set Auto. demo to On, the projector starts a slide show automatically when a
 memory PC card is plugged into the PC card slot. The slide show displays the JPEG
 files stored in the root directory of the memory PC card.
- The projector starts the slide show automatically when the power is turned on with the memory PC card plugged with Auto. demo set to On.

Projecting images stored in a memory PC card (Continued)

- To suspend the slide show, press the button. Pressing it again resumes the slide show.
- To end the slide show, press the RETURN button.
- If you set Auto. demo to Off, a thumbnail list ...45 is displayed on the screen automatically when the memory PC card is plugged into the projector's PC card slot.
 Select and view desired JPEG image files.

• [Interval]

You can set the display interval of time (in seconds or minutes) for slide shows to be played automatically.

· [Display effect]

When playing a slide show, the projector can give various display effects or transitions to each slide being displayed.

The transitions available are listed below:

None

Display each slide normally.

Wipe

Display the next slide gradually upward (Wipe \uparrow), downward (Wipe \downarrow), to the left (Wipe \leftarrow), or to the right (Wipe \rightarrow), over the current slide.

Dissolve

Display the next slide gradually in a certain fixed block pattern over the current slide.

Cover

Display the next slide as sliding upward (Cover \uparrow), downward (Cover \downarrow), to the left (Cover \leftarrow), or to the right (Cover \rightarrow), over the current slide.

Checker

Display the next slide gradually from the left using checkered blocks over the current slide.

· Zoom/Rotate zoom

Display the next slide by enlarging it gradually, either straight from the center (Zoom) or while turning it starting from the center (Spin zoom), over the current slide.

· Belt wipe

Display the next slide gradually in stripes from both sides, over the current slide.

Blind

Display the next slide, as if it opened like a window blind, over the current slide.

• [Play icon]

The slideshow icon can be displayed.

Standard

The projector handles the slideshow icon as follows depending on the "On/Off" setting of Icon on the projector's menu.

Icon On: The projector displays the icon upon the start of playing a slide show and turns it off after a few seconds.

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Icon Off: The projector does not display the icon.

Continuous

The projector keeps the icon displayed during the slide show.

■ Automatic demonstration


If you set **Auto.** demo to **On** in "**Setting slideshow options**" p.43), the projector starts playing a slide show automatically when a memory PC card is plugged into the PC card slot according to the procedure in "**Mounting a PC card**" p.21).

- The slide show is played as set in "Setting slideshow options".
- The slide show displays the JPEG files stored in the root directory of the memory PC card.
- The projector starts the slide show automatically when the power is turned on with the memory PC card plugged with Auto. demo set to On.
- To suspend the slide show, press the D button. Pressing it again resumes the slide show.
- To end the slide show, press the RETURN button. A thumbnail list will then be displayed.

■ Playing a slide show from a thumbnail list

If you set **Auto.** demo to **Off** in "**Setting slideshow options**" p.43 and plug a memory PC card into the PC card slot according to the procedure in "**Mounting a PC card**" p.21, the projector starts loading data from the PC card and displays a thumbnail list on the screen.

The screenshot below is an example of the thumbnail list. The actual list will vary depending on the data stored on your memory PC card.



Playing a slide show from a thumbnail list

Plug a memory PC card.

Plug a memory PC card into the PC card slot according to the procedure in "Mounting a PC card" [P.21].

The projector starts loading data from the memory PC card and displays a thumbnail list on the screen.



Searching for a target file

- Use the \(\bigcirc \) \(\bigcirc \) buttons to move the orange frame over the desired file or folder.
- If there are multiple pages of thumbnails, click the button on the bottom row to go to the next page, and the button on the top row to go to the previous page.
- To open a folder, move the orange frame to the desired folder and press the button. You can navigate down up to 5 levels using the same procedure. Pressing the RETURN button returns you to the next or other upper level folder.

Oisplaying slides

- Pressing the button with a file selected displays the image in that file only in fullscreen view on the screen as a slide. Pressing the button enters the automatic play mode.
- To return to the thumbnail list display screen, press the RETURN button.

Changing slides

Pressing the buttons with a slide displayed changes slides.

(**♦**: previous slide; **♦**: next slide. These buttons are not available during an automatic play.)

6 Rotating a slide

Pressing the buttons with a slide displayed rotates the slide 90 degrees. The rotation information is preserved as long as you remain in the current folder.

(: Rotate left; : Rotate right. These buttons are not available during an automatic play.)

■ Notes

- The thumbnail display order and slide order goes in order from shortest file name to longest. If two file names have the same number of characters, they are ordered numerically if numbers are used in the file name, and alphabetically otherwise.
- It is possible to give presentations without using a computer by converting presentations created with Microsoft® PowerPoint® into JPEG files using the JPEG Conversion Tool, and storing them on a memory PC card. p.57
 Note, however, that functions such as animation effects and hyperlinks cannot be used, so it should be tested before the actual presentation.

Checking the projector status

■ Status display

To check the current status of the projector, select **Status display** in step 2 in "**Projector settings**" p.36). The following items of information will then be displayed.

<Application>

The name of the application currently running on the projector is displayed. (Examples: Slideshow, Wireless Utility)

<PC card>

When no card is plugged → "Blind" is displayed.

When a memory PC card is plugged → "Blind/Free space/Status" are displayed.

When a wireless LAN PC card is plugged → "Blind/MAC address/DHCP/IP address/

■ How to install

In the supplied CD-ROM, select the **Applications** folder, and run **setup.exe**. Follow the instructions on your computer screen.

During the installation, a dialog box may appear with the message "Digital Signature Not Found" and the prompt "Do you want to continue the installation?". Click on the [Yes (Y)] button to continue the installation.

■ How to uninstall

Using the Wireless Utility





Mode

Selecting **High quality** improves the quality of the projected image, but lowers communication speed. Selecting **High speed** has the opposite effect.

To halt transmission from Update automatically, click on the stop button.

If the **Wireless Utility** icon has been placed in the tasktray, double click on the icon to display the window, then halt transmission, or right click on the icon, and halt transmission.

Notes

- It may not be possible to transmit the images from movie player or other video applications.
- When using "Update automatically", the transmitted image refresh rate depends on the performance of the computer you are using and the surrounding radio wave environment.
- The projector screen may have a few differences from the computer screen.
- It is not possible to transmit to a projector that is already receiving from another computer.
- If you selected application window in step ②, if that application is not active (in use), the image may not be correctly displayed by the projector.







How to use the JPEG Conversion Tool

The JPEG Conversion Tool converts JPEG files not supported by the projector, image files in other formats, Microsoft® PowerPoint® files, and the like into JPEG files supported by the projector. The JPEG files converted with this tool can be displayed by sending them using the wireless LAN PC card p.52, or saving them on a memory PC card p.42.

■ Launching the JPEG Conversion Tool

The window shown in the figure to the right appears on the computer screen.

Drag the Image Quality Settings slider to the left or right to set the image quality of the file after conversion. Lower values create smaller files, but lower the image quality. (It is not possible to restore the quality of an image after it has been lowered.)



■ Converting an image file

This converts JPEG files using compression formats not supported by the projector, Windows® metafiles (wmf), and bitmapped files (bmp) into JPEG files.

- (1) In the Conversion Method field, select Converting image file. (Status on launch)
- (2) In the File settings field, click on the Browse button for Original Image File Name. The Open dialog box appears.
- (3) In the **Open** dialog box:
 - (a) Specify the location of the file to be converted; and
 - (b) In the Files of Type field, click on the button to select the file format. A list of files of that format appear in the Open dialog box.
- (4) In the Open dialog box, select the file to convert, then click on the Open button.
- (5) In the JPEG Conversion Tool window, in the File settings field, select Browse for File name after conversion. The Save As dialog box appears.
- (6) In the **Save As** dialog box:
 - (a) Specify the location in which to save the converted
 - (b) Enter a file name of up to 8 characters in the File Name field: and
 - (c) Press the Save button.
- (7) (a) In the JPEG Conversion Tool, click on the Conversion button.
 - (b) A confirmation dialog box opens. Click Yes. The computer converts the file. When it finishes a message appears informing you that a JPEG file has been created.









How to use the JPEG Conversion Tool (Continued)

■ Converting files created with Microsoft® PowerPoint®

This process provides presentations without using a computer by converting presentation files created with Microsoft® PowerPoint® into JPEG files, storing them on a memory PC card, and displaying them in a slide show.

- To use this conversion mode, Microsoft® PowerPoint® must be installed on the computer.
- Only static images are supported by this process. Animation and audio are not supported.

Presentation files created with Microsoft® PowerPoint® usually consist of several slides. For this reason, the tool creates a folder with the name specified in step (5), below, and file for each slide is created in the folder (starting with slide001.jpg).

- In the Conversion Method field, select Converting PPT file.
- (2) In the File settings field, click on the Browse button for PPT File Name.


The **Open** dialog box appears.

- (3) In the **Open** dialog box:
 - (a) Specify the location of the file to be converted; and
 - (b) Select the PowerPoint® presentation file to convert, then click on the **Open** button.
- (4) In the JPEG Conversion Tool window, in the File settings field, click on the Create button for New folder name.

The **Folder create** dialog box appears.

- (5) In the Folder create dialog box, in the Folder Name of document field, specify a folder name of 12 characters or less.
- (6) In the Folder create dialog box, click on the Selection button. The Browse Folders dialog box appears.
- (7) In the Browse Folders dialog box:
 - (a) Specify the location in which to save the folder; and
 - (b) Click on the **OK** button.
- (8) In the **Folder create** dialog box:
 - (a) Click on the **Create** button.A confirmation dialog box appears;
 - (b) Click on the **OK** button.
- (9) (a) In the JPEG Conversion Tool window, click on the Conversion button.
 - (b) A confirmation dialog box opens. Click Yes. The computer begins to convert the file. When it finishes, a message appears informing you that a JPEG file has been created.













■ Making a presentation with converted JPEG files

- Copy the folder created by the JPEG Conversion Tool, or its contents, onto a memory PC card.
- (2) Use the step **1** in "**Playing a slide show from a thumbnail list**" p.45 to display a list of thumbnails.
- (3) Follow the instructions in step ② in "Playing a slide show from a thumbnail list"

 p.45 to find the thumbnail of the first slide, Slide001.jpg, and move the orange frame to it. (Select Slide001.jpg)
- (4) Press the button on the remote control. An enlarged view of the first slide appears on the screen. This starts the presentation.
- (5) To continue to the next slide, click on the remote control's ▶ button. To go back to the previous slide, click on the ♠ button.

■ Creating a screen capture and converting it into a JPEG file

This function saves the current computer screen as a JPEG file.

- In the Conversion Method field, select Creating screen capture.
- (2) In the File settings field, click on the Browse button for File name after conversion.

The Save As dialog box appears.

- (3) In the Save As dialog box:
 - (a) Specify the location in which to save the converted file;
 - (b) Enter a file name of up to 8 characters in the **File Name** field: and
 - (c) Click on the Save button.
- (4) (a) In the **JPEG Conversion Tool** window, click on the **Conversion** button.
 - (b) A confirmation message appears. Click Yes. The computer creates a screen capture, and converts it into a JPEG file in the specified location. When it is finished, a message appears to tell you that a JPEG file has been created.

• The maximum resolution of JPEG files created with the JPEG Conversion Tool is $1,024 \times 768$ pixels.



The TCP/IP settings for the projector and computer are required even in the wireless LAN Ad hoc mode.







- How long it takes before the lamp explodes or the life expires may vary greatly by lamp.
 Some may explode shortly after first use. (Free replacement is available if the lamp explodes within the warranty period. Contact the dealer from whom you purchased the product in such a case.)
- Explosion is likely to happen if the lamp is used after the replacement period has elapsed.
- When the lamp explodes, the broken pieces of glass may get inside the product or be released outside from the openings for ventilation.
- When the lamp explodes, a slight amount of mercury gas enclosed in the lamp along with glass dust may be released from the openings for ventilation.

■ Immediately replace the lamp when a sign appears on the screen.

- When the replacement time approaches, a message will appear on the screen.
- The risk of explosion will increase if the lamp is continuously used without being replaced.
- Frequently check the used hours and prepare spares when the replacement time approaches. (Refer to "Status display". p.33)

■ When the lamp is broken

- If glass components, including a lamp and a lens, should break, handle the broken pieces with care to avoid injury and contact your dealer for repair service.
- In the event of lamp explosion, unplug the product from the wall outlet, leave and completely ventilate the room. Then, thoroughly clean the area around the projector and discard any edible items placed in that area.
- When the lamp explodes, consult a doctor if glass dust or mercury gas gets into your eyes or you breathe it.

Lamp replacement

A lamp is consumable supplies. If used for extended periods, images will appear dark, and the lamp could burn out. This is characteristic of a lamp, and is not malfunction. (The lifetime of the lamp depends on condition of use.) If this happens, replace it with a new one.

⚠ WARNING

- If the projector is mounted on a ceiling, request a lamp replacement from your projector dealership.
- When replacing, always use lamp "TLPLV4" (sold separately).

A CAUTION

- If you have been using the projector, the lamp will be very hot, and may cause burn injuries.
 Wait for the lamp to cool (for longer than 1 hour) before replacing it.
- If the lamp should break, please handle with care to avoid injury due to broken pieces and contact your dealer for repair service.

1 Unplug power cord.

Wait until lamp is sufficiently cooled.

Wait for at least 1 hour.

Remove the lamp cover.

Loosen the 2 screws, then pull up to the direction of the arrow with your fingers as shown to remove the lamp cover. Use care to avoid any damage to nails and/or tip of your finger(s). If you have any difficulty in removal, you can use a screwdriver or any other smaller tool for your convenience.

Pull out the lamp.

Loosen the 2 screws holding the lamp in place, and pull up the handle to remove the lamp.

6 Mount the new lamp.

Align the orientation, press down until the bottom is reached, and lock in place using the two lamp locking screws.

6 Replace the lamp cover.

Align the cover, and press it in, then tighten the screws loosened in step ③ until the lamp cover is no longer loose.

Reset the lamp timer.


See the lamp's manual for instructions on resetting the lamp timer.

■ Notes and Precautions

- Press the button twice to display (a rough guide) the time of lamp use, the **Lamp time** item, in the **Status display menu**.
- It is recommended that the lamp be replaced after 3,000 hours of use. When **Lamp time** reaches 3,000 hours, the icon and a message will appear. This display disappears when you press button.
- Attach the lamp cover correctly so that it is not loose. If it is not attached correctly, the lamp may fail to come on [p.65], and the lamp's lifetime may be shortened.
- Always replace the lamp with a new one.
- The lamp is made out of glass. Do not touch the glass surface with your bare hands, bang it, or scratch it. (Dirt, jolts, scratches and the like could break the lamp.)







Lamp replacement (Continued)

Used Lamps

This projector's lamps contain trace amounts of environmentally harmful inorganic mercury. Be careful not to break used lamps, and dispose of them in accordance with local regulations.

Lens and main unit cleaning

⚠ WARNING

 Request cleaning and maintenance of a ceiling-mounted unit from your projector dealership. Attempting to clean/replace the lamp at a high site by yourself may cause you to drop down, thus resulting in injury.

■ Lens cleaning

• Clean the lens with a commercially available blower and/or lens cleaner.

• The lens is easily scratched, so do not rub it with hard objects. or strike it.

■ Main unit cleaning


- Clean the main unit after unplugging the power cord.
- · Wipe dirt off the main unit gently with a soft cloth.
- If the soiling is severe, dip the cloth in a neutral detergent diluted in water, wring well, and gently wipe off the dirt, then finish up by wiping with a dry cloth.

Replacing cooling fans

To maintain the performance, it is recommended that cooling fans should be replaced about every 2 to 3 years. Consult with your dealer for details.

Trouble indications

The indicator lights inform you of internal abnormalities.

Make sure to unplug the power cord if something goes wrong.




